WASHINGTON-Nixon admin istration officials have decided to press Congress for a limited package of tax reforms this year -including an attack on the privileged positions of conglomerates and tax-exempt founds tions.

But they concede that substantial relief through tax re-form for the great bulk of taxpayers in the middle-income brackets (\$9,000 to \$17,000) will probably have to wait until the end of the Vietnam war.

A decision to try for at least some positive changes in tax laws this year may meet resistance from the influential Rep. Wilbur Mills (D-Ark.) who envisions a longer-range, thorough revamping of the tax code. But Nixon administration of-ficials have decided that waituntil next year "to do something about congiomerates will miss the mark." Mills has also

expressed a willingness to study a loophole favoring creation of conglamorates (mergers of companies with a variety of inerests) ahead of more general ax reform. The way Nixon men see it,

other things can be accomplished this year in a first phase of a three-staged effort for tax reorm. Other initial priorities would be an attack on tax "Gimmicks" that favor the very wealthy, and "something" to cope with the tax-exempt oundations. Officials working on the tax

program acknowledge that Con-gress may alter their programs priorities. But they think that there are important tax re-form matters that can be pushed through the congressional process this year, and still others, more complicated, that will have to wait until 1970. And beyond these, they prom-ise a sweeping revision and simplification of the whole internal revenue code, plus a look

sharing" idea backed by many state governments, for presen-tation to Congress in 1971. This phase would wait on recommendations by a new, blue-ribbon

commission. The basis for the Nixon a ministration's current tax "philosophy" is that there is "unusually high concern" among American taxoayer over inequities in the system. They don't quite go along with former Treasury Secretary Jo-seph W. Barr, who warned as he left office in January of a taxpayers' "revolt."

Don't Try To Feel Safer

in the curious unreality with which he supposed realists of our time are rying to run this world, the ratificaion by the United States Senate of the suclear nonproliferation treaty has been followed by what is supposed to be the equally encouraging news that Russia as submitted to the disarmament talks at Geneva a proposal for negotiating an nternational ban against placing weapons on the world's ocean floors. The nuclear weapon has already proliferated into more hands than we trust, and indeed we cannot, as witness Hiroshima, trust even our own hands. If the monproliferation treaty were to be worth anything, we might not need to spend limitless billions on a limited antimissile missile system. And if any antimissile missile system could be guaranteed to be any good, we might not need a nonproliferation treaty. But with things as they are, we are going to have them both, and neither of them good for anything, neither of them representing the slightest kind of real guaranty of security or safety or survival for anybody.

But making a nonweapon zone out of the bottom of the sea-surely that will do ome good? President Nixon joined Premier Kosygin in urging it upon the attention of the Disarmament Committee at Geneva. They should, President Nixon told the committee, get right to work to "assure that the seabed, man's latest frontier, renflains free from the nuclear arms race."

It must, then, be a noble aim, comparable only to the success already achieved in having a whole group of nations declare Antarctica safe from military installations or exploitation, or comparable to those noble pledges we and Russia have given each other and the world about keeping space and the moon neutral.

But do we feel very much safer about possible military trouble from space when we know, no matter what highsounding pledges have been made, that both space powers are using space to spy on each other, and to contemplate the possibility of hanging missiles up there which could plummet down on signal from Washington or Moscow? And how quickly would President Nixon and all "realist" Americans jump back in alarm if the proposal about the bottom of the sea should not only prohibit the placing of any nuclear weapon down those deep unfathomed caves, bu should also forbid nuclear submarines to park themselves near the bottom? We are, by such stratagems as the nonproliferation treaty, or the seabed proposal, proposing to salve our

conscience and pretending to be practical by locking all the little side stable doors but never the main stable door which we and Russia intend to use if we ever have to.

We are creating the illusion that we are for peace and survival, and are working conscientiously toward it. But if we ever really mean what we want people to think we mean when we propose neutralizing the bottom of the sea. then we would already be refusing use the clean depths of any sea, or the sweet stratospheres of anybody's continent, or any product of God's still green earth, for the mounting of terrible physical threat to one another, and we wouldn't be waiting for somebody else to be the first to stop doing it, either. Nobody is being that foolish. Instead, the realists are running the

The Game At Hand

There were, in New York City the other day, two instances of bad news in which two young people were really

doing no more than playing a game In Harlem, a 16-year-old boy of hitherto exemplary conduct and good standing in school was playing a game of shooting with a friend's rifle, at streetlights. A Penn Central train came through and made itself a target. One of the bullets went through a brakeman's heart. The boy appeared in police headquarters two days later, accompanied by his mother, to tell police what had happened.

