\$\$ Would Go To Schools. Welfare Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) -Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York unveiled at the White House today a plan to continue the "ter porary" 10 per cent federal income tax surcharge and use the proceeds to help fi-nance state and local programs, particularly for ed ucation.

In a presentation made before Presidet Nixon's Urban Affairs Council, Rockefeller also sugrested that 25 per cent of futur rowth in other federal reve ues be carmarked to under write new nationwide welfar standards which, he urged, be paid in full by the federal gov

"By this sharing of fisc strength within the federal sys tem," he said in a statement "we cannot only further educa-tion and provide welfare bene-fits more efficiently, but we can also help preserve the vitality and effectiveness of state and local government, within the federal system."



Navy Reports Big E' Repairs Near Completion

"Repair work is ahead of schedule because as we got into the job we found that the damage was fairly well localized in e immediate area of the blasts and not as extensive as originally anticipated," Capt. R. E. Barnhart, commander of the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard, said today. About 700 men, assigned i

We want to make sure the weld holds," said Cmdr. Samuel B. Lancaster, th carrier's public affairs officer.

A President Of Sorrows

Perhaps it was that deep, cavernous face, and the dark brooding recesses of the eyes. But in some great degree he looked on the outside ____Abraham Lincoln - what we have believed him to be on the inside.

He looked sorrowful and com passionate, as through he were engaged n taking the whole tragedy of a nation committing unspeakable horrors against itself into his own being, and suffering it all there, in himself as a sort of Christ-like proxy for all the rest of his ountrymen

His own election was a product of the division of the country, which it then ntensified. He came into the position of commander-in-chief in the bloodiest war yet known to man. He had to win on the battlefield a war that could not really be won, but only lost, on a battlefield. Even could he have lived, he might not have been able to bind up the wounds he deplored even as, positionbound, he helped inflict them.

But one thing he could do in which there was no divisive thrust. He could take into himself, and experience, and therefore symbolize, and even exorcise, to some degree, the sharp but general presiding

His face looked the way his nation felt. His eyes interchanged with theirs their mutual sorrow. By taking so much of it into himself, he made the common tragedy more bearable. By remaining sensitive and gentle, he helped preserve sensitivity from the brutes ordeal. It was more important for him to be what he was than for him to do what he did.

Coffin Gets In The White House

It is to be noted that, at no apparent cost to anybody - nd to no apparent actual influence on policy either--the Nixon administration has been able to accord courteo ; treatment to representatives of the organization calling itself "Clergy and Laymen Concerned About Vietnam." This organization appeared in Washington, the other day. with people like Mrs. Martin Luther King Jr. and the Rev. William Sloane Coffin_Jr., the controversial chaplain of Yale University, as its spokesmen.

What the organization sought was something it had failed to obtain during the administration of President Johnson --- an opportunity to present its views to the White House, What it asked for was audience with the President himself, and this it did not get

What it did get was a meeting at the White House with Dr. Henry A. Kissinger, the President's famous adviser on national security .natters.

Afterward, Mr. Coffin said "we are very grateful for a very respectful hearing from Mr. Kissinger."

During the meeting with Dr. Kissinger, the clergymen advanced a proposal for postwar Presidential amnesty to the resisters of the draft for Vietnam, and gave Dr. Kissinger some other ideas of the kind of policy they would like to have him recommending to the new Presi-

The Johnson administration apparently feared it would sully the White House if it even admitted such dubious charcters as these clergymen who believe a little too strongly in peace in a situation where their own country is at war. The Nixon administration not only admits the group, but assigns an important figure to the task of giving it audience. and possible answers. Perhaps, as a result, the White House will understand and appreciate better what drives some of our clergy, and our clergy have a touch of understanding and appreciation of what action options are really open to a President. What I want is that boy from the YMCA Summer Camp, who got in free so far as he was concerned, and th high school drop out who got a second chance under the War on Poverty program, and the unwed mother whose burden in part was accepted by the Salvation Army, to look around and say, "Thank God for America."

I don't want them to thank me, and on't want them to do anything for me. do want them to take a good hard look, and to realize that, underprivilege ed they may be; unfortunate they ma be; abused they may be; none-the-less no other nation under the face of the sum has tried to rectify wrongs as has this one. No other nation has poured out its heart and soul in the doctrine of the second chance as have we. No other nation has given so much and asked so little in return. And only one thing makes this possible

You, the upper dog

You the privileged. You the fortunate.

You who worked 16 hours a day when it was necessary and gambled your life and your earnings that you could be

You, who accepted the burden of the community and on top of every other obligation that was plied on your should ers, willingly took on one more. You the upper dog. I'm for you.

I was deeply distraught and still am at the godiess, senseless, brutal alaying of Dr. Martin Luther King. I am irrevocably opposed to these men, white or black, who think problems can be solved by threats, by reprisals, by aurder, by revenge. Whether or not I agree with Martin

Luther King is of no consequence. He had the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit, not of happiness, but of an in-pired goal. The fool who cut him down deserves no mercy from society. But with all of this goes a corollar I am fed up to the gills with the publicity giver 'te H. Rap Browns, the Leroy Jones, the Adam Clayton Powells the draft card burners, the acid head and all their ilk, be they green, blue, white, or just plain yellow. I am sick of the false aura of grandeur that we have permitted these people to assume through the medium of excess

publicity I'll be a whole lot more impressed with their civil liberties when I see them being more civil and taking fewer

Every time one of these public bleeders climbs up on his soap box and berates the United States, our laws, our courts, our enforcement, our economy, he is doing it with my money.

fective March 16. Earlier, on Jan. 29, Finch cut off funds to five other southern school districts. Both the exchange services and the House Armed Services Committee-which over the years has exercised paternal control-have been quick to head off recent attempts to investigate the PX

In 1967, for example, Rep Emmanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) asked the GAO to study the economics of the Army and Air Force Exchange Service Headquarters move from New York City to Dallas. The Exchange Service, according to GAO officials, refused to turn over the cessary information on the
