The old saying "necessity is the mother of invention" has been proven many times in the food market. Today's frozen foods, dehydrated, prepared and dehydrated foods are a boon to housewives everywhere. The modern processes have often been developed to meet special needs in feeding our armed forces during wartime or to meet the special problems encountered by explorers.

Very early in history man discovered that food would keep longer if it were dried and kept in a cool dry place. Meat, fish and some fruits were cut into thin strips and dried in the sun or over an open fire.

It was also found that rubbing certain foods with salt or soaking them in salt water helped to preserve them. The first "dehydrated" foods were "dried" foods. They were particularly important back in the days of the sailing ship which lacked space for refrigeration and had limited storage space.

Later man developed methods of packing foods in sealed containers. Special attention is given to retreating and quick freezing.

Today, man is meeting the challenge of food for the space traveler. Space travel imposes unique constraints on the design and fabrication of foods for consumption during space flight. Because of weight and space limitations in air and space, the food which the astronaut takes with him must be a very light weight, require a minimum of storage space, and no refrigeration.

Because the condition of relative weightlessness makes it impossible to keep solids on a plate or in a liquid in an open cup, meals must be eaten directly from sealed containers. Meals must be planned to include a total daily intake of about 2,600 calories per astronaut.

All space food must be prepared and packaged to withstand the following conditions: Temperatures ranging from about 20 degrees F to 125 degrees F; pressures ranging from 18.7 psia (pounds per square inch absolute) at 70 degrees F (the pressure at which space craft is purged prior to launch) to approximately 1 x 10 psia, near vacuum conditions, at 100 degrees F (the temperature expected in the space craft when the cabin is open during extra-vehicular activity and in the sunlight); relative humidity which may vary from 30% to 90%.

Because of the many and varied constraints imposed by the space vehicles and space travel, it was necessary to create a new feeding concept based on specially engineered and fabricated foods. The extensive research conducted at the request of NASA has resulted in the foods consumed on the Apollo 9 and 10 flights.

These foods fall into three categories: Dehydrated foods which are rehydrated before eating.

