Manchester's Water Problems - I **Population Outpacing Sources**

By MALCOLM BABLOW (Editor's Note: This is the first of four articles based on the town's water system and the Griswold Engineering re-port on it released Jan. 20. It concerns the town's growth and the struggles to meet its water needs, Tomorrow's article will concern the \$4.2 millions worth of suggested answers and the next two will deal with the possible purchase of the Manchester Water Co. and the way the report was made.)

Manchester is in the midst of a growth which began about 1940 when the town had 23,000 people and which planning agencies claim will level of about the year 2000 at betwee 74,000 and 93,000.

The water needs of these people has already helped prompt the Manchester Water Co. to build four excellent wells and the Town Water Department to build five average wells and attempt several more.

After the State Department of Health in 1967 warned the town that it faces a water deficit by 1975, the Board of Directors okayed a \$7,000 study of the

whole town's water. Griswold Engineering of Main St. started on the study July 24 with plans to give a report back to the town by Nov. 21. Walter Fuss, former town public works director and the Griswold en gineer in charge of the study, said the job turned out to be much bigger than they planned and they handed in their inch thick report Jan. 20.

The report begins with the history of town water systems. An 1889 North End fire which burned down Rose's Drug Store and other buildings prompted the formation of the Manches ter Water Co. A bucket brigade was the best the North End could do to handle the fire. Will Childs, a North End feed and grain salesman, was the main company promoter. Fire hydrant service to the town was

what they wanted most. Man people said they could not see how water could taste decent after traveling through miles of

The system steadily grew and now serves about 13,000 people in the North End. Until the early 1960s, its main water sources were two very small reservoirs holding a total of 2 million gallons off Lydall Rd Risley Reservoir at the Vernon-Manchester-Bolton town lines is still its holding reservoir with 62.5 million gallons,

Construction in Bolton cause silt to enter the company's waters in 1959 and the com pany was forced to find more water sources. It has since built seven wells which have quad rupled the company's potentia daily draft. Only a few of the wells are used and the reservoir water is added to soften it. The Griswold report said it will not need more sources until after the year 2000. But they

"Preventive Detention?" There is now being floated in Washingn, with encouragement and near-enroposal aimed at the problem of dealing with the exorbitant portion of the nation's rime which is committed by a relatively small group of repeaters.

The conditions and statistics which imulate such a search have been discussed in this space many times. Just the other day we noted statistics which said that 627 out of 3,476 delinquents case-studied in the city of Philadelphia committed 5,305, or more than half, of the 10,214 offenses credited to the whole

We have said the same situation obtains almost everywhere, with both police and courts knowing who the chronic speat offenders are, but unable to stop

Now a Senate subcommittee and President Nixon have both taken up a proposed remedy. President Nixon suggested it as he was addressing himself to his own prospective crusade against crime in Washington. The Senate subcommittee has been considering it in the course of bearings in which one of the sample stories it heard is that of one individual who has been arrested 10 times since 1967 on charges ranging from bank robbery to assault with a board, who was released after each successive arinything

The proposal both the President and the committee are now considering would be to have such criminals held in preventive detention" so they can't commit a new crime at least until they have been brought to trial for their old one. A federal judge told the Senate sub-

committee this: "We must face pragmatically the prospect of deciding whether to confine a potentially dangerous defendant without bond for a substantial period of time (amounting to months and possibly years before he comes to trial) or alternatively eleasing him to the community where in many instances he will commit further depredations upon society."

President Nixon's statement on the same issue read as follows:

"Increasing numbers of crimes are being committed by persons already indicted for earlier crimes, but free on

pretrial release. "Many are now being arrested two, three, even seven times for new offenses while awaiting trial.

"This requires that a new provision be made in the law, whereby dangerous hardcore recidivists could be held in pretrial detention when they have been charged with crimes and when their coninued pre-trial release presents a clear danger to the community."

Later, an anonymous White House official expanded on this a little:

"Given due process," he said, "given also reasonable standards, what we are doing here is endorsing in a general way the concept of detention of hard-core types who might use the times between arrests and trial to commit what amounts to 'free' crimes - because when they come in again all they do is serve concurrent sentences."

There it is, then, one proposal to deal with the problem of the chronic offender who seems responsible for at least half our crime

Unfortunately, it is a proposal which seems to involve an almost inevitable clash with the supposedly fundamental principle of American law that no man is guilty until convicted of the crime he has committed. Under that principle, it might prove rather difficult to hold him guilty for the crime he may or may not be about to commit. Rather than press for such a questionable change in the law and in the practice of justice, President Nixon and the Senate Committee might better press to see that habitual criminals are really given one of the rights they are supposed to have - that to a speedy trial. That would be the noncontroversial, the clearly legal way to cut down on the amount of time available for "free crimes." Providing, of course, the courts convict somebody now

A Crisis In Talent? By current estimates, the number of variety shows on television next year will be increased from something like six this year to a grand new total of

This is what television always does when it decides, on the basis of one year's ratings, that a certain type of nent is the audience winner of ent. There was the flood of resterns, the flood of detectives, the lood of attempted situation comedies, and now there is going to be the flood of variety shows. Not all of them, of course, will be the same type and tempo. But all will feature the presentation of liferent types of entertainment by different talents.

