Lawless Adults

Because the Taylor Law hasn't operated, yet to keep public employees from striking, Governor Rockefeller and legislative leaders at Albany have agreed to make certain changes in the law.

They have agreed to make the penalties against public employes unless and their members, if they strike, more severe.

They would like to put it in the law that a public employe who goes on strike in violation of the Taylor Law can be penalized for a day for every day or half or even for two days for every day out on strike.

They would like to put it in the law that the union which violated the Taylor Law could be punished by having its dues checkoff privilege suspended indefinitely.

The question is, of course, whether such severe penalties will work, to prevent public employes and their members from striking, any law as it now stands.

The trouble has been that the courts, often with the forgiving understanding of the executive and administrative branches of government too—have been very gentle in using the power at their disposal.

Increasing its penalties alone, then, is not going to increase the amount of respect given the Taylor Law by either public employes or the courts.

And a realistic view has to be that a Taylor Law which is not going to be enforced so that it is respected is worse than no such law at all.

We wish no such law were necessary. We wish public employes in crucial fields and enough of a sense of obligation to their profession and to the public to make the writing of any such legislation seem unnecessary.

Apparently, we no longer have that kind of professional public employe. Apparently, we need a Taylor Law. Then, if we need it, we also need its enforcement, in a manner which does not allow anybody to treat its penalties, wherever they are set, as if they were some kind of pleasant joke, and never for real.

There is another angle to the Taylor Law issue, almost as important as the law's main business, which has, so far, been with the school teachers of New York City.

If today's American society is not going to be able to bring its adult citizens of responsible age and status and function, into an attitude of respect for the law as it has been written, and if today's American society is not going to enforce its law against adults who are not merely examples to the young, but also in charge of instructing the young, then this same society is never going to get very far with its attempt to produce a law and order discipline among its youth.

Millions of New York City's school children were given a very pointed lesson, last fall, to the effect that the law is a joke. The lesson was given to them by the adults who were their teachers.

The real hope has to be that the Taylor Law works better in the future not because it contains increased penalties, or because the courts develop more courage in dealing with public employes unless, but because some of our adults think more seriously about the kind of world they want our youth to be growing up in.

Finally, there comes the sticky part. It needs no reiteration here that society believes that society should not be disrupted. All universities have had to deal with this equation as it has presented itself. But we believe that the difference between a blind response and an understanding response is fundamental. Does this mean that we would applaud the proposal for a new morality that would strip citizens? No. But we would temper the absolute with the memory that it wasn't so long ago that many people reacted frantically to human counts in the South. Could it be true that people understand lunch, but are threatened by symbols? —MIDDLETOWN PRESS

Their Money's Worth

The 5,000 spectators who paid their admissions for the drag strip race down in Okefenokee, Georgia, Sunday, finally got their money's worth.

Some of them—the 11 spectators killed immediately, the 50 or so injured—got a little more than their money's worth.

But when one of the drivers in the racing lost control of his car, and a terrible accident ensued, then the great majority of those in attendance headed exactly the kind of thing they had been paying their money to have a chance to see.

It so happened that, in this instance, the driver who was professionally risking his life came out unharmed, and that spectators who were merely supposed to thrill to the possibility of a driver's loss of life lost their own lives instead.

It was, of course, a horrible tragedy, such a split second taking of 20 many spectator lives.

But the record ought to keep it clear when the real tragedy began.

That was when all these human beings came together and paid admission fees to get in on an excitement and tension based on the possibility that somebody's life would be lost, that afternoon.

We have our world of reality and our world of television fiction so badly mixed up that we were shocked, the other day, to read that the Federal Aviation Administration has been testing more than 100 emergency devices to see which one might be depended upon to detect weapons concealed on any passenger going aboard an airplane.

In the world in which we spend a certain portion of our time, the electric scanner was perfected long ago. It is part of the procedure to every radio station that has to be detected against unintendedly operative; it never fails to sound the alarm when the inner induction of the portable cable is at least to be penetrated by the superman hero.

