

Better Yes Than No The nuclear nonproliferation treaty has

now been ratified by the Senate, by a strong vote of 83 to 15. The first thing we say about it is that we suppose it is a better thing to have the treaty ratified by the United States Senate than to have it rejected by that body. Once having been thought worth negotiating, it should be ratified. This is one of those things we are supposed to do, in our troubled times, to show that our hearts are in the right

So we hope everybody else ratifies the nuclear nonproliferation treaty too. Even if that is done, however, and the list of signers actually includes nations now believed unlikely to sign - like India, Israel and Communist China the question of whether the world has achieved safety for itself in the nuclear age will not have been answered. Nothing is going to be able to shut

off the possession of nuclear materials by many nations. Every nuclear power plant built and operated inevitably adds its plutonium byproduct to the stockpiles, from which bombs could be made, This nonproliferation treaty aims itself at the task of binding those nations to whom the bomb might thus become rather easily available not to make at for

But the main situation remains one in which present members of the nuclear club are, in effect, trying to bind other mations of the world not to try to join that club. This effort can only achieve the kind of result and success that can e trusted if, in the end, the present members of that very exclusive club agree to disband it.

There is a terrible absolute in the field of weapon control. It is that there has to be one law, one privilege, one prohibition, which is the same for everybody. And it is another absolute that disarmament has to be total or it is none at all. Partial disarmament is n illusion, which merely increases the danger to everybody by creating the impression that something is being done to

progress toward solution of the problem. The nonproliferation treaty gives us all chance to show our heart is in the right place. It doesn't begin to put anything else - our bombs, our reliance for our own future safety, our diplomatic effort - in the right place.

But it seems almost certain that, some day in the future, the respective costs of the two kinds of lawn will come out expenses of natural grass, it

should be remembered, must include not only the initial cost, the annual sharpening and tuning repair bill, and the cost of fuel for the mowing equipment. It must also include such items as new grass seed periodically, fertilizer, lime, spreader, hose and water bill, and, if the mowing job is hired done, a weekly fee for that. All of these items keep going up in cost, year after year, whereas the price of installing artificial grass is more or less guaranteed to come down for a time, until it does become economic for the masses.
