

# \$1.7 Million School Budget Asked by Brairton—Up 18%

Superintendent of Schools Robert Brairton last night presented the Board of Education with a proposed budget of \$1,714,877, representing an 18.3 per cent increase over last year.

The budget is based on the assumption that everyone remains on their existing contracts. The budget total could run as high as \$1,800,000, Brairton estimated, "if all present professional employees were to be placed on their proper step on the salary schedule requested by the Tolland Education Association."

Teacher salary negotiations are still in the works between the TEA and the school board's negotiating team. It does not appear that agreement will be reached until after the school budget is submitted to the Board of Finance by March 5.

The anticipated 18.3 per cent budget increase compares favorably to the estimated enrollment increase of 23 per cent expected in September.

The school system will have absorbed almost 1,200 students last night reviewing the budget with Brairton. Work on the budget will continue during next week's meeting, slated for Wednesday night.

The budget includes a request for 33 additional teachers and 100 part-time to meet the enrollment increase.

Capital Outlay Plan  
Brairton has reviewed the recommendations of the department heads, cutting many recommendations before preparing the budget for submission to the board.

The board members in turn presented the \$1,714,877 budget to the department heads for their review. This includes insurance lab with sink (\$800) from Meadowbrook's proposed budget.

Deleting salary items from the school budget dramatically illustrates the large percentage of the budget included in that category, amounting to about 80 per cent of the total budget.

Brairton included a section showing non-salary portions of the various accounts which totaled \$476,653 compared to the \$426,000 proposed amount including salaries.

No items yet to be negotiated have been included in the budget, according to the superintendent. This includes insurance adjustments, add-on and other items in addition to salaries.

## Lee 'No Beatnik' She Testifies Oswald Widow on Stand As Shaw Trial Resumes

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A hippie looks like" asked defense attorney F. Riva Dymally.

"Yes," replied Mrs. Porter. "Did you ever see Lee Harvey Oswald looking like a beatnik?" "No, sir," she testified.

### Official Says Blame Lies With Arabs

JERUSALEM (AP)—A powerful explosion ripped through Jerusalem's biggest supermarket today, killing two young Jewish students and wounding nine other persons. A leading government official blamed the attack on Arab governments.

The terror organizations are not being treated as equal partners of the Arabs, he said. "They are acting on a wide front from Zurich to Jerusalem, from Athens to Omsk. This front is a long one, but our arm is longer still."

"These organizations would have no chance in the United States, or even to train without the help of Arab governments who give them the arms they need to operate from their territory."

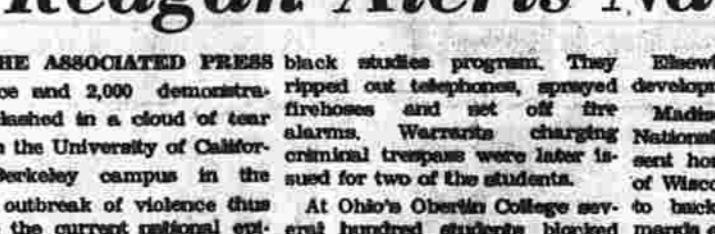
The supermarket market killed two university students and wounded nine others. A major Jewish center was also hit. Police Minister Eilahu Shimon said the "vile attack" was obviously linked to the Arab guerrilla attack Tuesday on an Israeli airliner in Zurich, Switzerland.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Richard M. Nixon apparently will make the ultimate decision on a controversial proposal for construction of a 300,000-barrel-a-day oil refinery in Michigan, Maine.

The White House announced Thursday that Nixon has decided to assume full responsibility for the government's oil supply program, removing it from the hands of Interior Secretary Walter J. Bishop.

## Truman Hospitalized With Intestinal Flu



KANSAS CITY (AP) — President Harry S. Truman was taken to a hospital late Thursday night suffering from what eventually was diagnosed as "a simple gastrointestinal flu caused by a virus."

A spokesman for Research Hospital said that the 67-year-old former chief executive had spent a good night and probably would be released to return home in a few days.

John P. Driven, hospital public relations director, told a news conference that Truman was taken to the hospital in the morning and was admitted to the hospital at 11:40 p.m.

The former president fell asleep after being admitted and was awakened at 4 a.m. today for a routine check of his temperature, pulse, respiration and blood pressure.

Driven said that Truman then fell asleep again and awoke at 8:30 a.m.