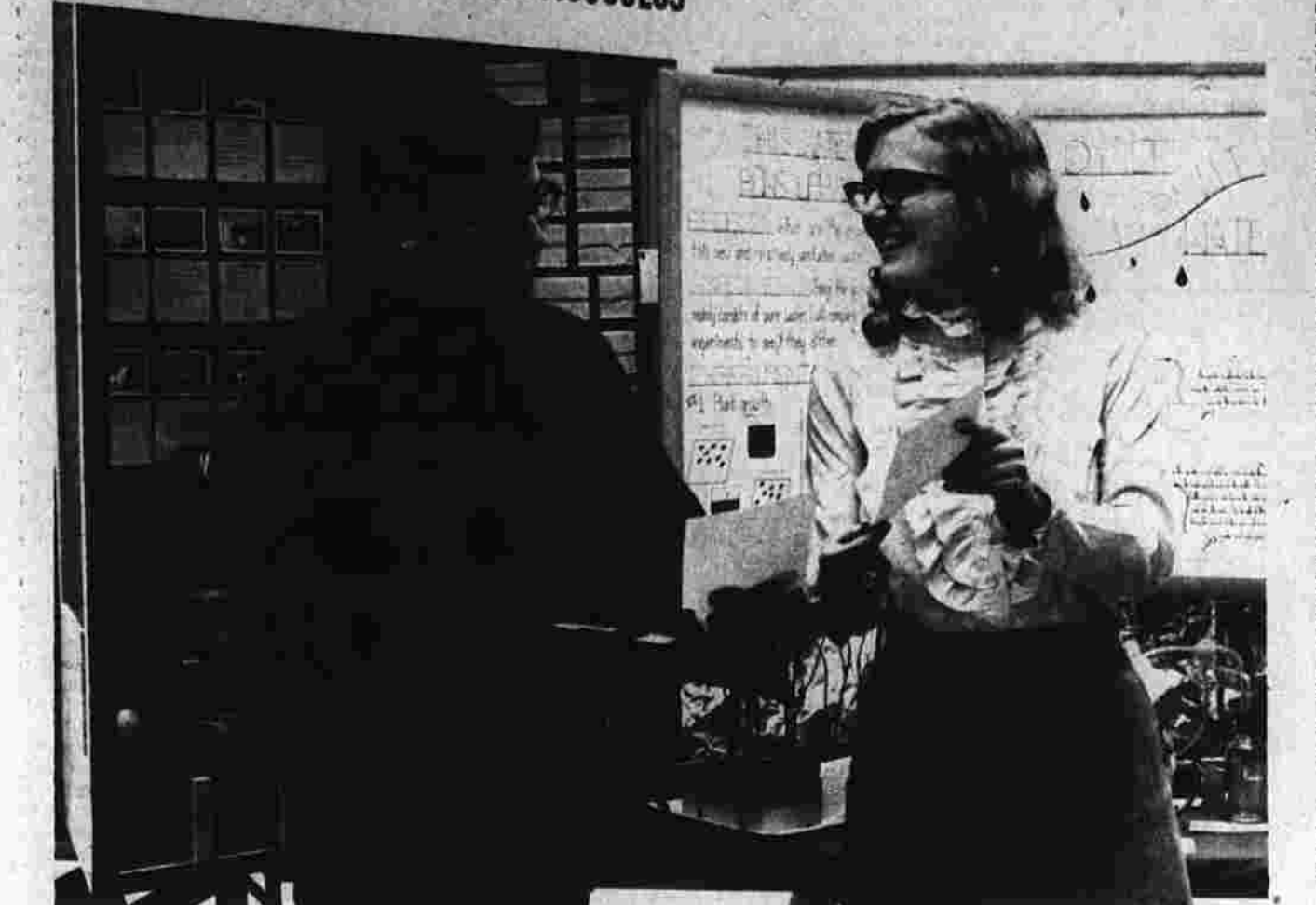

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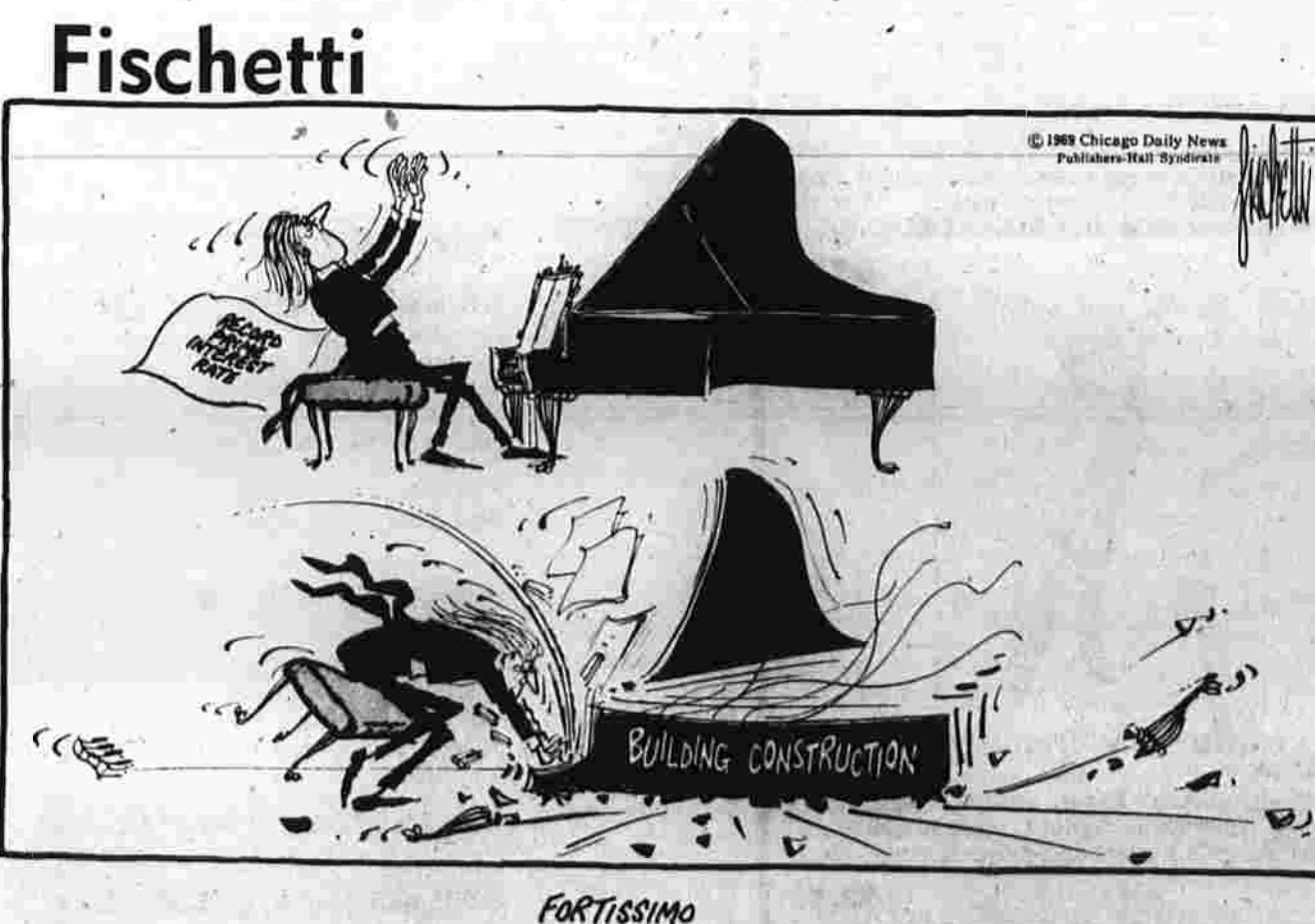

