Don't Ignore Losses From Theft, Casualty

WASHINGTON (AP) — The typical homeowner's lender feelings for his castle, mortgaged though it may be, are at their peak right about now as he adds up the money-saving deductions and other income tax savings hiding behind each shut-ter and shingle.

First, all that interest you pay on the monthly mortgage payments is deductible, every bit of it.

The next big item is real estate tax, both state and local if you get hit both ways. It's all deductible.

In addition to these two major tax reducers, available to every homeowner, there are dozens more that cover special situations.

Many homeowners, for instance, are entitled to deductions for casualty or theft losses. These are deductible to the extent that they exceed \$100 after subtracting insurance settlements, if any.

The \$100 rule must be applied to each such loss—you can't add up a year's losses and treat them as one.

The tax collectors define a casualty as partial or total destruction resulting from an identifiable event of a sudden, unexpected or unusual nature.

Burns, floods, falling trees, runaway cars that crash through the bedroom wall and riot damage, are a rarity but common enough these days.

Theft losses are easy enough to understand. Homeowners have many types of theft losses which attract the IRS attention. And they leave a lot of it out doors, things like stationary and garden-hed lawn equipment that costs as much as a good car.

If you are required as a condition of employment to use part of your home as a place of business, you may deduct an appropriate percentage of home maintenance costs such as heat, light, telephone, cleaning and decorating bills.

There are also tax angles to consider when you change homes.

Most sellers nowadays get more for their homes than they paid.

Taxes must be paid on this profit unless you invest it in another home costing at least as much within a year before or after the sale.

If a house is being built for you and construction started before the sale or not later than one year after, you have up to 18 months after the sale to move in.

Sheinwold on Bridge

BREAK OLD RULE FOR BEST RESULT

"Never fence against your partner," says an old rule, dating back to the days of whist. It's a good rule to follow if you're playing whist, but a good rule to abandon if the game is bridge.

North dealer.

Both sides vulnerable.

Opening lead three of diamonds.

West opens the three of diamonds, and declarer plays low from the dummy. The fate of the contract depends on East's play at the first trick.

If East follows the old rule, he puts up the jack of diamonds. "Third hand high" is another way of saying "Never fence against your partner." Both against would lead East astray in this case.

South captures the jack of diamonds with the queen and loses a trump finesse to East's king. East returns a club, enabling West to take two club tricks.

West South ruffs the third round of clubs, draws trumps and plays a diamond to take a finesse with dummy's ten. This finesse works, and South takes the rest of the tricks, making his contract.

Deep Finesse
East defects the contract if he plays the eight of diamonds at the first trick, taking a deep finesse. This play enables South to win a cheap trick with the nine of diamonds, but does not make his contract.

South loses a spade finesse at the second trick, and the defenders make the normal switch to clubs, taking two club tricks. West gets out safely to an opening bid. You need at least two of the eight ace and kings for a sound opening bid.

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When cleaning power pleases, use a solution of salt and vinegar—about half and half.

plan or at a bank, and can be cashed in (after a two-month holding period) at either a bank or the nearest Federal Reserve or Independent Living Copy office (in large cities). In case of death, cashing bonds is simpler if you have named a co-owner.

Government savings bonds should be kept in a safe deposit box, but also can be deposited with a Federal Reserve bank if there is one in your city. If a bond is mislaid, stolen, or destroyed you can have it replaced.

If you do need to send out several checks a month, your next step after a savings account is a checking account. It will, however, involve extra costs.

Checking accounts usually do not pay interest on funds kept in the account, as do savings accounts even in the same bank. If you send out fewer than five checks a month, usually you would find it cheaper if not always a convenient way to use money orders for those occasions.

There are regular checking and special checking accounts. Ask a bank official to explain which is better for you.

It is easy enough to keep your checkbook balanced if you form a joint account, however, is not feasible if you want to make sure no one else has access to your account.

If you already are married and you both want to make sure a specific person gets the money if anything happens to the two of you, you can open a joint trust account. Either trustee may make withdrawals. Other savings include E bonds bought on the payroll-deduction plan.

Vernon TAC To Develop 20 Acres into A 'Showcase'
A project scheduled to start in the spring will develop the 20-acre parcel at the Tolland County Agricultural Center into a "conservation showcase."

The Board of Supervisors of the County Soil and Water Conservation District is working with the Board of Trustees of the TAC to get the project underway.

