WASHINGTON (AP) — A he man charged with slaying two FBI agents surrendered meekly in the attic of an apartment house Wednesday night, climaxing an intense house-to-house manhust in the Capital's South East section.

"Honeymoon" Will Come Later There are routine formulas for analysis and commentary which can, on occasion, be as unreliable as any other set rule or tradition.

The air seems full, these days, of discussions of how President-elect Richard Nixon is, like all new Presidents, coming into a period of honeymoon. .

During this honeymoon period, according to political tradition, the nation and the Congress will be so enraptured of the new occupant of the White House that there will be nothing they can deny him, nothing but affection they can express for him, no fault they can find.

Then, according to tradition, their oneymoon period will come to an end. The first rapture will depart. The new President's wishes will cease to become automatic commands and will be treated rather, as controversal whims or reasonable demands. Instead of seeking to please him, the Congress will begin to look for sparring matches with him. Instead of giving everything he does unanimous approval, the nation will begin judging him as if he were an ordi-

All this, it seems to us, is ridiculously far from the prospects as they really exist in 1969. The truth, it seems to us, is something closer to a reversal of the normal honeymoon process.

The election of Richard Nixon was not a marriage of love and affection in which nation and the man rushed

mpetuously together. It was, rather, a marriage of con wenience, in which it was Nixon rather than somebody else, arranged by minority of the nation's voters

Like any marriage of convenience, ar ranged on some basis other than overowering true love, this match is not ikely to have a very romantic honeymoon. It may be something of an effort at first, for the two parties merely to be polite to one another. They are more likely to engage in exploratory games and maneuvers than in any impetuous

When we set forth the plot in such terms, then the actual prospect for the elationship between President Nixon and the Congress and the Nation beomes clear. The progress will be from a cool, exploratory honeymoon toward a back at home relationship in which the two parties begin gradually to discover that they can like each other a little more than they expected to.

That will lead to small experiments in pleasing one another, and to a gradual growth of mutual thoughtfulness until, at just about the point in time when the normal honeymoon might begin to fade, the two parties would be beginning to discover some genuine affection and respect for one another.

In summary, President Nixon will not begin with the traditional honeymoon, but will, if all goes not too badly, reverse the usual tradition, and experience his best relationship with Congress and the nation not in any initial rapture, but in a slower and more mature and sounder affection which will ripen about the time the normal political honeymoon would be ending.

There was at least a hint at Arm Ar bor that this thirst to destroy existing institutions might be beginning to apply itself to the SDS itself. And perhaps one of the points on which

there did seem some agreement at Ann Arbor was also a revelation of possible desperation weakness on the part of the organization as a whole. It was agreed that, for the immediate future, the nation's high schools should be a main target for the SDS "thrust" for inreased membership. Why not, while the SDS is at it, reach into the kindergarten? Or the crib, where anarchism, a clear, toyous zest for wanton destruction, so often seems part of the nature we are born with?
