President Nixon says he'll spend the weekend resting in the Florida sun—and studying antiballistic missiles. Nixon's first mission in flying from Washington to Key West came on Friday night when he was to catch up on some of the work that eluded him during 10,000 miles of travel through five European countries in eight days.

However, the chief executive told newspapermen about his plans for the flight to Florida that "I'm moving the ABM this weekend." He reported bringing with him a full briefcase—but not an full suitcase to Europe on the trip that ended Sunday.

UNWISE SLAM DOUBLE MAY GUIDE OPINION By ALFRED SHEINWOLD You seldom get much in doubling a slam that a competent opponent has bid voluntarily. If he is in danger of going down more than one, your double may warn him of a bad break and thus enable him to minimize the loss. Worse yet, he will take a risk because he would otherwise go down.

Both sides vulnerable. Opening lead—clubs. West thought he had a magnificent double of six spades. He was going to collect a club trick and at least one trump, perhaps two. Perhaps his partner might even turn up with a trick. Only a coward would settle for 200 when he could increase the penalty to 500 points by saying just one word!

South couldn't be sure of the trump situation, but he was willing to take a risk because he was giving him odds. A redouble would cost 200 additional points if South made the contract, but it would gain 300 points if South made the contract and lose 200 points if he failed.

South ruffed the ace of clubs, and now his only problem was to limit the trump loss to one trick. This was easy since West's double lowered the trump length. South led the ace of spades, discarding the bad heart when East took three clubs.

