Target For Today In Peru, a military junta which we have accepted diplomatically in spite of the fact that it overthrew a constiutionally elected government, and a type of junta which, generally speaking, chooses to play ball with the United States, has decided it can have more fun and create more domestic support

for itself by tweaking Uncle Sam's nose.

Accordingly, the military government seizes an American oll enterprise, and refuses, which is even worse, to offer any compensation in return. And, when the United States seems not exectly enthusiastic about this kind of treatment of United States capital, Peru begins harassing American tuna boats some 50 miles off its shore.

What is happening to us at the hands of Peru is the work of a military junta. Whether or not it has valid reasons to think that baiting Uncle Sam is the best route to popularity and power in its own country remains to be seen.

What is happening to us over in Turkey seems to be not the work or policy of any government, but some kind of expression of sentiment among a section of the Turkish people. This anti-American sentiment seems to be strongest sometimes, among students in the very colleges to which American financing and American staffing has been most

The anti-American sentiment in Turkey makes the current visit of the American Sixth Fleet a target, just as it resents the presence and the living standards of American military personnel in Turkey under NATO arrangements. But in Turkey, unlike in Peru, the government is with the United ty are being used as weapons against the popularity of the government, where-

s, in Peru, the government is trying to ally itself with anti-Americanism. What has the United States done to deserve such exploitation of its presumed unpopularity in other countries to whom it has played only the friend? Well, any answer has to include the fact that we are not perfect - that our dollar interests in Latin American countries have not been entirely selfiess and occasionally have been ruthless - that

perhaps pretended we meant more to Turkey than Turkey meant to us. But the answer also has to include the possibility that, even should our con duct in relation to other nations be perect, we would still be finding ourselves used as the number one international

be popular to direct insult and abuse our way. We cannot expect to escape this oc

casional kind of treatment just because we may actually be a little more decent. little more modest, a little less overbearing, a little less dictatorial, than the normal individual or nation possessed of equal wealth and power. Great nations ire rewarded for their greatness not while they hold power, but after they have fallen from it. Then, and then alone, do their comparative virtues get due notice.

That being said, let's get back to our own continuing study of our own faults and weaknesses. Probably no great nation in history has been more introspec tive and self-critical than we are. That, too, will be said of us, some day, long after our contemporaries have reaped their gains or losses from their strategy of bullyragging us.

thing is missing. What is missing is any recognition, on the part of the railroads, that they originally got their franchise, their track, their license to operate, for a general operation which included both passenger and freight.

And there is, of course, never any suggestion that, if the public is to be expected to pick up whatever losses may be incurred in providing passenger service, it might also be entitled to a special share of the profits being realized on the freight side of the operation. Not even the railroads themselves have

yet had the imaginative effrontery to carry their philosophy out to its ultimate conclusion and begin a division of their freight operations into two categories, the one profitable, for the benefit of the railroads, and the other unprofitable, to be subsidized by the public. Reduced to the ridiculous, this would have the Interstate Commerce Commission ruling on each individual freight run, as to whether it should be classified as profitable private enterprise, or operated only with a government subsidy Yet this is essentially what the roll

roads do ask for their passenger business - that they be guaranteed either profit or subsidy on every individual run they make. Admittedly, this is the psychology of ar

enterprise which is perhaps over its peak, and on the downgrade. There was a time when these same railroads fought for new passenger lines, no matter how slim the immediate profit might seem likely to be, because they were betting on future expansion. Today, by contrast. they are frightened of their own future, and they have neither the will nor the ingenuity to shape and develop their own assets into effective competition with the plane and the automobile. Their present day genius concentrates on running to government for subsidy for run

Precisely because the real opportunity open to them ought to be something better and higher than that, we believe in the possibility of new leadership rising for the railroads. But unless they do begin to show some dynamism of their own, the taxpayers and the travelers of the country are going to have to demand, sooner or later, the right of management of an enterprise their dollars are supporting.

who deserves credit for a certain degree of perhaps unconscious honesty. He is the member of Parliament who is agitating to have the Malaysian Government appoint itself an official national "witch doctor."

He himself comes from a section of Malaysia where the witch doctor, or "bomoh," is highly respected for his ability to keep flood rains away, cure diseases, drive away evil spirits, and bring good luck to everybody.

But, from his particular background, this member of Parliament is merely proposing openly what all kinds o citizens and voters in many districts and ries sucretly yearn for We here, in this most modern and

sophisticated of countries, would like to be able to vote for a national witch doctor when we go to the polls, and it was primarily the lack of such a choice at the head of either major party ticket which helped channel 10,000,000 votes to a third party candidate who did qualify with many of the potentialities of a fullfledged "bomob."

We think the people of France think. every election day at least, that Charles de Gaulle is a grand kind of national witch doctor.

Anyway, the point is that all of us, no matter how sophisticated and civilized and practiced in the ways of democracy we think ourselves to be, really have an ineradicable instinct to try to reach for a national witch doctor - somebody capable of a miraculous solution to problems beyond the reach of ordinary mortals - to be our leader. The gentleman over in Malaysia really

speaks for us all.




