Copter Haylift Providing Feed To Wild Horses

MINDEN, Nev. (AP)—A helicopter haylift has gone into action in an effort to save a herd of Nevada's dwindling wild horses, manacled without food on a wind-swept ridge east of Lake Tahoe.

"We fed everything we could see, about 35 Mustangs," said pilot Byron Clark after the first flight Wednesday.

"We were on a tight schedule and kept moving. But we'll go back Thursday and see if they can't get down right now," Clark said.

A sheriff's posse and sportsmen's club got together with helicopter service owner Ed Counts to provide the haylift by helicopter at a cost of \$170 per flying hour.

Counts estimated there were 40 to 50 wild Mustangs scattered along a 26-mile ridge on the 1,000-foot Pine Mt. mountain.

"They're up to their necks in snow. They haven't got any feed and they're down to skin and bone," he said.

Only a few tufts of grass to eat. The posse, sportsmen and helicopter service will try to break a boom's slaver in the trail for the Mustangs to walk down, but the haylift was organized when it appeared they might starve first.

State law protects the wild horses, once hunted by air and ground vehicles for dog food. It's against the law now to hunt Mustangs in Nevada from a vehicle.

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Independent Study Reveals Racial Divisions in U.S. Remain Largely Unheeded

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Kermer Commission's warning of an American society sharply divided by race largely unheeded one year later, an independent follow-up study has concluded today.

The study, which was conducted by the Urban League, Inc., and the Urban Coalition, nonprofit Washington organizations dedicated to the study of race relations, found that the nation is not moving toward a more integrated society, and that racial divisions remain largely unheeded.

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Asphyxiation Deaths Led To GM's Recall Campaign

DETROIT (AP)—The deaths of four persons by asphyxiation in their cars led to a General Motors recall of 2.4 million vehicles—part of the largest recall in auto history—by a corporation spokesman said Wednesday.

Owners were asked to return the cars for correction of faults which could lead to asphyxiation of the driver or passenger.

At the same time, another 2.5 million GM cars sent to dealers were recalled for correction of a plastic cover on the dashboard.

Just making the notification to the 4.9 million affected customers will cost about \$2 million, GM said.

The exhaust problem first came to light when Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hunt and their three children, three boys, were found dead in their 1968 Chevrolet Impala near Heber City, Utah, last July. Several days later, Mrs. Charles Dunaway, whose car was found asphyxiated in a 1968 Chevrolet near Baton Rouge, La.

A spokesman said GM investigators discovered the fault came from a defective plastic cover on the dashboard. The cover, which is made of a brittle plastic, could crack and cause excessive damage to the exhaust system, GM said.

But in the case involving Mrs. Dunaway, exhaust fumes apparently leaked from a rusty tail pipe through one of several openings in the trunk of the car and then into the passenger compartment, he said.

A spokesman said no litigation currently is pending in either of the two deaths, although two suits have been filed in two of about 50 complaints of asphyxiation and drowsiness, allegedly as a result of exhaust fumes.

The spokesman said there had been 46 complaints of failure of a plastic cover on the dashboard and cars going out of control. One minor accident has been reported as a result of such failure, the firm said.

"The very few cases of possible defects which prompted the recall decision are clearly exceptional," GM said, "but the General Motors concern for safety and the good of our customers is not an exception."

The recall campaign covers Chevrolets of Blaine, Bel Air, Impala, and Caprice models from 1968 through 1969 for correction of possible exhaust fume leakage, and 1968 and 1969

The universal relief came the next day when the astronauts, and their earth monitors, reported that their coold was history.

The difference between the two light moments was that, although one was more dramatic than the other, we have on earth actually had more confidence in the mechanism we had built for the journey than we did in the ability of the astronauts to deal with the effects of a cold, if they really had one up there in space.

The same difference has now been in the news again. All of the problems of Apollo 9 seem easier to solve than the problem of a possible case of "mild sore throat and nasal congestion" among the Astronauts.

That is one more thing we can't do, even though we have learned to go to the moon—prevent the common cold. We have, of course, a few other responsibilities. We can't handle some snow storms. We can't save oem cars. We can't clean up our own mess.