What we thought was our knowledge of the perfection of the electric scanner in the world of television has made us very impatient with the long unachieved record of plane hijacking, in which passengers are not even allowed to use a weapon after passengers have been allowed to board the plane in the first place.

Now the news from the Federal Aviation Administration, that it is getting ready to set up some tests of some of the more hopeful electric scanners in existence, turns us back to the technology of the real world, as opposed to that of the television world. There is, as some politicians campaigning for high office would proclaim, a great weapon scanner gap.

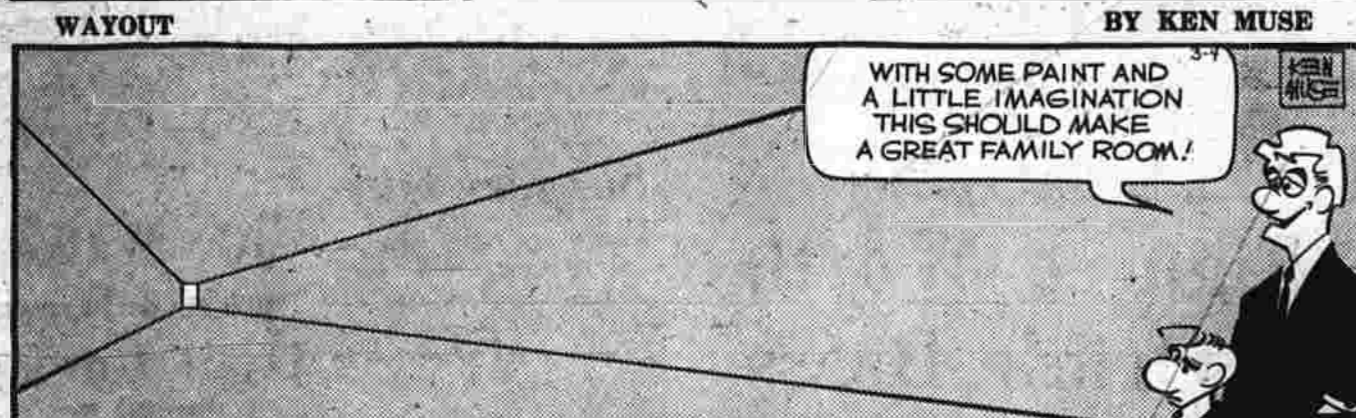

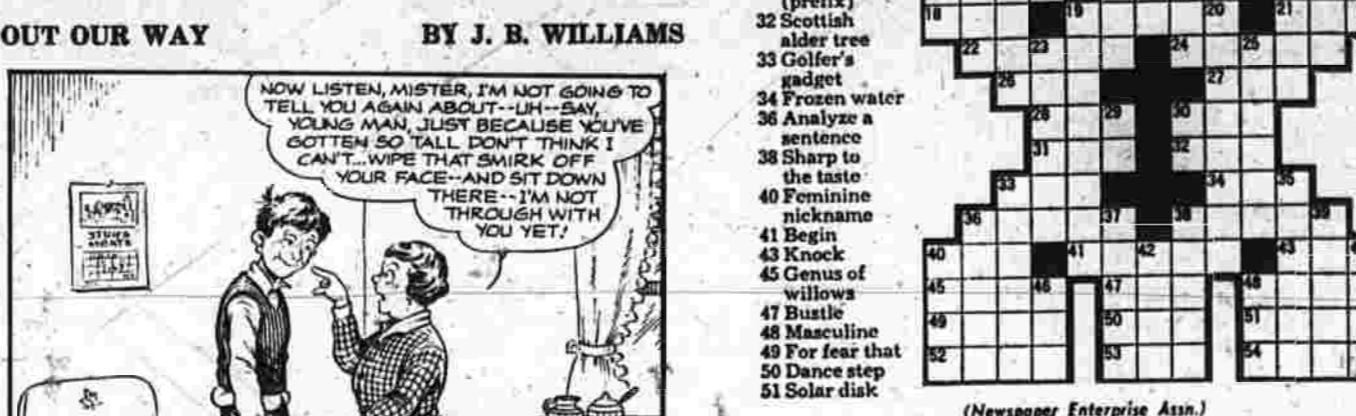

## Schweickart Overcomes Illness Astronauts Enter LEM

Maneuvering like a swimmer in the weightless world of space, Schweickart was the first to transfer through a tunnel which was formed when Apollo 9 linked up with the LEM shortly after launching from Cape Kennedy Monday on a planned 10-day earth orbit mission.