This particular explosion of one particular brand of television entertainment is, however, going to encounter difficul-ties not involved in multiplyng the number of detective shows, for instance. The woods are full of actors and writers. But the roster of variety entertain ment specialists is somewhat limited. There are, for instance, not enough centriloquists to go around for the preslimited number of variety shows. And to look forward to as many as 13 variety shows next year with only three or four talents capable of mimicking John Wayne is going to mean that each show is likely to have to go as many as three or four weeks without having anybody mimic John Wayne.

There is a woeful shortage of soft shoe dancers. To supply as many as 18 shows with weekly Negro comedians it might be necessary to resort to the old and discredited blackface make-up. In fact, the only variety category for which one can guarantee a more than plentiful supply is that of the modern ingers. There are enough boys who tress like girls and girls who dress like boys and who can shout and anarl in distinguishably to guarantee that even 26 variety shows, next season, could be well supplied with vocal noise.

Otherwise, the main result is that we are all going to see, twice as often as we do now, the same individuals we now see, going round and round the circuit, twice as often as we might care to.

The Two Kinds Of Poverty A psychologist who has been dealing clinically with living conditions in an impoverished section of Mississippi finds that she is encountering "an incredible number of depressions," meaning personal mental conditions, but that, in the country slum conditions in question, the causes of such "blues" are usually very close to the surface.

"Here," says the psychologist, "a middle-aged woman who is depressed knows she is depressed, and she knows why It may be because she can't raise \$5 for a new dress, because she can't pick cotton any more, or it might be a minor physical aliment that has gone untreated. Or because the house is empty, with the men and grow children moved

This is, of course, a description of low and deplorable living conditions, which with which the new is affiliated is doing something to cure, by bringing in medical care, supplying nutrition, and teaching people how to sew or knit a dress.

But something else comes to mind It is the possibility that there are some women in the world, able to afford handsome fees to psychiatrists who try to help them discover just why they are unhappy, who might find it almost a relief to know, like the impoverished women of the Mississippi Delta, some specific cause of their misery. Between the poverty of things and the poverty of spirit which may be accompanied by a surfeit of things, which is to choose?

Manchester's Water Problems - II **Remedy Estimate \$4.2 Million**

(Editor's Note: This is the second of four articles based on the Griswold Engineering report released Jan. 20. Among the reasons the report was nearly two months late is the \$4.2 millions worth of suggested water system improvements explained in this article. Yesterday's article concerned the growth of the town water systems and the last two articles concern the pur-chase of the Manchester Water Co. and the way the report was made.)

By MALCOLM BARLOW

The dependable water yield of all seven Town Water Department sources now is 4.14 mgd (million gallons per day). The recently released Griswold Engineering report on the town predicts the draft on this yield will be 5.25 mgd by 1970, 7.28 mgd by 1980 ,and 9.62 mgd by 1990.

This means the town could be short about 1.11 mgd next

year, 3.14 mgd by 1980 and a whopping 5.48 mgd by 1990. The Griswold engineers admit they are basing their depend-able yield figures on the drought years of 1961 to 1966 and the town can expect much more water in the average year. But they warn that their

figures are also showing 100 per cent efficiency which is diffi-cult to maintain in any system, especially during high use periods. They also note the chance of poor meter records in their figures, town growth exceeding planners' projections, possible contamination of a water source such as some-times occurs at Porter or Howard Reservoirs, the time need-ed to develop new systems and the extra supplies needed in

case of a large fire. A major part of the Griswold report and the reason it took five months to complete instead of the contracted three months are the sections listing possible olutions and ways to pay for

them. They cost over \$4.2 mil-lion total. It begins with the largest part of the town system, the low elevation area excluding Rock-ledge, Steep Hollow Lane, High-land Park and Lakewood Circle areas, which are at high eleva

By 1970, the growing water needs can be met with two in-active Charter Oak wells which could together produce 1.08 mgd. Most of the equipment for them has been bought. But remaining costs will be about \$32,000.

This means there will only be a 1.81 mgd lack by 1980 This will grow to 3.92 mgd by 1990. The report lists five proposals to meet this need.

Rearing Brook The Roaring Brook Reservoir on town-owned land in Glastonbury has nearly twice the wa-tershed area of Globe Hollow Reservoir -4.5 square miles (See Page Seventeen)