"He is on a liquid diet, which is routine for his diagnosed condition," Driven said.

Hospital officials said today's diagnosis of gastrointestinal flu was "just a clarification" of an original diagnosis of gastroenteritis.

## Reagan Alerts National Guard

Police and 2,000 demonstrators clashed in a cloud of tear gas on the University of California Berkeley campus in the worst outbreak of violence thus far in the current national epidemic of student unrest.

When the battle was over Thursday, 26 students and 13 officers were injured and police had arrested 14 youths and a girl. The clash began when police tried to disperse demonstrators who had surrounded the University of California building.

At Oakland's Oberlin College several demonstrators blocked traffic on the main street.

At Berkeley a noon rally led to a clash by the 2,000 demonstrators across the campus and then back to Sproul Plaza where they resorted to police batons to break them up. Then the tear gas hit.

The battle escalated as demonstrators surrounded the main building and blocked traffic.

## Will Seek Re-election Ayub of Pakistan Bows to Pressure

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — President Mohammed Ayub Buto, bowing to months of massive opposition pressure, announced today he is stepping down as president after 11 years.

In a special nationwide radio broadcast, Ayub, now 62, said he will not stand for re-election in the January 1970 elections.

The anti-government movement gained momentum following Bhutto's arrest last Nov. 13 on charges of forcing the Pakistan masses to violence.

Tolland Ambulance Unit To Wait Till July To Buy Vehicle

The Tolland Volunteer Ambulance Association will have to wait until the start of the new fiscal year in July before purchasing a new ambulance to replace the existing vehicle, according to a joint decision of the Board of Finance and the Board of Selectmen.

