Now He Is President . . . If there was one recurrent theme on which his questioners kept testing President Nixon in his home-coming press onference the other night, it concerned is attitude, now he is in the Presidency, toward the Communist portion of our

The probing intent of the newsmen questioners was clear. Whether the isme was Vietnam, or Berlin, or the Near East, or anti-missile missile system, the question kept requiring the Presdent to decide how he would speak of Communist strategies, Communist motives, and Communist behavior.

In the mind of every questioner there was obviously the memory of times when this individual had been eager to capitalize on every opportunity that came his way for him to prove and amonstrate his own anti-Communisr In the answer of the man who has now become President there was, every time, a moderation, a caution, and -

this was especially noteworthy- an ability to admit and to put into words some of the policy necessities of the other idea of the world division. For such reasons, almost every Presi

dential answer which had to do with dealing with the Communist world was probably an offense to those extreme right wingers in our midst who hoped Nixon would adopt and practice their own theories about bombing Peking and oscow, if need be, into submission. Even in the particular line of ques-

ioning where he did not dare be too "reasonable," that of what our at-titude and reaction would be if the enemy in Vietnam continued attacking cities, the President managed to achieve to hawkish retaliations.

At other times-as in his discussion of how it could be that Russia, while supplying 80 per cent of the sophisticated war equipment being received by Vietnam, could also possibly become a help toward the achievement of a negotiated peace in Vietnam-Presiden Nixon was even more open-minded that his old chief, President Eisenhower, in his best moments. He more or less conceded Russia's own policy necessity to try to maintain one of its positions-that it held within the Communist worldwhile it might be willing to take an entirely different kind of position in its dealings with us.

The normal behavior for some Presidents, and for Mr. Nixon himself at oth er phases of his career, would have been to greet a question concerning Russia's military aid to Vietnam with a diatribe against Russia's villainy.

Again, when the topic was the Near East, President Nixon seemed capable of accepting the fact that Russia could rearm the Arab states and at the same time possibly be a collaborator with us in the attempt to establish a permanent

In the great, bright hopeful days of the Eisenhower administration, it was the ability of Eisenhower as President concede that the other half of the world had certain policy necessities and compulsions of its own that gave hope and vitality and chance to his efforts to build the cause of peace in the world. It is a somewhat unexpected boon to hear a similar voice speaking in Washington today, but it must be a reassurance which travels all around the world and finds a welcome in every ear that believes one of the first steps toward peace has to be the development of some ivility and understanding on the part of he leaders of great nationalistic power.

Guaranteed Profit For Bloom

On behalf of the natural beauty of the tulip, we resent the troubles which have now beset the once good artistry of raising tulip bulbs in Holland. It is, of course, no longer just an rtistry, or it would not be in trouble. It is, in trouble because it has become

more and more pure business, which his something the culture of flowers should never quite be allowed to be. Specifically, the lure of seiling to our American gerdens has operated to increase the numbers of build growers in Holland beyond the number actually needed for the market. And, instead combining to form an association,

or putting themselves under some government control plan, as American farmens have learned to do, the Dutch builb growers follow the disastrous course of unchecked private enterprise, which means that some of them have made a practice of selling bulbs at a loss in an effort to break into the market. This starts a price war which decreases the income and profit for all the tulip growers, so that, at the moment, bulbs are going to the outside world at prices which are ridiculously low, while all the good honest Dutch bulb growers are going broke.

Why should we mind this, if it results in cheap bulbs for our gardens? The answer is that we don't like cheap bulbs. The kind of bargain we want when we buy for the garden is in bloom, not in price. If the bloom, when it comes, makes us happy, and brightens our landscape, we want to be able to think of a Dutch originator who is also happy and proud that the bulb he tended sheds such illumination far scross an

Such civilized standards of buying and selling we would like to have made mandatory in all transactions which in-Dat no one should ever be allowed to go broke propagating beautiful bloom.

And if we could get it working with flowers, we might like to see it tried in some other varieties of business, too.

Stormy Session

If the Democratic administration in Hartford was aiming to run its package of tax bills through public hearings early in the game, in hopes of getting a minimal reaction of resentment, it had the cooperation of the weather bureau . and, finally, of the weather. Experiment 'Flawless, NASA Says

ton (AP) — Flying with speed and precision, astro-nauts James A. McDivitt and Russell L. Schweickart today steered their fragile lunar module to a success-ful rendezvous with the Apoilo 9 command ship and may have hastened an American landing on the moon.

As the two ships approached each other at 17,500 miles an hour after a separation of six hours, the astronauts were in good humor.

"You're upside down again," McDivitt, said as he looked at Air Force Col. David R. Scott in the command module.

"Boy, youve got contreptions hanging out all over you," quipped Scott. He referred to ines and cables trailing behind the lunar module, or LEM, the result of engine firings during the tricky rendezvous.

The dramatic space chase be-gan at 7:40 a.m. EST when Air Force Col. McDivitt and Schweickart disengaged the lu-nar module from Apollo 9 after a brief imagup when the dockimmediately.

Expertly maneuvering their tiny craft, they flew to a posi-tion 113 miles behind the command ship, now manned alone by Scott.

Swapping radio and radar sig nals with Scott, the LEM pilo segun sthe pursuit, skillfu guiding their cruft through the same maneuvers that two astronauts will have to make when