The committee hopes to establish many kinds of plantings, a pond, a wet land wildlife area and a picnic and camping area.

At the same kind, they said, they will be improving conservation activities at the center. The project is scheduled to start as early as possible in the spring.

This Conservation Showcase will then be available to the public as well as schools and nature and civic groups for their information and outdoor studies.

A conservation fund drive was started last July and has gone over the \$400 mark. Contributions may be sent to the TAC building, Rt. 30, Rockville.

In connection with conservation programs, the County Soil and Water Conservation District invites all conservation commissions in the district to inquire for materials available for elementary schools and libraries.

The annual meeting of the Tolland County Soil and Water Conservation District will be held at 8 p.m. on March 20 at the TAC.

"Delivering milk to the home is a peculiar business," according to Clifford H. Kenney, owner and manager of the Dairy Milk Co. of 612 Kenney Ave.

Milkmen make close to \$500 per week. Dairy-Milk is selling more milk than ever to homes. There are more homes in the suburbs.
Yet milkmen are hard to find, the profits are down and a smaller and smaller percentage of home owners want milk delivered.

Dart has been struggling also. He made a milk contract with the Manchester School system which was upset by a recent salesmen and he was able to deal with people, he said.
Milkmen are most welcome during the winter but the milkmen are then closest to their customers.

"This was considered a big plant just 10 years ago," he added.
He said that Hood and Sons bought out West Side Dairy many years ago and had up to 18 trucks in town. About four years ago, Hood closed his local center and began running the routes here from his Hartford plant.