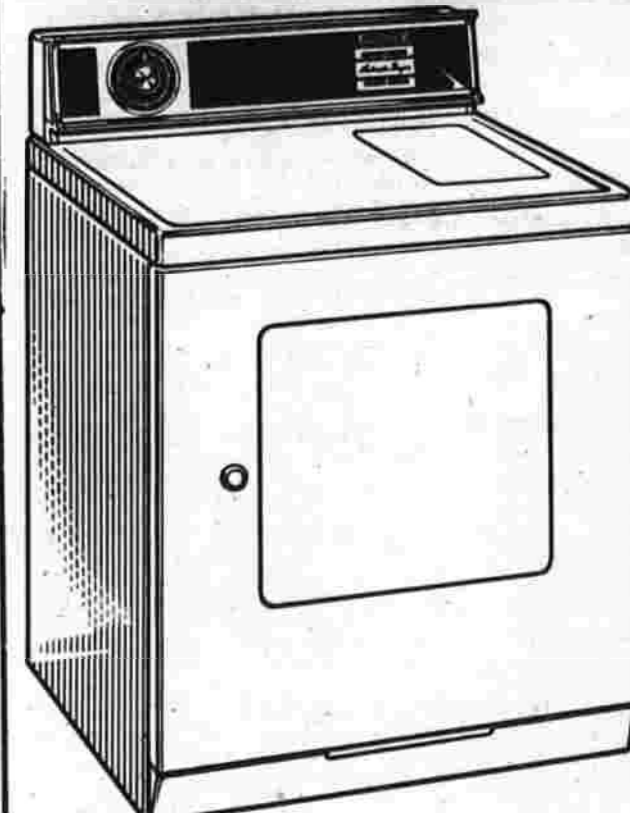

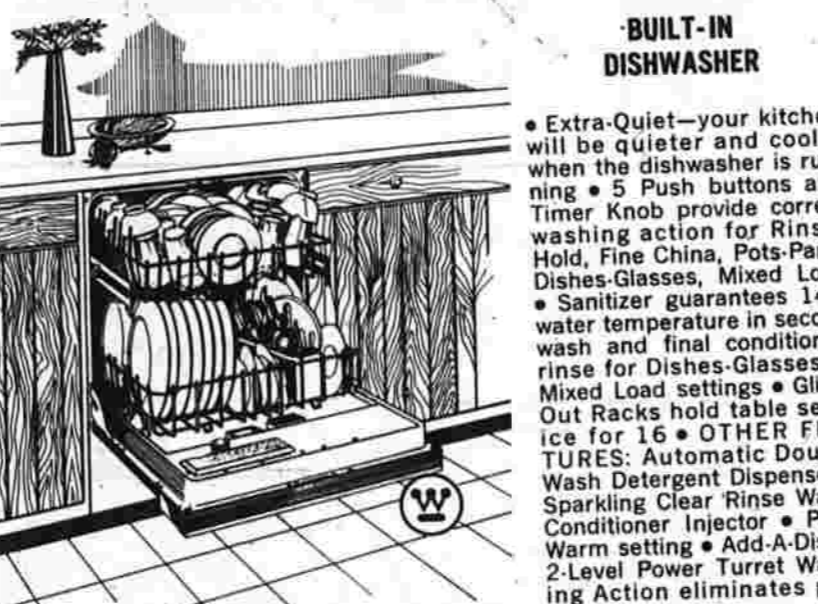

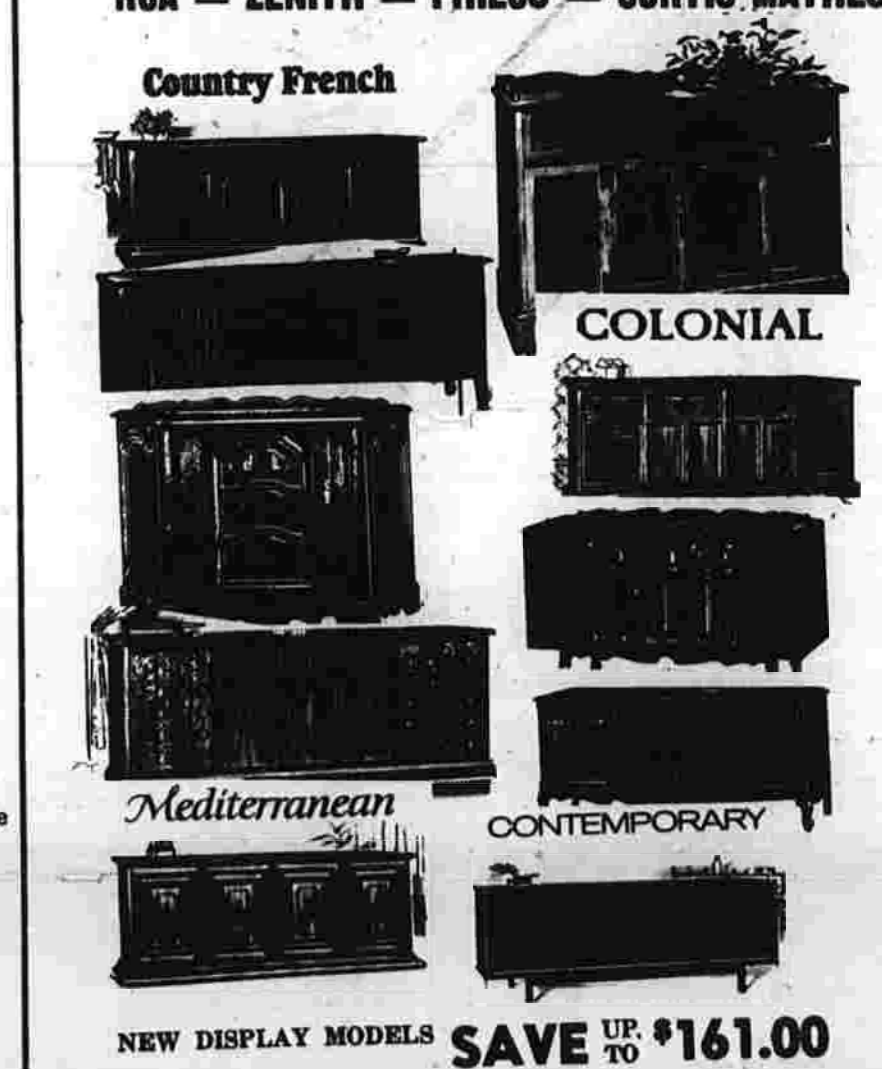

Keeps Vigil While LEM Is 100 Miles Off

Apollo 9 Pilot David Scott Bears Full Brunt of Test

RECTOR'S NOTE—Three astronauts are scheduled to be launched into space on Feb. 21 in another step toward the goal of landing U.S. astronauts on the moon by mid-1969. The Apollo 9 mission, probably the most complex of the manned flights yet, will test the lunar module which eventually will take astronauts to the moon's surface. The following third of three articles tells of Lt. Col. David R. Scott's part in the historic mission.