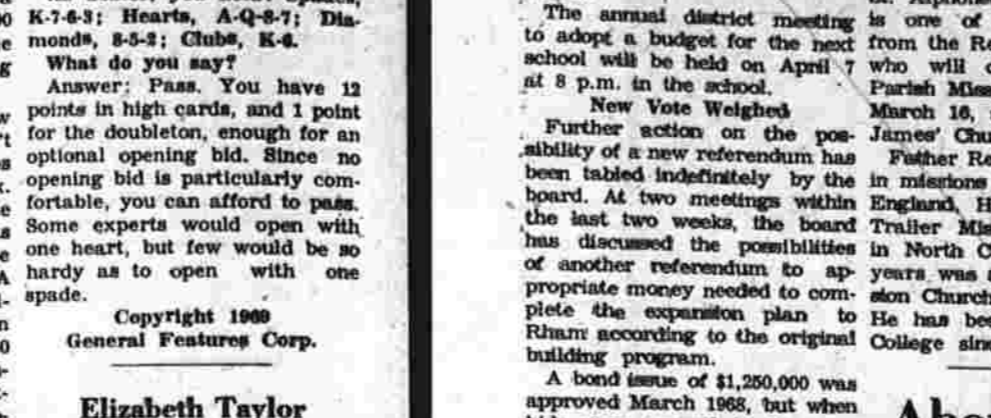

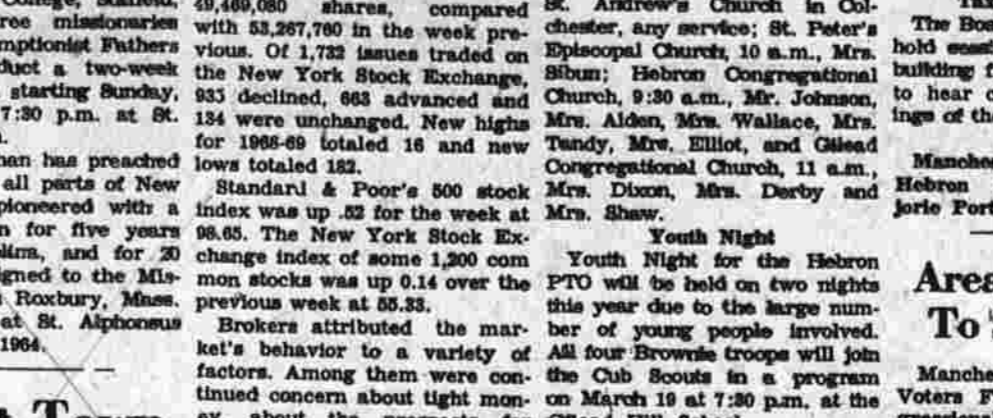

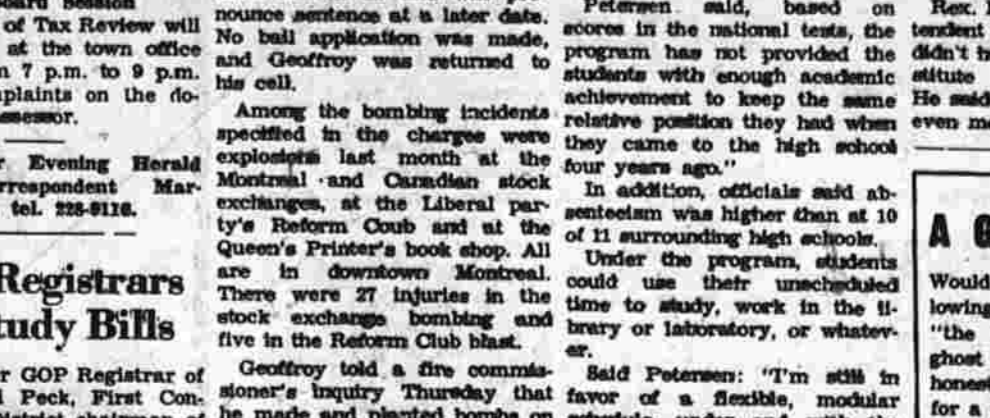

Colleges Warned In HEW Memo On Separatism

country will never know. Maybe what we have is a way for the blacks to find themselves."

Negro students have been demanding their own programs and facilities for the past two academic years, and have turned with increasing frequency to protest demonstrations when their demands were refused.

Nonetheless, said HEW, so far as it knows Antioch is the only college with a black studies program that excludes whites. The department said "two or three" universities had met the demands of Negro students for separate dormitories even though an HEW ruling last spring blocked Northwestern University from sanctioning such an all-black facility.

A Harvard faculty committee said last January in a report on African and Afro-American studies that only a few Negroes were urging "a more separatist structure, such as a dormitory solely for blacks," but that black students generally shared "a desire for some continuing identification with the black community."

Sympathy with that desire, plus the pressure of demonstration, have produced a proliferation of black studies programs. Most major universities either have them or are in the process of creating them.

Vice Chancellor Kenneth Goode of the University of California at Berkeley, said there is no turning back.

"Black studies are inevitable. I'm quite sure," said Goode, "that all student demonstrators want to be taught by scholars and instructors who are men of competence. They realize that there are just not enough black scholars to staff such a department, they realize this as well as the administration."

Horace Harris, chairman of the Black Council at the violence-plagued University of Wisconsin, said none of his organization's demands required segregation.

"Physical separation is not really necessary," he said. "It may even be detrimental because the less able you are to compare yourself if you operate in a vacuum."

Put Brakes On Spending, Says Barry

State Sen. David M. Barry of Manchester said today that "every effort must be made by the legislature to cut Gov. John Dempsey's proposed budget, because it considers any new taxes."

Barry said that the best alternative to the proposed new taxes contained in the governor's budget is to put the brakes on new programs to examine existing programs with a view toward economy.

Barry is on the Assembly's Appropriations Committee and on its Finance Committee.

"For one thing, the time has come to examine the practices of the Welfare Department, whose budget continues to grow and is a major source of our financial difficulties," he said. Citing the independent investigation of that department now going on, he said that he hopes that some corrective measures can be taken in the present legislative session.

Barry said that the Work-Incentive Program is just beginning to show results in the Welfare Department, and that it must be continued "in an effort to get welfare recipients back into the labor market."

Insofar as new taxes are concerned, Barry said that he cannot support many of the new tax proposals, "because they would affect the income groups least able to afford them."

Barry said that, while there is a heavy volume of mail from residents of the Fourth Senatorial District regarding the budget, very few people have suggested the adoption of an income tax.

"Most people just want some economy in state government, at a time when the federal and local governments are already taxing them heavily enough," he said.

Barry invited the public to express their opinions on fiscal and other matters pending before the Legislature, by writing to him and to their state representatives. He said that he believes that personal correspondence from the public is in general a more accurate barometer of public opinion than the testimony before legislative committees.

That is only part of the picture.

The school also has a solid academic program—four years of English, mathematics, social studies, and science. The mathematics curriculum ranges from practical arithmetic to trigonometry, social studies from civics to industrial economics, and science from general science to metallurgy and applied chemistry and physics.

South Windsor Teachers Vote For Mediation

The South Windsor Education Association has voted to ask for state mediation in its salary dispute with the Board of Education.

The announcement was made yesterday by Larry Brown, first vice president and chairman of SWEA's salary negotiation team.

In a prepared statement the association said it "stands firmly behind its negotiating team in feeling that the association's original proposals are extremely realistic and reasonable" with regard to "salary schedule, fringe package, differential package and changes in working conditions." SWEA and the board have been negotiating several months.

The Board of Education recently voted not to increase its original offer to SWEA. The school board offered a starting salary for a bachelor's degree of \$6,700 with a maximum of \$10,000 on the 12th step. Salaries would range up to \$11,500 for a sixth year certificate.