The other bad news event was fa up the social and economic scale. It concerned the bright young attorney who was the son of an official in the office of the City Controller. His father, while he was in the public service, had charge of making investments for the more than \$5 billions in pension funds amassed for the benefit of various New York City employes. When the lawyer son ran for political office last year, \$10,000 of the \$16,365 he received in campaign contributions came from individuals who were officers of firms whose mortgages the father had bought with the city's pension funds. The young lawyer in question already had the distinction of association with one of the city's most dignified and prestigious law firms. He, or his father for him, was, like the boy firing at street lights, merely playing a game, intending no serious consequence. What he was doing at the top of the New York City political and economic structure was as natural and as routine for him, in the environment in which he had been reared, as shooting blindly at trains in Harlem roulette. We don't know why the two incidents

seem to hang together. They were in the news on the same day. No rea harm was intended, although the code of decent conduct was being violated. But what really unites them is the fact that each story makes us realize how far-how very far-we have to go to penetrate with prevention or cure to the ources of such conduct. How do we reach the boys shooting at trains or throwing at automobiles? How do we chase down all the clever games unscrupulous politicians and business operators play with the public money? An otherwise "good" boy has killed man in Harlem. A bright young lawyer may have lost his own career and his father's honor. Yet, contemplating the question of what to do about it, who feels otherwise than helplessly baffled? It might be easier to try to deal with the truly malevolent, the intentional criminal or political crook, than it is with the half-guilty nice people who are merely playing the game which is at hand in their environment.

"The Evangelical Salt"

One can indeed wonder if this age of ours is after all so different relig iously from the Hellenistic age, if the questions are not the same and the answers basically the same. Whether man stands on the earth and looks in wonder at the moon, or stands on the moon andlooks in wonder at the earth, the backdrop is the same staggering immensity tions are as ed again: Is there a Designer of all this? Is there a reason for life on this planet? Is there a reason for our being ellow astronauts for a few years on this large space ship? What happens after death? What is the purpose of my life? What does the Christ-life mean to me as I go through my days and years?

The true spirit of the Gospels is needed in our nation today. As the first President in his last address and the last President in his first address have eminded us, the pilings on which the American democracy is built are moral and religious. This beloved country of ours, recently described as "ragged in spirit," demonstrates "the weird and exotic ephemera of a rich, insecure bored, ancious, hysterical society." We see now a sort of eutrophication of human society, calling for the evangelical salt of the earth to keep it from insipidity. We perceive in many Americans today what the ancients called anomia-the sense of rootlessness and helplessness of the individual, an anxie bred from loss of community. We note a widespread acedia-the devaluation of all standards and the boredom with everything, even life itself. The spirit of the New Testament provided antiseptic and medicine amid the decadence of the Roman Empire. That same New Testament spirit has the potent medicinal qualities required to overcome decadence in the body politic and in our individual lives. If it is true that the book titled Excellence was thrown away in this nation ten years ago, then we need to study the New restament whose subtitle is "A Life of Excellence." We need to pay greate attention to pre-evangelization, even in the lives of those who have already received the faith.

Here in the Archdiocese of Hartford and in the lovely and historic States of Rhode Island and Connecticut, may we who bear the name of Christ den onstrate the spirit of the New Teste ment. Certainly we work for the disadvantaged and in the inner city; did not the Lord warn us that he is there and that we shall be judged by our treatment of the "least of the brethren?" Assuredly we work for Christian Unity did not the Lord at the Last Suppe gray that all his followers might be one? At all times we work and pray for seace; is not "Blessed are the peacemakers" one of the Beatitudes? With dedication we strive for racial justice and charity and oppose discrimination and segregation; did not Paul remind us that with us there is no separation between Jew and Gentile, Greek and bar barian (and here we could add black and white), but that we are all one in Christ? Unceasingly we extend our helping hands to representatives of other faiths, to those in civic life, to all men of good will; did not the Lord remind us that though we are not of it we are this world? - EXCERPT FROM IOMILY PREACHED BY MOST. One of the greatest hazards in Antarctica is fire. Dr. Stuh- from one-man vehicles to large , gained. linger points out that when they visited Anartctica, they did no realize the magnitude of the danger of fire in spacecraft. The tragic accident at Cape Kennedy which took the lives of three astronauts clearly showed that fire is a prime danger in the space program. To eliminate fire hazard, all

buildings in Antarctica are equipped with fire-warning systems, extinguishers and quick exits. All camps and stations have "fall-back" camps a few hundred yards away equipped to provide shelter, food and comnunications. Should the main camp be destroyed by fire, the crew can survive for days or weeks in the emergency campa until a rescue party arrives. A similar arrangement can be installed on the moon. Dr. Stuhlinger points out, and even in Earth-orbit there are measures to provide a greater margin of safety to astronauts.

In Antarctica, exploration began first with human travel and then discovery. Explorers actually walked over the ice to examine it closely.