Those who like to calculate that every problem is vulnerable, big and small, to the continued, relentless assault of great scientific and technological progress, have taken the billions spent so far in our space programs and devoted them to the cold, to the weather, to the elms, and to the development of a "kubla la" motor, we would now be in possession of snow.

But it would just as well be that we would still have all these problems still unsolved, and no moon, either.

No Truce In The Field

There are some Americans who, when peace talks finally get themselves going at Paris, would have considered it appropriate and ideal American policy if we had moved to cut down our own military activity in Vietnam.

The theory would have been that if we stopped looking for fighting to do, stopped reaching for better military position, perhaps that might contribute to a lessening of conflict which might, in time, dwindle down into such a truce as any warfare involving guerrillas is likely to reach before it ends.

This theory did not sell itself to either administration in the White House. Outside our military, the very existence of the bombing of North Vietnam, we have not desecrated the war. To the contrary, for a long time we made sure we dropped our much bomb tonnage as before, although on smaller, more restricted areas. And, instead of sitting still wherever we were and seeing whether the war would detangle, we organized various military moves into areas which we had hitherto neglected because they were more or less considered to be solid Vietcong territory.

In the White House, one would suppose, the theory in back of this incoherence upon a continued military initiative in Vietnam was that we needed to do it in order to keep our bargaining position at Paris strong. And among our military, the very existing theory was that we might be on the verge of giving the enemy in all Vietnam such a clear final knockout blow that we would, after all, be able to claim the very thing we had supposedly abandoned all hope for — a military victory in the war.

In any case, the story of our military activity in Vietnam during the truce talk period has been one of major force probing into new areas and continued search and destroy tactics.

This being what we ourselves have done, there is obviously little real merit, not even propaganda advantage, for that matter, in complaining when the Vietcong and the North Vietnamese understand and use our military activity in some of our established bases, when they prove that they can still infiltrate and carry on guerrilla tactics almost anywhere they please.

The enemy would apparently be violating some kind of pre-negotiation understanding with us if any direct attack should be launched on our bases. There has been nothing like that in news to date — merely our own continued prediction that the enemy might be about to try to launch such an attack.

Otherwise, each of us has been trying to strengthen his position at the conference table. The military has been trying to demonstrate that he is still willing and able to seek a purely military decision in the battle-field.

It will be better when we both give up that idea, and get down to the theory that, the strongest position at Paris will eventually turn out to be that position which is more directly toward the kind of military settlement which has to come, sooner or later. Some had hoped the United States might be first, in that department, by this time, with its behavior in the field demonstrating its sincerity. Now it seems a business of waiting for both sides to come to the same conclusion, and the same kind of behavior, about the same time.

First Inning

The visiting correspondent from another planet, who had turned up at the time of the Presidential election, responded that he might want to know about taking politics as soon as he had finished his story with a gun chaser. The Kilpatrick treatise took a narrow view of the degradation of Dr. James Watson on Christmas, and a more darkly reported that "Pat Moyihan's affable rise like a moon over urban affairs."

The greatest light moment came, as everyone expected, when our astronauts, hidden behind the moon, sent out their first words to their earth, were called upon to press the button which determined whether they were going to be able to break out of their orbit and head back toward earth. When they emerged, from behind the moon, on the right track, the high of relief was ecstatic.

Before that, however, and much earlier in the moon journey, there had come another crisis, this one unexpected, followed by another universal sigh of relief. This light moment came when it was first reported that something similar to the Hong Kong fire which raged down here on earth had apparently found its way into the Apollo space

Electoral College Best Method, Professor Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Yale University law professor contends that the Electoral College method of choosing a president gives the large urban states the advantage they need to offset the small state domination of Congress.

The winner-take-all provisions among state delegations, Alexander M. Bickel explained, force a presidential candidate to concentrate on the large urban centers, whereas control of Congress is largely by the less populous states.

In short, Bickel said, the venerable system now used "builds into the president an incentive to be a counterweight to Congress and, thus, a particular spokesman for urban and minority groups."

Therefore, Bickel said, the present system provides the best method of choosing a president.

Bickel made his presentation Thursday in testimony before an electoral reform hearing of the House Judiciary Committee.

"Specifically, we object to two sections in the bill which we can speak with a considerable degree of knowledge—the tax on sales of magazines and newspapers, and the tax on advertising of all kinds."

