

They had obviously contributed the key phrases in the naugural Address. They had obviously relped create the mood in which the new President assumed his power. They had obviously shaped the commanding emphasis on the quest of peace, as the one chief mandate he accepted for his administration. And these better angels of our being and our day obviously had played their part when the whole Inaugural Address came out totally friendly and affirmative, and offered stiffness

What he said of the youth of today was that he thought he knew them well and that we could be proud of them because they are better educated, more committed, and more passionately driven by conscience than any other generation in

If there was any slightly false note anywhere in the Inaugural ceremonies, it came not from President Nixon's performance, but from the excessful wishing of one of his own best and most enthusiastic friends. The evangelist of the occasion could not resist, we suppose, wishing for the new President nothing less than a "supernatural wis-