SWEA is asking the same BA starting salary, but its requests for higher steps are

larger across the board to a maximum of \$10,300 for BA and \$12,000 for a sixth year certificate.

The starting salary for BA degree is now \$8,100 to a top of \$10,600 with a sixth year certificate.

"Over the past few years," the SWEA statement continued, "the stated intent of the Board of Education was to maintain the salaries of its professional personnel at a median figure when compared to surrounding communities."

SWEA added, "One of the biggest assets of the system is the teachers' attitude and that is fast going down the drain."

According to Brown, SWEA will be sending a letter to the State Commissioner of Education today asking that he appoint an agent to mediate between the board and SWEA. The agent will issue a finding which is not binding on either party, Brown said.

Brown said if mediation fails then the board and SWEA would go to arbitration, which again is not binding. Under arbitration, the board and SWEA both appoint representatives to work toward a settlement.

While the White House declined to allow inspection of the mail, at least some of the letters, relayed to the Interior Department, suggested that Hibel be removed.

Mrs. Henry Saefer of Westwood, N.J., however, wrote Nixon to say that "from the way you handled the oil crisis at Santa Barbara, I can see that you will make sure Mr. Hibel acts in our country's best interests."

Just how many individuals wrote in was hard to tell. No count had been made but at least 3,000 communications have arrived, at the offices of the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration. Interior's "dirty water people" as they sometimes call themselves.

The White House reported receiving some 1,900 letters and telegrams while the rough estimates in Congressional offices totaled some 7,750. It was impossible to tell how many of these were separate communications, and how many were duplicates of messages sent to more than one office or agency.

After Hibel invited the offshore operators, Mrs. Julia Smolik of Franklin Park, Ill., wrote to thank him.

Ross Martin Slows Down

HOLLYWOOD — (N E A) — He came downstairs, his face glowing with health. Ross Martin had been out, jogging a few miles, and then he'd showered and changed. You would never know he'd had a serious heart attack a few months before. It was serious. He remembers that morning when he was finally moved from the cardiac care

unit into a regular hospital room. That meant he would make it.

"The other room had no windows," he says. "This room had a window. I woke up and I could look out the window. I saw the sun shining on the bricks of the building and there was a pattern of shadows made by some leaves. And the birds were singing."

"I know it sounds corny and trite to say it—but maybe that's because it's so true. But, believe me, it's great to be alive."

Life is something he appreciates now. It wasn't always that way. For the first 2½ years of his CBS series, "Wild, Wild West," he knocked himself out for his work. That was everything to him.

"I thought I was indestructible," he says. "For four years, I got an average of six or six and one-half hours of sleep a night. I'd do everything for anybody. I didn't know how to say no. I'd do every charity benefit I was asked to do. I'd report early on the set and work late. I'd do every stunt they wanted me to do."

No more. He learned that his first responsibility is to himself and his family. He'll work and do his best and maybe more, but now there are limits.

"I work an eight-hour day, like every other man," he says. "And I won't throw 200-pound stuntmen over my shoulder any more."

He quit smoking, and he used

to be a three-pack-a-day man. He learned not to let things upset him the way they once did. He watches what he eats, sticking to fish and fowl more than beef because it is less fattening. He gets plenty of sleep.

And every morning he jogs five miles in about an hour and 10 minutes. His wife, Olave, does the first mile with him, then waits in the car while he finishes. If he's working, that takes care of his daily exercise. If he isn't working, in the evening he does about 20 minutes of push-ups and sit-ups.

He reads more than he ever did. And he has taken up oil painting; his first was a cheerful Hawaiian scene, with a lady chasing big butterflies against a

blue-and-green background.

He looks and feels better than he ever did. Five years ago, he says, he would have keeled over if he tried to run five miles. Now he does it every day. He thinks he is in better physical shape now than he has been for 10 years.

"It sounds corny to say this, too," he says, "but I think my heart attack was a blessing in disguise. I learned to take care of myself."

Ross Martin wasn't sure yet whether "Wild, Wild West" will be renewed for next season or not. Whatever comes, however, he will be ready. The way he looks, he could even qualify to play Tarzan — a very young Tarzan.

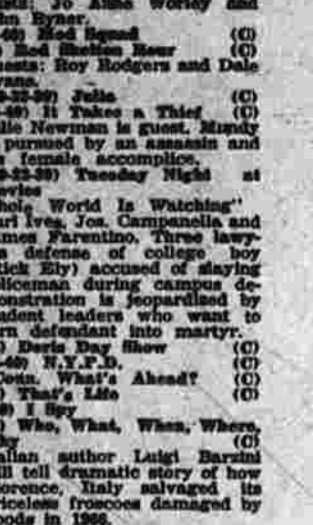
