An Israeli army spokesman in Tel Aviv said: "I completely deny this report. I don't know what gave rise to it. There has been absolutely nothing like this along the cease-fire line." Newmen on the Israeli side of the cease-fire line saw no sign of any unusual air activity. A communique broadcast by Baghdad radio said the planes attacked Iraqi units east of the cease-fire line with Jordan. One Israeli jet was seen to plunge to the ground in flames, the Iraqis said. Again, A Total Necessity

To one knows whether the continually stering crisis in the Near East can be under control, no matter what rts are made by the outside world hybe the best that can be managed, n the way of policy, is not going to be rood enough. Perhaps the tragedy has to be played out, to its full slaughters, fore some peace of exhaustion arrives. But, if there can be no certainty as to what is going to happen, or as to what must happen, one can venture a great deal of certainty about the right and the wrong ways for the world to approach

The right thing to happen is to have the big powers, like the United States and Russia, and, for that matter, Britain and France, refrain from any effort to arrange or impose what might be called "big power" settlement on the urbulence of the Near East.

The right thing to happen is to have my special consultation among these wers confine strelf to agreement that e big powers will exercise their own offuence only through the machinery and some cigaret. he verdicts of the United Nations.

The wrong thing to have happen would be for the world's two greatest powers to sit down and try to resolve the problems of the Near East as if they were merely carving up new spheres of influence for themselves and their own

The necessity in the Near East is not that Russia or the United States have this or that sphere of influence, or this or that balance of imperial powers beand the Arab States be guaranteed life, with some degree of justice.

If Russia and the United States are going to do the best thing for themselves and for the Near East, they will do it not by coming to the forefront in some big two-nation deal for a peace to be mposed upon the region by their own awesome powers, but by making them selves the servants and supporters of what the United Nations, the nearest hing we have to a voice and a conscience or all mankind, regards as the solution hat should be sought in the Near East Once again, the United Nations is the total necessity it was when it was invent-

The story is in the statistics. Not ong ago, annual executions in the United States were numbered in the hunreds. As recently as 1930, the total was 6. Ten years ago it was down to 49. And in the past five years -1963, 21; 1964, 15; 1965, 7; 1966, 1; 1967, 2 —it has

shrunk to the current vanishing point Death as the most severe punishment for transgressions against the social orer is as old, or older, than civilization iself, Opposition, on ethical and pracdeal grounds, is just as ancient.

The argument most frequently advanced in support is its value as a deterrent. Opponents counter that most capt al crimes are unpremeditated, commit ted on impulse, or by warped mental-

ing allow progress in revising laws. Elev-en states —Alaska, Hawaii, Iowa, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota, Oregon, Rhode Island, West Virginia and Wasconsin —have abolished the death penalty. Two others —New York and Vermont —restrict it to capital crimes against police or prison personnel. And abolition of the penalty for federal crimes. Congress, however, has shown stuelf in no hurry to not. The most telling blow is more likely

to come in the courts than in the legislatures. A Supreme Court test —on the probable grounds that the penalty vioates the constitutional ban on "cruel and unusual puntshment" —is regarded as inevitable. A recent court decision that opponents of capital punishmen may not be excluded from juries is already a major factor in the greater atstate courts are giving to ap-

way out? Probably not, at least not yet. For one thing, general revulsion at such crimes as assassinations of public figures, mass murders and kitchapings works in favor of keeping the penalty on the books, at least in reserve.

But the application is likely to contime to become steadily less frequent and subject to stricter standards. Berring a sudden and unlikely reversal of the trend of the past half century, the extreme penalty will be resorted to only in the most extreme circumstances.

ASH also starts lawsuits against the sale of candy cigarets to children. of brief to be submitted in an effort to establish the right of nonsmokers "to be free of cigaret smoke of others, which is annoying and which may also be harmful to their health, particularly in

One can guess an ultimate objective of that line of crusading - a national law to prohibit cigaret smoking on the street. It is, in short, a very busy organization. Nothing keeps anybody as happily busy as the project of pushing other people around for their own good.

And we think it can be conceded, without doubt, that we should be a healthier nation if we could somehow manage never to manufacture or smoke another