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — David R. Scott, carrying a burden unlike any man before, will be the life guard on Apollo 9, standing a lonely vigil of safety for his crew mates as they test the untried lunar module.

Scott, a 36-year-old Air Force lieutenant colonel, remains in the command and service module, CSM, as Apollo 9 while Air Force Col. James A. McDivitt and Russell L. Schweickart conduct the lunar module's first test flight up to 100 miles away from the mother ship in a rendezvous maneuver.

Should the lunar module, or LEM, malfunction, the lives of McDivitt and Schweickart will depend on the decisions Scott makes and on how well he is able to perform a complex rescue.

"When we are separated," said McDivitt, speaking of the solo flight of LEM during the mission, "Dave has a lot more responsibility than anyone's probably ever had before. . . . He has to be able to evaluate any critical situation which might arise in his spacecraft and weigh the risk of his life in surviving against the risk of the loss of our lives. . . . He's placed in a position that a lot of people don't really appreciate."

Scott as the command module pilot on Apollo 9, the 10-day space flight scheduled for launch Feb. 21. The mission is in earth orbit, but it's a major stepping stone to the moon because it will verify the design of the lunar module.

Scott's job will be the least spectacular of the Apollo 9 trio. He has no extravehicular activity, or space walk, as does Schweickart. Nor will he transfer to the LEM while it docks with the CSM, as will Schweickart and McDivitt.

But the success of the mission rests very heavily on Scott. His first major job after Apollo 9 is launched into space is to separate the command module from the 848, the third launch booster stage. He'll then fly the CSM out a few feet, turn around and return, nose first, to the booster stage.

Nestled in the end of the 848 is the LEM. Scott's job is to pop a probe on the nose of his command module into a 30-inch

### Columbia Legislative Hearing Tuesday On Rescinding Rt. 87 Bill

Arrangements have been made to avoid parking problems by taking a group in a taxibus to the hearing on Tuesday at the State Capitol building.

The hearing will be held at 10 a.m. on Tuesday at the State Capitol building. The bill passed in 1967 to construct a four-lane highway through town.

The town had asked the state to correct the dangerous curve at the dam and was allocated some \$600,000 for the modification of the highway. The town which mushroomed into the proposed construction of an entirely unimproved four-lane highway through town.

