something to us, as individuals, then we demand the ultimate in wisdom, foresight, planning, and emergency reaction from those public agencies and servants which have the responsibility of doing front line battle with the act of nature.

We do not mean to imply by the mood of our comment, that there is nothing to be gained by study of our experience, by looking into the performance of men and equipment, by giving public officials the stimulation of a few public lashes, by trying to plan something that could be done, next time, to improve the

But we do think there ought to be a shade more realization that it is really nature which still retains the power to smake itself boss of everything now and then, and that when nature does assert itself there could be some degree of tolerance for the efforts of puny men to deal with the consequences.

This last near-blizzard of ours could have been handled much more easily if it had come without its wind. It could have been a thousand times more terrible, and have resulted in a tragic toll of life if it had come with temperatures 20 or 30 degrees colder. In one way, it was kind of this storm to arrive on a Sunday, when most people were home anyway. On the other hand, the public works crews destined to fight the storm might have got a better start if the storm had arrived on one of their normal work days.

The point we are trying to make is that nature has unlimited options in the timing, wind-factor, temperature, and duration which decide what kind of storm is going to be. Nature seldom has to repeat itself. It has more potential variations than man can make perfect

We suppose some communities, and some public works departments -Manchester's, for instance - did better than some others. But there ought to be some general tolerance for the way in which people everywhere met a condition and an experience they had never precisely encountered before and are not likely to encounter in precise duplicate again. If they insist on sticking Mayor Lindsay into that snowbank, let it at least be feet first.

A Good Times Structure?

As has been frequently noted, the charm of the new industrial organization called the "conglomerate" is that it unites, under one overall management, individual enterprises which are so diversified they do not compete with

The advantage of side-stepping the anti-trust laws is that the conglomerate is freed from any legal limitation on its own size. So long as it doesn't mate

This advantage, without which the onglomerate would not even exist, may also, in time, prove to be its flaw, and every Wall Street discussion of the conglomerate regiches, sooner or later,th worrisome question of just how big a conglomerate can get to be and still be a mafe venture for its own managers and

The experts can't make up their minds as to how sound the future of the congiomerates may be.

But if a layman wants to step outside the lingo and the expertise of the world of high finances, he may find some fundamental principle likely to apply to

It is possible and probable, for in stance, that the conglomerate depends, for its continued health, upon a continual succession of new acquisitions. A conglomerate which has not had some new conquest every few months begins to look pale and unromantic. It takes the transfusion or absorption of some new enterprise to keep the blood ruddy in its trading cheeks. By its nature, a conglomerate must keep heading forward and cannot select for itself some mo ment in which it considers itself stabiliz ed and retired from the acquisition market. For a conglomerate to halt, and to stop growing, in for it to begin to

There has already, even in the re

latively short life of all the conglomerates to date, been demonstration of how something quite beyond their own control can slow them down. They seen able to bargain successfully for acquisi tions only in a rising stock market, when the stock they are about to offer for their latest acquisition always seems likely to be worth a little more tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow. But few mergers are consummated in any period of sustained decline on the stock market. The question is whether any kind of business organization or venture so dependent upon perpetual good times and continual new acquisitions can be considered as sound, in its trapped bigness, as the weakest of its components might have been under similar conditions if
