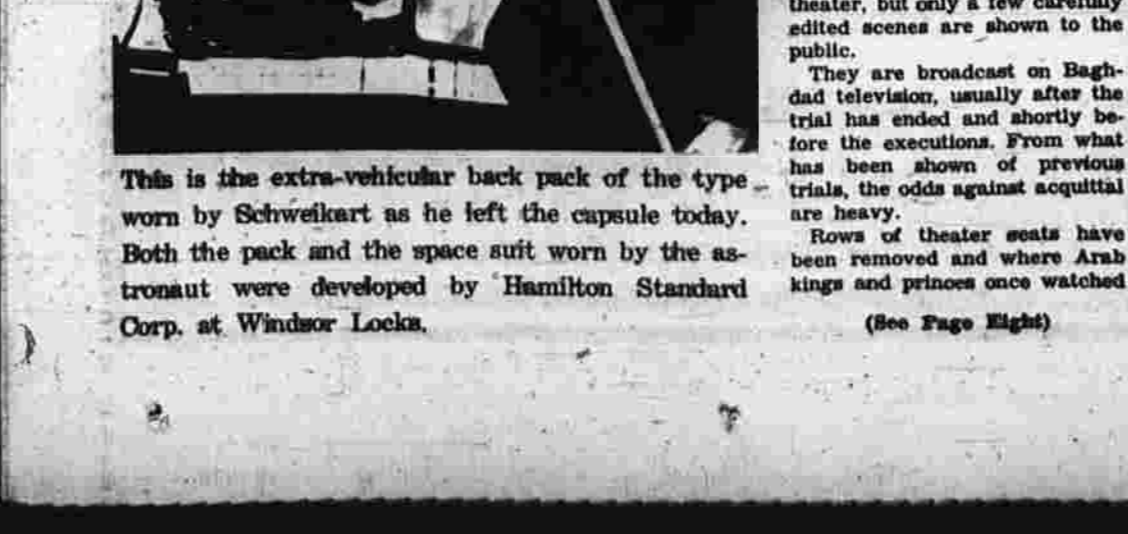

# Searchers Spot Plane Wreckage In Puerto Rico

**SEARCHERS SPOT PLANE WRECKAGE IN PUERTO RICO**

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP)—Searchers have spotted wreckage on a mountainside of a four-engine plane which disappeared Wednesday with 19 persons aboard en route from the Virgin Islands to San Juan, the Coast Guard said today.

A spokesman said a Marine helicopter spotted the wreckage and one U.S. Marine has reached the crash site southwest of the town of Lugo. He reported seeing no survivors, but the spokesman said it was too early to say whether all had perished.

The Puerto Rican International Airlines (PRI) Flight 27, a De Havilland Heron, was last heard from at 5:43 p.m., 15 minutes before it was due to land at San Juan.

The aircraft was under radar supervision from San Juan International Airport and was reported over eastern Puerto Rico, which was being buffeted by strong winds.

Two Coast Guard helicopters searched a mountainous area east of San Juan for more than an hour Wednesday night but were forced to turn back by the wind.

Police in the town of Lugo sent a search party to El Yunque to investigate a report that a low-flying plane was sighted about the time the four-engine plane disappeared. Airline officials discounted any possibility that the plane might have been hijacked to Cuba, more than 500 miles from San Juan.

# 2 Bodies Found On Cape Cod, Carpenter Held

**TWO BODIES FOUND ON CAPE COD, CARPENTER HELD**

PROVINCETOWN, Mass. (AP)—The dismembered bodies of two young women and the possible remains of a third have been unearthed in a woodland area where the corpse of an unidentified teenage girl was found on Feb. 4.

Detective Edmund Davis said a Provincetown carpenter, Arthur Costa, 26, was arrested in Boston and charged with murder soon after the bodies were dug up Wednesday.

Detective Davis identified the victims as Patricia Walsh, 23, a school teacher, and Mary Ann Wysocki, 23, a Rhode Island college student, both of Provincetown. They were buried 200 yards from the spot where the other girl's body was found.

Friends since high school, Miss Walsh and Miss Wysocki were reported missing last week ago. It was while working them that police earlier found the teenage girl.

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\$1.8 Million Budget, Up 22%, Sought by Education Board

The Board of Education has submitted a \$1,800,000 budget for the fiscal year beginning Sept. 1, 1968. The budget represents a 22% increase over the 1967-68 year.

The largest item in the budget is an estimated cost for instructional salaries. For the second year in a row, the teacher salary schedule has not been completed in time for presentation of the budget.

Several cuts in the budget, particularly in the area of capital outlay, were made by the school board before the superintendent prepared the final budget for submission to the Board of Education.

Superintendent of Schools Robert Bratton yesterday described the budget as an "honest budget." "It's the best that can be done with the money on hand at this time," Bratton budgeted \$1,000,000 for the instruction category.

Other budget categories and their appropriations with last year's figures in parentheses are: Administration \$66,489; instruction \$1,000,000; health \$15,640; maintenance of plant \$130,000; food charges \$8,100; capital outlay \$13,400; food services \$1,000; student body activities \$8,100; auxiliary \$13,400; transportation \$13,400.

Increases in several categories including maintenance and operation of plant, capital outlay and food charges are due to the addition of eight classrooms to the Manchester School.

The increased pupil transportation budget reflects the cost of transporting the anticipated extra 425 students to school.

Student body activities increased, reflecting the addition of the third year class at the high school and the entry into varsity sports events and into other student activities generally associated with high school enrollment.

With the anticipated enrollment increase next year, enrollment will have 2,435 students. This increase means the town's school population shooting past the neighboring towns of Ellington, Coventry and Stafford, becomes the third highest of the Manchester area towns.

Although the town's school population has risen drastically since 1960 when 1,387 students were enrolled, the superintendent's administrative staff has been added. Unlike other areas towns, Tolland does not have any assistants to the superintendent, business manager or curriculum coordinator.

This year's increase in the administrative category reflects salary increases for two superintendents, his secretary and the bookkeeper. Also included is an allocation for a part-time secretary.

The town also does not provide student participation at any of the schools although two will have in excess of 500 pupils each next year. Each school also has only one secretary.

A request for an additional nurse will permit the present elementary school nurse to remain at one school instead of being divided between two schools.

By far the largest amount of grants to be received by the town is the state ADM grant based on the average daily membership attendance in the local schools. Grants are estimated at a total value of \$485,400 compared to \$385,875 for the present budget.