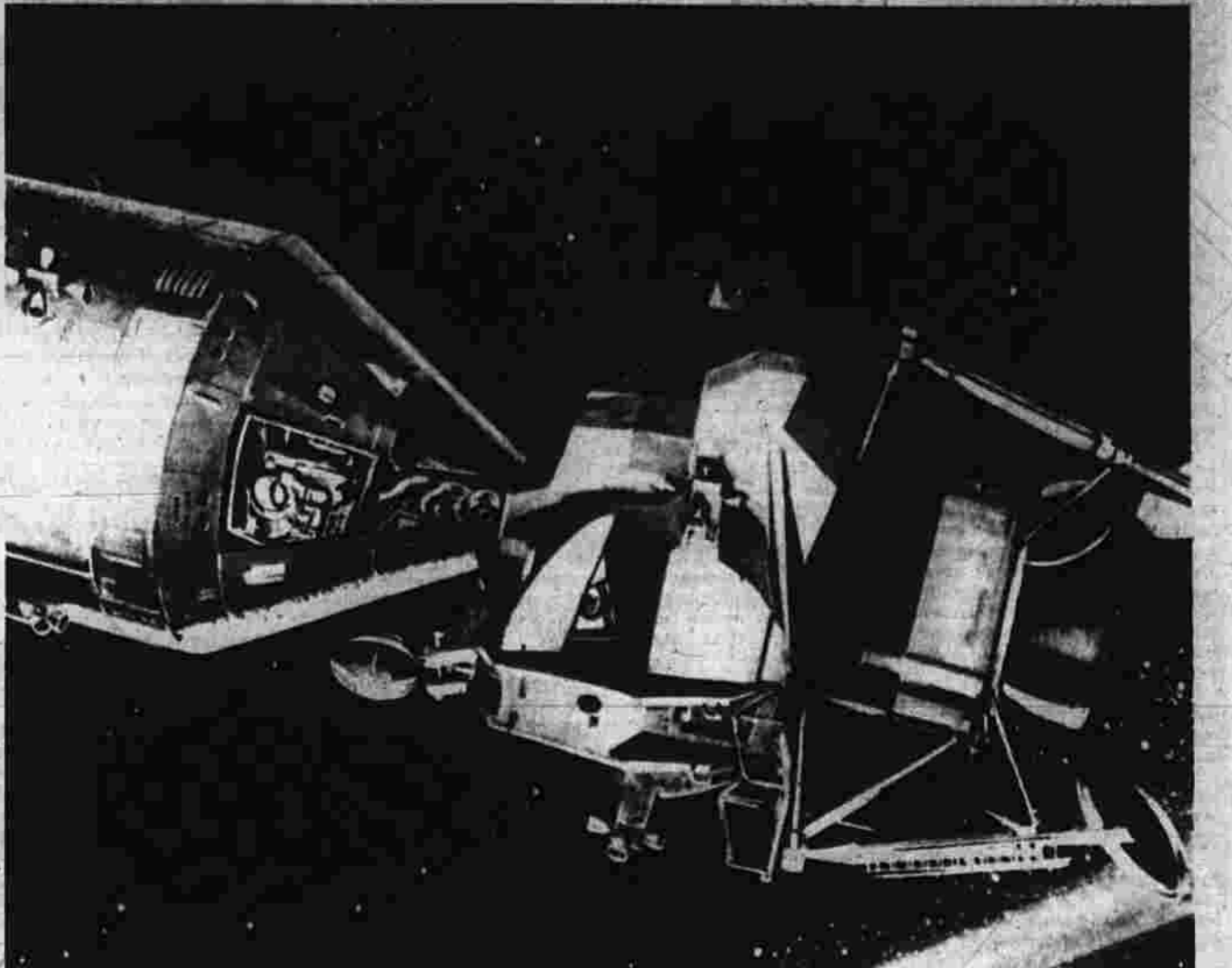
Schweickart made the switch about 8:30 a.m. EDT and was followed 10 minutes later by Apollo 9 commander McDivitt.

