The story of Europe, and of America in and with Europe is not, in any realistic analysis, one of post-war optimism and success. It is one of failure because Europe is still divided, and beause no peace has yet been made for a war that ended 24 years ago. To say that the policies which have to be added up to this result have everybody's renewed loyalty, and are now reinforced by new trust, would be an optimistic way of saying there is no real hope for real progress and solution. The Pres dent has not yet said this; he has merely sounded as if he might be thinking it. Many of his actual words have indicated that he thinks things must go forward beyond their past planning their present status. But for any such real and hopeful break with the dead end policies he has inherited, some action, beyond atmospheric words, must now be awalited, patiently, realizing action is going to take much more time.

We notice, with interest, that a law professor out at Stanford University ninks there ought to be a law which would recompense people and owners of property for the damage that is going to be done if we ever get into the age of the supersonic plane.

This is what we would like to see civilization reject, in order that it might to back to some concern for people, and. if not for sparing them the ordeals of life under supersonics, at least for recompensing them for the celculable injuries done them by the expersonics

Once we could get this principle firmly adopted and applied to the future potential operation of the supersonic, plane, we might then be able to turn around and get it ruled appropriate and litting for some of the other instances in which the rights of people are considered proper sacrifices to the march of things which may or may not be public necessities. We think, for instance, of those residence or business properties which happen to be located on the particular side of the street where some traffic authority suddenly decides to ban parking. Why should they be forever without compensation for the damage done their convenience and their property values? And what about the grime ordinary traffic, which doesn't even leave the ground, deposits on the paint and finish, inside and out, of every megalopolis home? And is the sonic boom any wonse than the midnight screech of beenage tires?

Mass Increase In State Taxes

The fact that a heavier tax burder was the unmistakable and unavoidable fate of the Connecticut taxpayor this session does little to soften the staghis budget message Tues

The Governor seeks to embark on \$2.5 billion total borrowing and spending program in thes next blennium which hatters all previous records in a grand manner. In the General Fund category, he is calling upon the taxpayer to provide \$666.2 million in tax revenues over and beyond the current output. To carry out the demand, Governor Dempsey proposing an unprecedented, mass-scal ncrease in the State's tax structure. The across-the-board character of the Governor's tax increase recommendatons permits escape for no one-and rather, introduces a whole range of new taxables for the State's all-purpose sales and use tax, to be raised to five pe cent. Home heating fuel, restauran meals under \$1 and many categories of non-professional services are among the new classes subject to the sales tax.

The far-reaching tax proposals are likely to have one side effect which could be beneficial: Teaching the taxpayer in a painfully direct way just how much his State government is costing him. The impact would be felt each time a utility bill was paid, an insur ance premium payment met, laundry or dry cleaning charges paid, or with any of the many everyday transaction which would now come under a State

With considerably more optimism than we could ever summon in the altuation, Governor Dempsey terms his tax in crease proposals "temporary" measures which would be terminated at the end of the next biennium in 1971. The Gover nor recommends the appointment of a "Revenue Task Force" to study the State's tax resources and hopefully t evolve an entirely new taxing program for the next legislature's consideration The whole approach to governmen oudgets, it seems, is much too one-sided n that all the analyzing and researching is energetically directed toward dis-covering new or additional revenue ources. The idea that government programs and services might stand a fullscale review with an eye to reducing the fat, weeding out the deadwood and eliminating waste, doesn't seem to get even a footbold on official minds. The Governor might consider the ap-pointment of an Economy Task Force o determine whether government spending isn't getting out of hand and jus where it can be reduced or curtailed. The General Assembly has no mea assignment before it, one which calls or politics to be laid aside for the more mperative goal of the public's interest and welfare. No item of this budget should be, accepted without question. No agency program should be funded without some review of its essential charac ter and purposes. The point must be neached where the taxpayer's interests must be preserved-and it must be remembered that it is to the taxpayer and voter that the Governor and the egisistors are answerable, - NEW HA VEN REGISTER