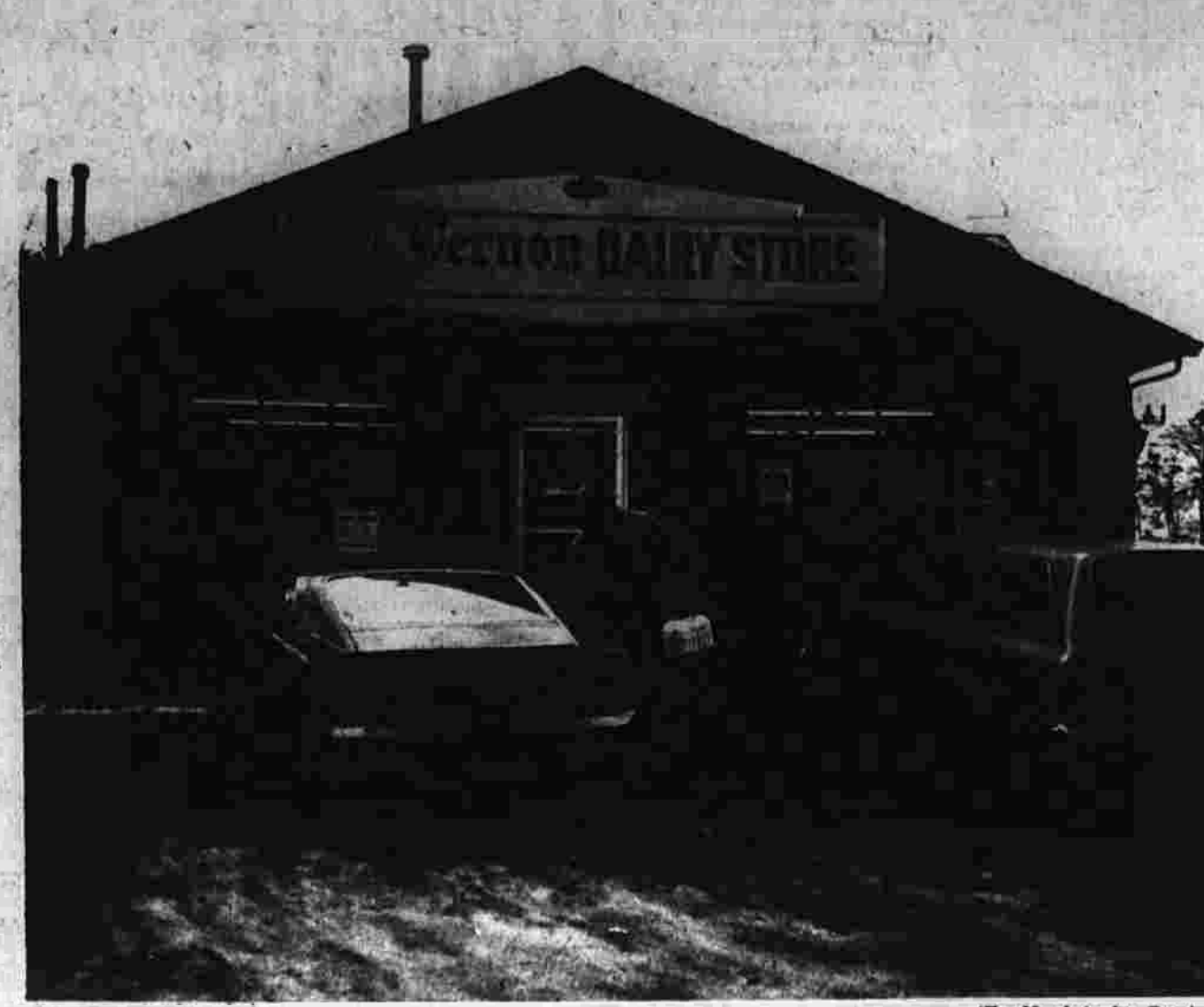

Special Tax Breaks For Senior Citizens

WASHINGTON (AP) — Elderly persons have a quite a different bag of income tax problems from those of younger people, but their age also entitles any age, not just for those over 65.
The rule allows a surviving spouse to exclude from taxable income up to \$1,000 a year received as interest on life insurance proceeds taken in installments instead of as a lump sum.
For instance, the company might offer the option of collecting the face value of a \$50,000 policy all at once or in 10 annual installments of \$5,000. The \$500 would be interest and, so long as it was going to a surviving spouse, nontaxable. Of course the \$5,000 would also be nontaxable.