The transfer marked the first of three busy days in which the LEM is to be subjected to a rigorous series of tests. The astronauts today were to verify the craft is ready to support a space walk by Schweickart Thursday and a complex separation, rendezvous and docking exercise Friday.

If the LEM does not work, America's timetable for landing men on the moon could receive a major setback.

With the lunar vehicle maneuvered for the first time, the astronauts and ground stations switched to the code names "Lunar" for the LEM and "Command" for the command module.

LEM's name comes from its lunar-like appearance. When the command module was shipped to Cape Kennedy someone looked at it and said, "It's a little like a Lem." (See Page Eighteen)

## Guards Foil Daylight Attack South Viet Premier Escapes Assassins

SAIGON (AP)—Terrorists tried unsuccessfully to assassinate South Vietnam's Premier Thieu Ky Hieu in a daring daylight attack today, touching off a gun battle near the U.S. Embassy.

A spokesman for the premier said one terrorist had a suspect had been arrested. The police at the scene said four Viet Cong troops wearing the uniforms of South Vietnamese rangers and a woman dressed in civilian clothes were captured. Police said one of the terrorists was slightly wounded in an exchange of gunfire.

There were no reports of any other casualties despite the outbreak of shooting.

It was the boldest terrorist attack in Saigon since the Viet Cong launched their spring offensive Feb. 8. Authorities had been on the alert since the capture of documents which said the premier's office had been the target of a possible assassination attempt.

## Laird Off To Assess Viet War

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird left today for South Vietnam to assess the current enemy offensive, saying "we have to pray for success in Paris but we must be prepared for every eventuality."

Laird refused to indicate whether the United States might retaliate against North Vietnam for the shelling of South Vietnamese cities and the general growing U.S. opposition.

"I am going over to assemble the facts not to make forecasts," Laird said before his plane at Andrews Air Force Base.

He will report to President Nixon when he returns next week.

His report may strongly influence key Nixon decisions on possible short range action to counter the enemy offensive and longer range moves toward ending withdrawal of U.S. troops.

Talking with newsmen at the airfield, Laird said his main purpose is "to visit our men in South Vietnam and explore the situation as it exists in view of the present escalation on the part of the enemy."

He said he will be starting to return before Congress in mid-March and he wants to be prepared to discuss in depth the Vietnam situation, which he described as the defense department's biggest problem.

In his Tuesday night news conference, the President said that Laird, whose trip was planned before the new assaults started over a week ago, had been asked "to look into the situation and to give me a report."

Although Nixon left himself a wide range of options, including resuming the bombing of North Vietnam, the administration's present mood is to reduce U.S. involvement in the war as quickly as possible.

Therefore, it wants to avoid renewal of the air raids, even the selective retaliation that has been urged by some top U.S. military leaders.

The original purpose of Laird's trip, to check how close the South Vietnamese army was to undertaking the major burden of fighting, remains a prime goal.

## Entombed Since Saturday Rescue Team Hears Trapped Miner's Call

LARK, Utah (AP)—Sealed in the depth of a mine since Saturday, a 41-year-old miner called out to rescue workers today that he was alive and well.

It was the first contact William "Black" Jones made with rescuers since a rock fall entombed him in the lead, silver and copper mine about 20 miles southwest of Salt Lake City at 11 a.m. Saturday.

Hope of finding him alive had all but vanished when the crew, inching toward a small tunnel where Jones was trapped, was surprised by his voice.

"When are you going to get me out?" called Jones, a father of 11. Ken Squires, one of the rescuers, said, "I just quit talking. My eyes were as big as doorknobs."