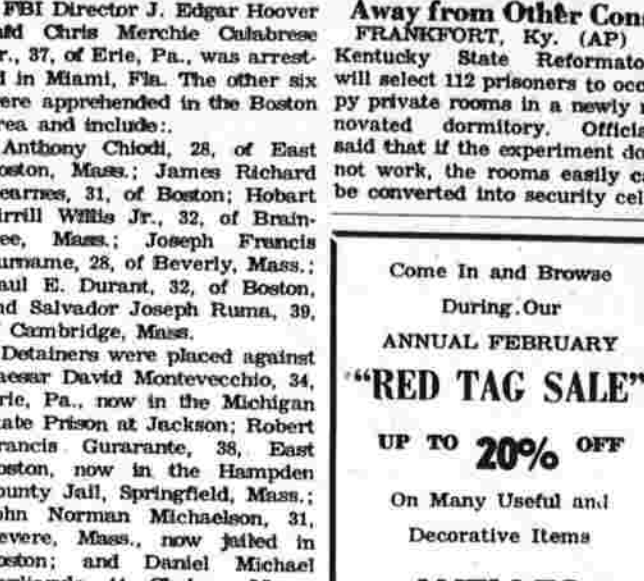

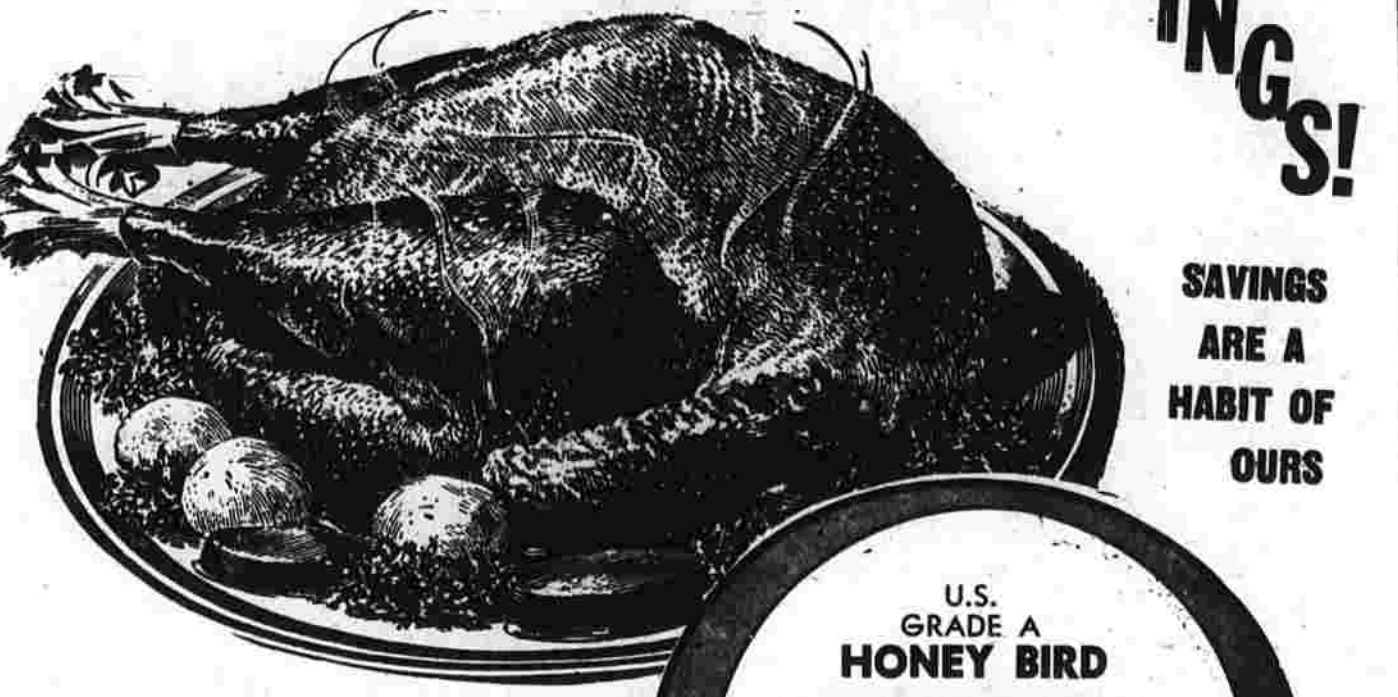

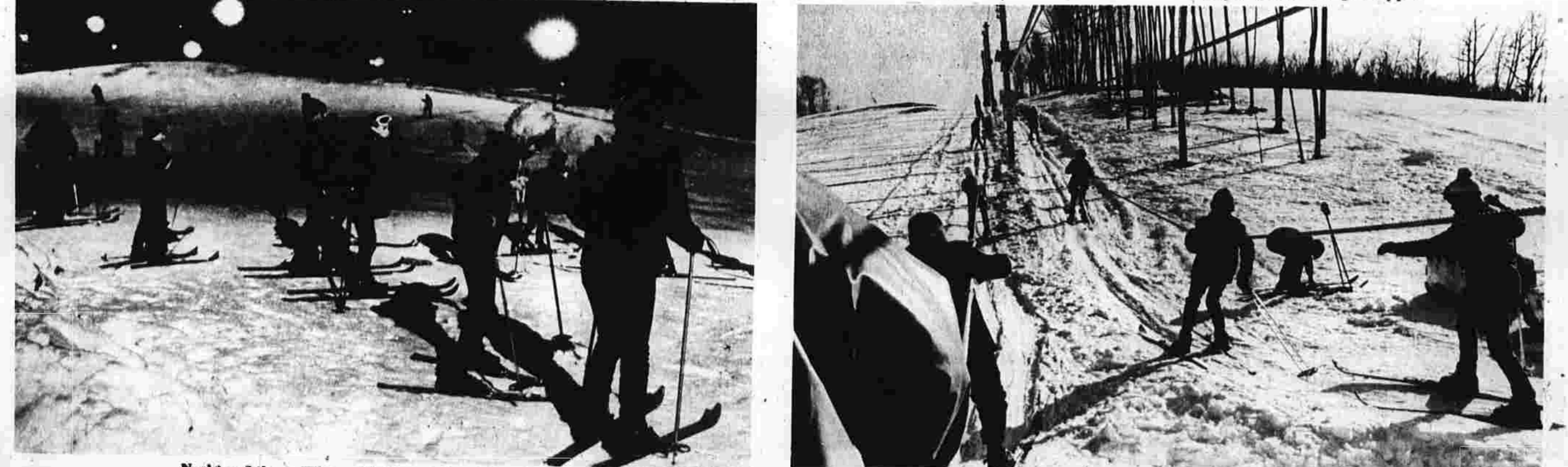

Legislators Question Budget

By BETTE QUATRALE Many area legislators are questioning the governor's proposed budget measure proposals. Although most of the legislators are withholding public statements until they have studied the proposed state budget in greater detail, the first reaction ranges from expressing a need for altering some of the proposed tax measures to the favoring of a state income tax.

The initial reactions did not even mention the budget recommendations prompting the need to raise the taxes. Robert Houley of Vernon, a Democrat, explained his immediate reaction was, "Wow, we've got to change."