Feel edgy and melancholy when it rains? Forget it. So does everybody else.

Psychiatrists say any major change in a weather pattern—particularly a stage of cold weather—may evoke feelings of anxiety and uneasiness.

The key word is "melancholy"—a word of change—and we all have some of it in us.

To some degree we all have a love of tradition," explains Dr. Charles Wahl, a psychiatrist at the University of California at Los Angeles Neuropsychiatric Institute.

Hoselstein, he said, can be particularly evident in achievement children, who can be frightened when furniture is moved or when they have to change clothes.

Thus since there is a little of this in everybody, it can surface when a geographic region accustomed to sunshine is subjected to day after day of rain.

In the dawn of time, man has shown fright when nature does something different (eclipses, blue moons). And, say psychiatrists, who is to say that some of this isn't still in the closets of our minds?

Dr. Wahl points out that present society speaks of weather as being "fickle"—a word which implies something beautiful or equitable.

And we say that someone has a "sunny disposition."

Conversely, we designate rainy weather as "bad" or the implication being one of evil or pessimism.

Psychiatrists point out that, according to the Bible, one of man's great punishments was by means of a flood.

In mythology, when the forces of nature were personified, thunder was thought to have resulted when the god Thor became angry.

Thus there are primitive roots for our reactions to unusual weather. Dr. Wahl, for one, says it has been his clinical observation that prolonged rain tends to activate feelings of foreboding and dread, to stir ancient fears.

The more immature a person, the more extensive the effect is likely to be.

Under certain weather conditions, some civilizations even make allowances for malicious behavior. In Bavaria, when the warm foehn winds come whirling through the mountains, crimes of violence are sometimes excused. The same is sometimes true during the monsoon season in India.

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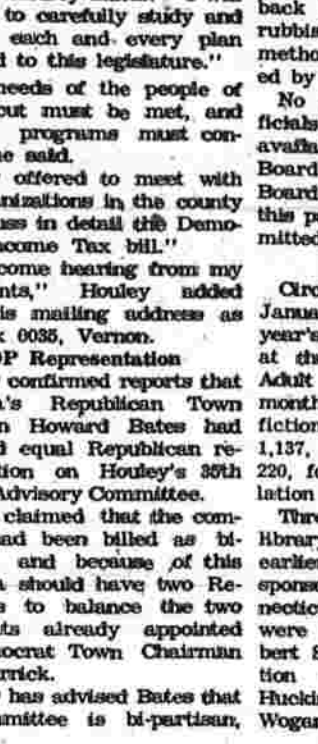
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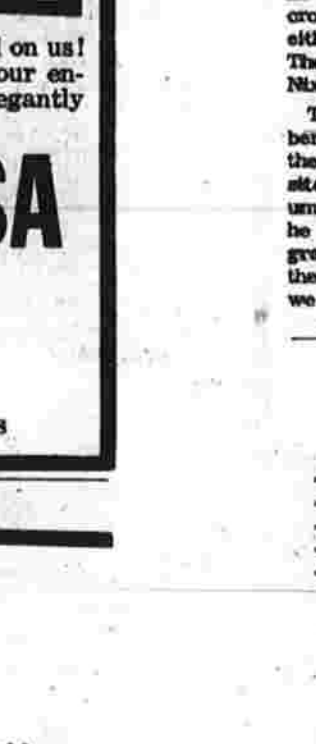
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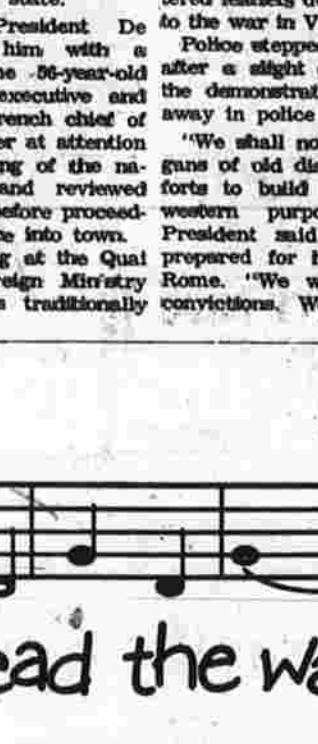