Squires said Jones called through the 10-foot thick wall of rock and mud in the narrow tunnel that he was "awfully dry" and wanted a drink of water.

He was trapped about 4 1/2 miles deep in the sloping mine, about 2,000 feet vertically below the surface.

Benton Boyd, an official of the Utah National Guard, said: "Jones is in no serious predicament at the moment. He says he's feeling real well."

Boyd said rescuers were trying to work a pipe through the fallen rock in order to get water to the miner.

Don O. Willis, superintendent of the mine, said digging the way of the way in to Jones would be "tedious, deliberate work."

"We don't want to endanger his life any more now that we know he's all right," said Willis. "We don't want to lose any ground that we've gained."

Eight-man rescue crews had been taking turns inching their way toward the trapped man. The shaft was so small only two at a time could work in it, clearing away debris with hand tools.

Jones' plight was reported by a cowboy who scrambled to safety when the ceiling caved in.

The miner's wife, Ethel, said her husband had been in a number of minor mine accidents over the years of underground work, including one in which he suffered a fracture of the collar bone 19 years ago.

## President Warns Enemy Attackers

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon, reporting a doubling of the American casualty rate since the start of the current enemy offensive in Vietnam, says the attacks can not be tolerated and will bring "appropriate response."

Nixon, in an unprecedented 45-minute television-radio news conference limited to foreign affairs, said Tuesday night he is weighing several possible moves against the Viet Cong and North Vietnam. "If those attacks continue at their present magnitude,"

He left open the option of resuming bombing of North Vietnam, acknowledging such a course was under study.

But he made it clear the United States will not tolerate continued "violation" of the understanding that led to last fall's bombing halt or accept mounting U.S. casualties while peace talks are going on in Paris.

Standing without notes before a bare double microphone stand in the East Room of the White House, the chief executive reported on his five-nation European tour and, in response to questions, also said:

"It is his 'casualty conclusion' that the Soviet Union 'will play possibly a peace-making role in the Middle East, and even possibly in Vietnam.'

He is optimistic about prospects for four-power talks on the Middle East and feels that while such a conference could not impose a settlement, it is essential for the United States, the Soviet Union, France and Great Britain to guarantee any Arab-Israeli peace.

"American-Soviet summit talks at the highest level" are in the wings, pending the outcome of lower-level negotiations already under way.

Nixon believes some European justice established between the United States and its western allies "a new relationship of trust and confidence that did not exist before."

Despite top billing for the trip, the news conference came quickly to the most pressing issue before the administration—the enemy offensive in Vietnam.

The President suggested the enemy offensive, which started Feb. 23, had failed in its objectives. He added that while study continues on possible U.S. troop withdrawal, none are planned for the near future.

Nixon also reported discussing in Paris with American and British representatives approaches that might be made to break the peace talk deadlock.

Nixon advanced the opinion that the Paris negotiations are entering a second phase "in which we will have hard bargaining on the major points of difference."

BERLIN (AP)—Gustav Heinemann, the fiercely independent 64-year-old justice minister, was elected West German president by only six votes in an election on the first two ballots.

He today as East German harassment of West Berlin's road links reached new intensity.

With the support of the Soviet Union, the East German Communists blockaded all three roads leading into this isolated city.

Heinemann, the first Socialist Democrat to be elected to the largely ceremonial post of chief of state in four decades, received 612 electoral votes in an unprecedented third ballot. It was West Germany's most protracted and dramatically replete election. The Communist Helmut Schmidt called it a provocation and made it the target of weeks-long pressure.

The Federal Assembly, convened here at 10 a.m. in defiance of Communist threats, cast 606 votes for Heinemann's Justice Minister. The Communist opposition, 78-year-old Gerhard Schröder, 616 votes were withheld.

For Schröder, longtime gold-miner boy of German politics and present dean of the federal cabinet Heinemann and Christian Democrat Gerhard Schröder competing to succeed President Kurt Georg Kiesinger in the Christian Democratic party's caucus for the nomination of chancellor.
