





On a trip which, despite his pronounced intentions, is inevitably proving more ceremonial than "working," President Nixon is required to produce a normal quota of platitudes. He seeks to build a pleasant feeling of togetherness rather than get into the hard realities over which men and nations so often

On such a mission, under such diplomatic restraints, a leader cannot always indulge the luxury of the com? plete truth.

And at Brussels, talking to members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization about alliances, President Nixon had to be pardoned if he happened to apply the Pollyanna touch to his discussion of what an alliance happens to be, any-

"An alliance," said President Nixon, "is not the temporary pooling of selfish interests; it is a continuing process of

In such a statement, the President obviously commits no great sin. But he could not be more wrong in what he savs. What he says an alliance is not is

precisely what an alliance is - and the only thing any alliance ever really isa temporary pooling of selfish in-

Nobody in history has ever managed to raise an alliance above such a level

When nations find that their original stake of self interest in an alliance has diminished, they either get out of it or cease fulfilling their own obligations to . This has, from the American and British point of view, been the way the French under de Gaulle have been behaving toward NATO. But it was also to the French or British, the way the United States' behaved toward NATO during the period when we found it in our own self interest to draw upon some of our NATO resources for our own emergency in Vietnam.
