



Talk With No Hands?

The investigators of human behavior are now on the trail of those portions of a conversation which are not vocal What they are discovering is nothing more than any good novelist has always known and often reported. But, by giving it the cold prominence and authority of a scientific research finding, they are forcing us all to try to remember watch - not our tongues particularly but those other instruments of commu nication, sometimes unintended, which are also part of our conversations. It means something, these busybodies

are now proclaiming, if, in the midst of a conversation, we shift our eyes to or from the speaker. To cross or uncross one's legs in the midst of a sentence - your own or somebody else's sentence - may be a gesture full of meaning. We can't lean forward, or backward in our chair, any more with out being conscious of the possibility we may be saying something by our movement - something we may not intend to say - or something the hearer-watcher opposite us may find more important than the mere words which are crossing lips.

The net effect of such findings is to

deprive the ordinary conversationalist of all those once semi-private adjustments by which he could bridge over some loss for words, or evade the final encircling mastery of some argument being directed toward him. The individual who has always found himself awkward graceful with a cigaret, now has to calculate that the gesture will betray him as quickly as an ill-chosen word. And that super ego who fancied himself strong and silent because he could sit for hours on end without loosing his tongue will have to check on the possible twiddling of his thumbs, the hunching of his shoulder, the twitch-quiver under an eye, the draw of his mouth. or the wrinkling of his nose, before he is sure he isn't, even with his tongue clenched, babbling and communicating all over the place, like any weakling

We can't, for the life of us, imagine how such research and codification of the behavioral accompaniments of conversation is going to help anybody, or make life pleasant or better for any body. To the contrary, it seems merely one more restriction of that dwindling area in which we still, we human beings, have some small chance of h having naturally. Some of us won't be able to talk at all, if we can't have some auxiliary use of our hands.

Why We Need A Coroner # One of the upcoming legislative "re forms," it is reported, will be to shoot down the office of the coroner. We've congratulated ourselves on get ting rid of county government. Why then keep a coroner, originally a county officer? His work, they will tell you, is performed by medical examiners and iospital pathologists, policemen and

All this has a plausible ring to it, if you have no idea at all what a coroner is for in the first place. He doesn't find any citizen guilty or innocent of having turned some unoffending other citizen ito corpus delicti But he, and he alone, is charged with making a thorough inquiry into every pertinent circumstance related to a violent or suspicious death, and, what is

equally important, of making his find ings public in every case. At a time when the inquiries made by courts are being made more and more secretive, and kept from the public eye as a matter of policy, we need the protection of the coroner whose report of inquiry becomes, on filing, a public record accessible to any citizen. Our colonial forebears also had courts They nevertheless centered responsibility for inquiry into violent and suspicious demise in a coroner, and insisted tat his findings be public. They believed this to be a good guarantee that no unsuspect ing citizen would be quietly done in from any motive and borne to his grave with-



Jupiter is an intriguing plan et. Because of its great size and intense gravitational field, in its atmosphere must still remain the primeval materials of which the solar system was fashioned. Thus, a sampling of this material would have tremendous impact on our ideas concerning the origin of the solar system and of life itself. These facets of the mission excite the scientists.

Orbiting Jupiter and retrieving information is one of the most difficult tasks scientists face today. One reason is that the trip time is so long: Approximately 825 days from earth, according to the university professors. Once there, the probe will orbit the planet for 100 days to collect scientific data. This means that the spacecraft components must possess a threeyear reliability - far beyond what is currently expected of them. This, coupled with the problem of a strong planetary radiation field, means that extraordinary care must be exercised in the preparation for this