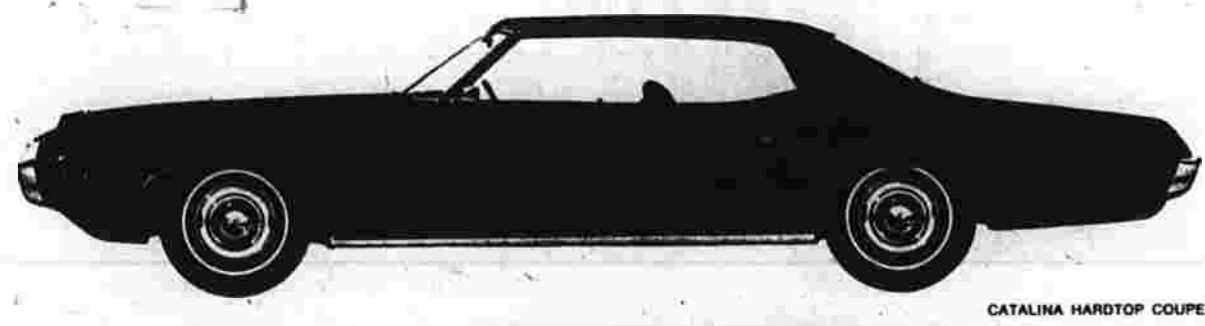

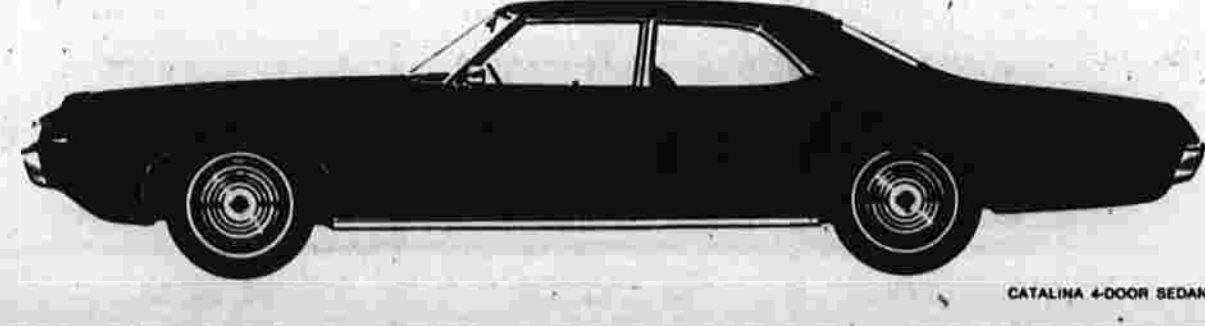

The three selectmen voted unanimously to send a letter thanking the town crew for doing such an outstanding job of snow removal, and also a similar letter to the State Highway Department.

### Defense Department Spends \$4 Million on 339 Lobbyists

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department is spending \$4 million a year on a lobbying force of 339—more than one for every two members of Congress—to keep the congressmen happy, says the armed forces.

James F. Lawrence, deputy assistant to the secretary of defense for legislative affairs, said each service—Army, Air Force and Navy and Marine Corps—has its own legislative organization, but they work under the general supervision of a Pentagon lawyer, Jack Stempier, assistant to the secretary of defense for legislative affairs.

The average number of persons working on legislative activities, according to the Pentagon's appropriation requests for fiscal 1970, are 140 military and 190 civilian at a total cost, principally pay and allowances of \$1,134,811 a year.

They work in liaison with individual members, with committees considering appropriations and with committees involved in investigations.

There are also some job classes for the services, a private interest group, rather than for defense policy. But, Pentagon officials say, this was more common in the past.

And, says one official, "When a service tries an end run to try to get around an official decision," it is done at a much higher level, usually, maybe at a dinner party."

### Soviet Defense Spending Said Nearly Double NATO's

LONDON (AP)—The British government said today that the Soviet Bloc nations are spending proportionately nearly twice as much on defense as the nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

In a white paper on defense policy presented to Parliament, the government said that Britain still maintains troops in some 50 countries throughout the world, although it is continuing to pull out of Malaya and Singapore, and the withdrawal of its 7,000-man force from the Persian Gulf is tentatively set for 1971.

The white paper noted that the Soviet Bloc nations are spending more than 30,000 million dollars on defense, a decrease of 122 million under the 1968-69 budget.

The report said 260,000 men are currently stationed in the United Kingdom, 60,000 are in Continental Europe, 115,000 in the Mediterranean and Near East, 31,500 in the Middle and Far East and 27,000 in other areas of the world.

The government said the cost of maintaining the British contingent which may arise from the NATO nuclear force during the next fiscal year will be about \$164 million in Eastern Europe and the Ion.

**Black Students Take Over Room At Wesleyan U**

MIDDLETOWN, Conn. (AP)—A group of black students barricaded themselves inside a classroom building at Wesleyan University early today. School officials later announced that there would be no classes held in the building.

Between 30 and 50 black students entered Flak Hall about 4:30 a.m. in connection with their demand that the college observe the anniversary of the 1968 assassination of Black Muslim leader, Malcolm X by calling off classes.

About 4 p.m. a statement by Wesleyan President Edwin D. Birmingham was read on the steps of Flak Hall. It said Flak Hall classes for the day were cancelled and urged other students to cooperate in avoiding any confrontation that might lead to violence.

Members of the Wesleyan Security Force had voted 60-47 Thursday not to leave the black students' request to cancel classes at a university spokesman said. There is a total of about 12

