right direction. Even more encouraging is the indication that Nixon's incoming foreign policy advisor has views on the subject which are basically consistent with the views Clifford has been expressing since

Writing for Foreign Policy magazine Dr. Henry A. Kissinger outlined a broad plan under which the negotiations would proceed along two lines, one with the United States and North Vietnam talking about mutual military withdrawal nd the other with Saigon and Viet Cong discussing the political situation.

His article was written before he was amed by Nixon and he reportedly attempted too late to have it withdrawn from publication to avoid embarrassing Nixon. It is unlikely that Kissinger has changed his views since the time of the

Thus there is a prospect of consistency between the views held by the outgoing Johnson administration which is eager to be given credit for achieving peace and the incoming Nixon administration which would also like to get that credit. The United States posture now ought to be one of stopping the bloodshed as soon as possible under conditions that do not leave Saigon helpless, but do not offer Saigon the insurance of an end less presence of American troops.