Houley expressed concern over the methods of raising the additional funds, predicting the final budget approved by the legislature would be quite different. The state occupies a similar position in the amount of state funds used for education.

State Rep. Robert King, R-Tolland, called for a "legislative review of the budget proposals including the consideration of alternative taxes, including the personal income tax. This would shift more of the burden to the upper income families and the wealthy, he claimed."

King estimated the budget, which represents a 74 per cent increase in new revenue, carries a price tag of \$96 for each Connecticut family.

"The increase alone amounts to \$768 for each Connecticut family," he explained. "The legislature has no choice but to review each new proposed tax and each increase, to try to make the program more equitable so that all classes of Connecticut citizens bear their fair share."

"The Dempsey program will tax fuel oil, electrical and telephone bills, all restaurant meals, purchase and sale of homes, personal services such as television repairs and hair cuts, automobile trade-ins, and income on savings and investments," King pointed out.

"There are but a few which fall most heavily on the lower and middle income wage earners and on the elderly, the retired and those on welfare."

"The overall method of obtaining revenue," according to Houley, "is hitting away hard-out at some who can afford it the least. I'm bothered by this."

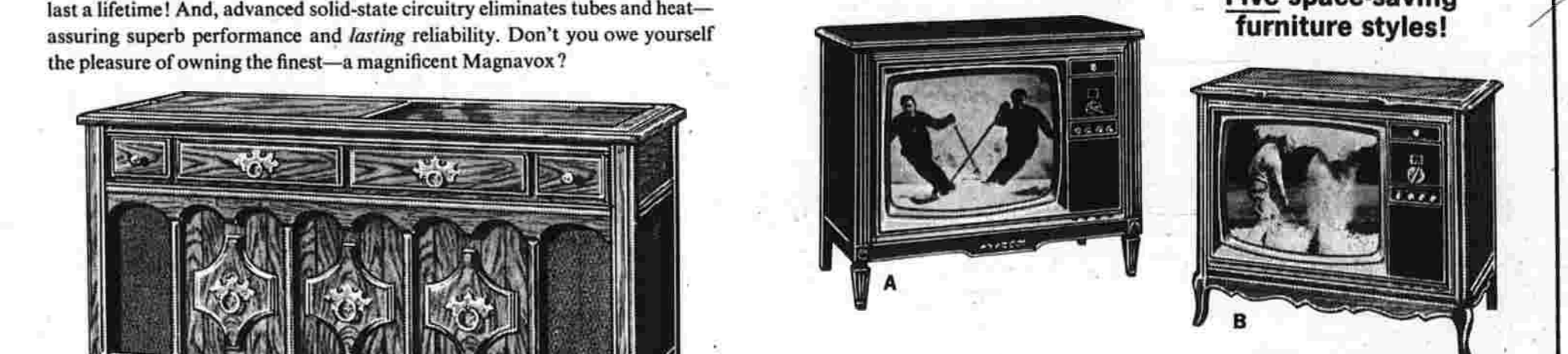

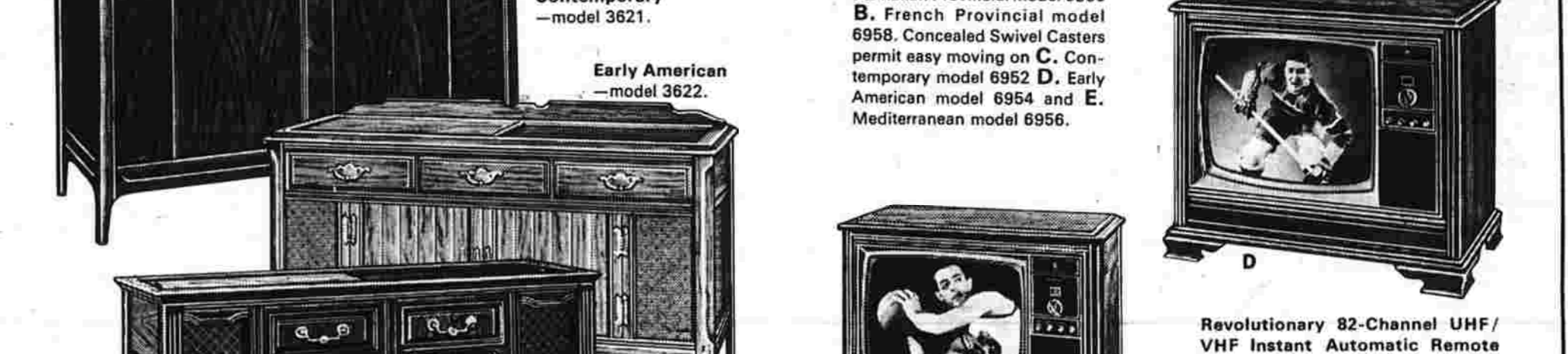

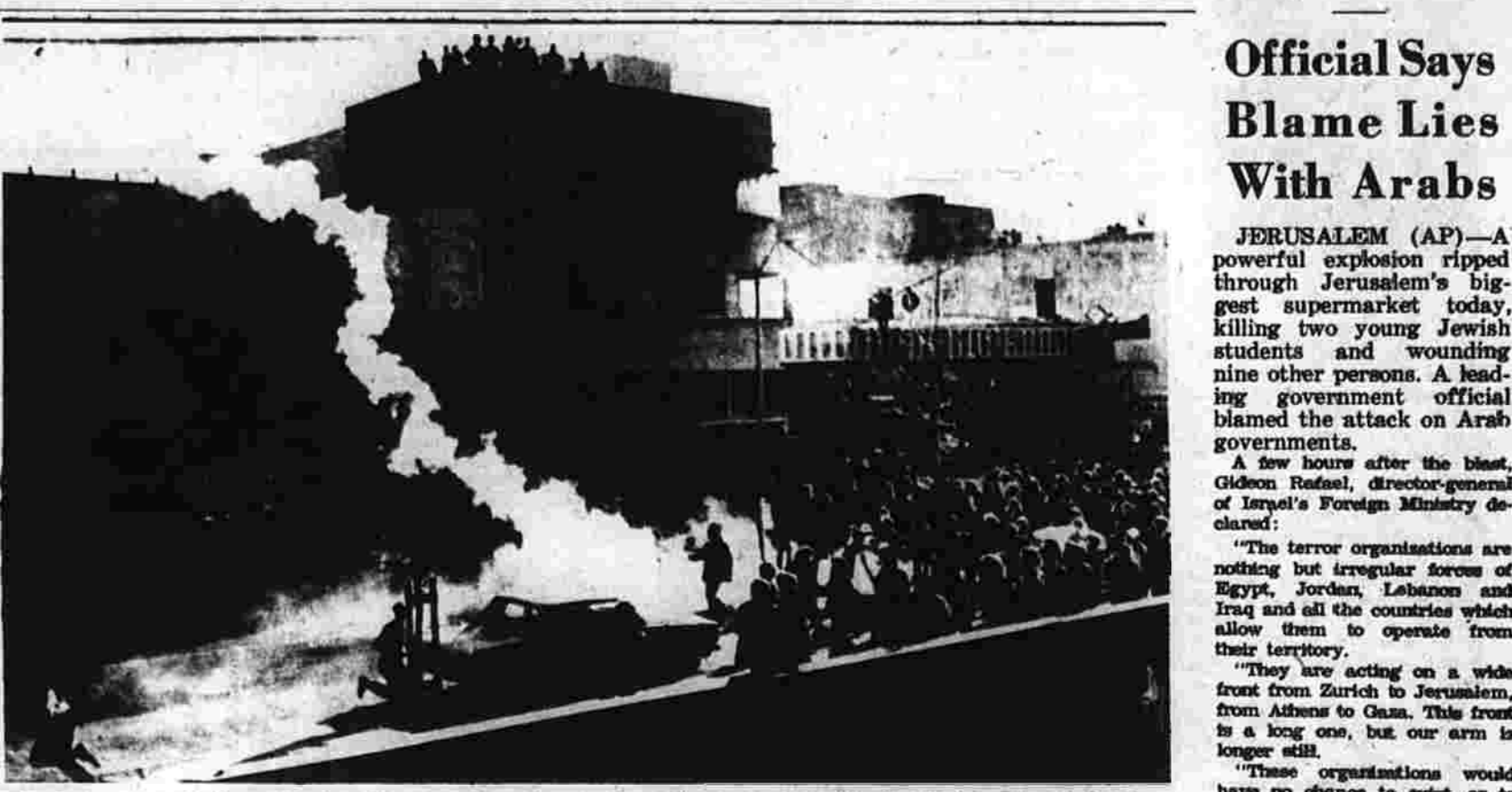