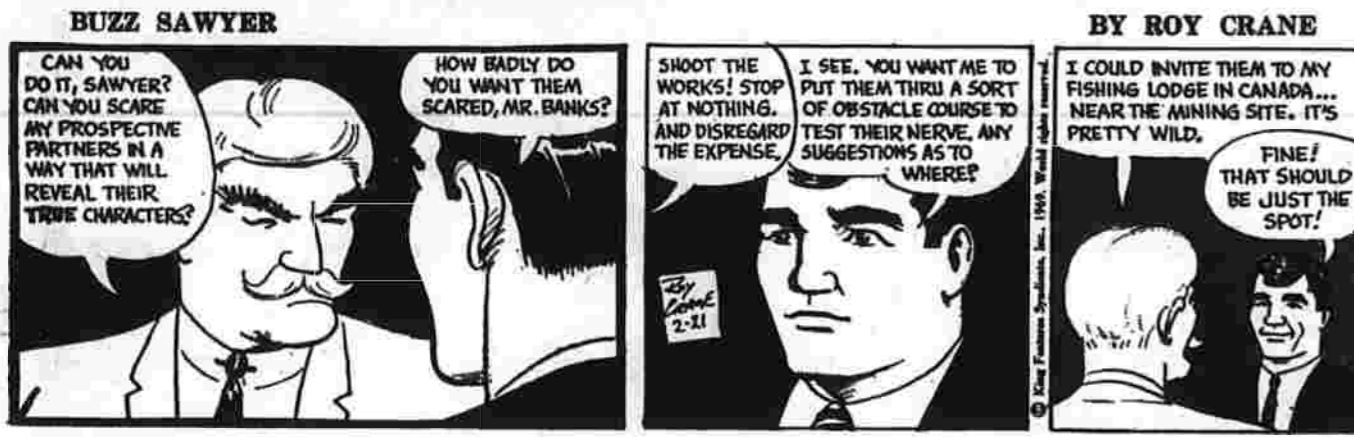
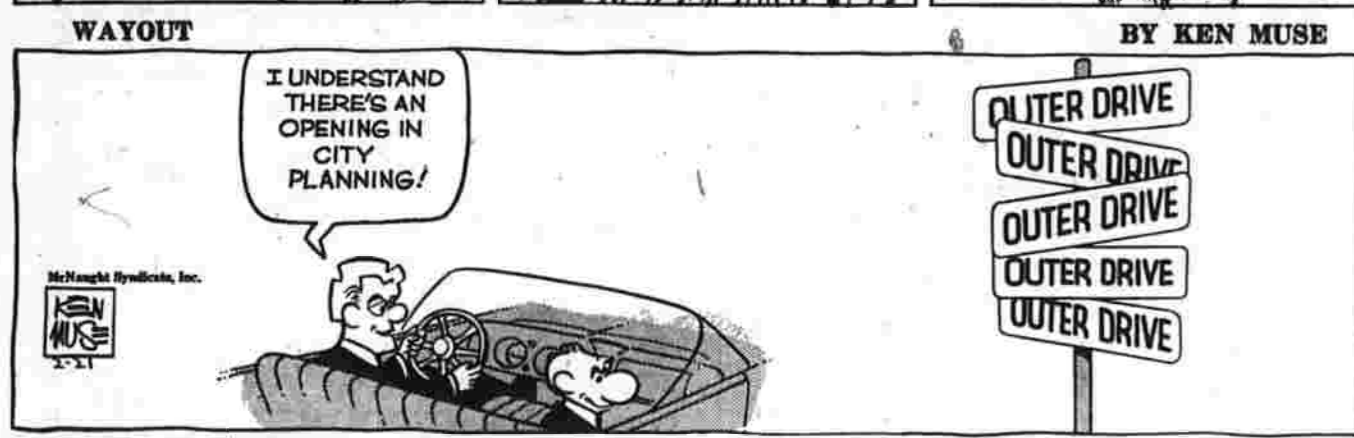

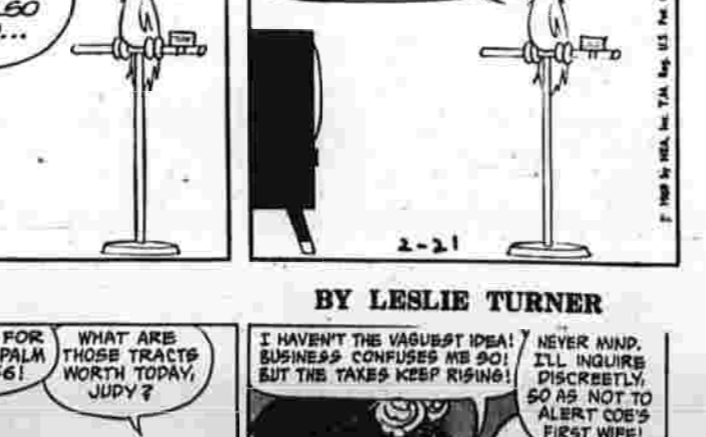