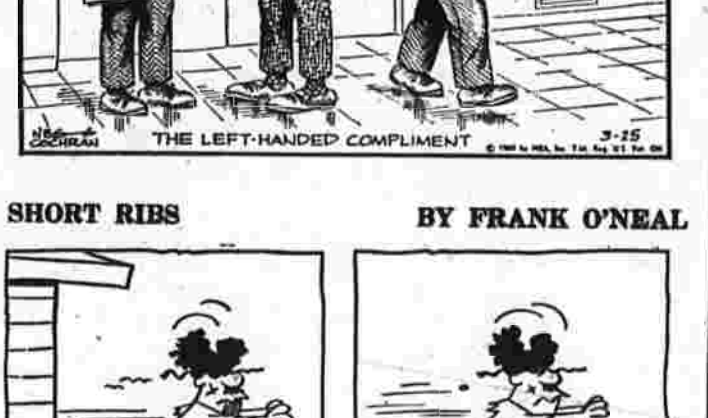

British Minister Going to Anguilla

LONDON (AP)—Britain today ordered Foreign Office Minister Lord Caradon to Anguilla to make a new assessment of conditions there.

Caradon will go to Anguilla Friday, a Foreign Office spokesman told reporters. The assignment of Caradon is expected to be something of an act of conciliation by Britain to the Anguillians.

Caradon, a former governor of Jamaica, is widely known in the Caribbean. He is currently leader of Britain's permanent delegation at U.N. headquarters in New York.

In New York, a spokesman for the British U.N. mission said Caradon would make recommendations on the basis of his judgment of the situation in Anguilla.

The time Lord Caradon spends there will depend on his own assessment, but it will probably last a few days, he added.

Dictator Pledges Return to Sanity

KARACHI (AP)—Pakistan's military dictator, Gen. Yahya Khan, said today he would "bring back sanity" to the stage for free elections.

"I wish to make it absolutely clear to you that I have no ambition other than the creation of conditions conducive to the establishment of a constitutional government," he said in his first broadcast after taking over from President Mohammed Ayub Khan.

Sixteen hours before Ayub Khan resigned after appointing Yahya supreme commander of Pakistan's armed forces and chief martial law administrator.

Yahya's promise to "bring back sanity" was the same made by Ayub when he seized power in 1963 and ruled by martial law for three years.

Ayub, who announced earlier he would not seek re-election next year, admitted Tuesday night this did not satisfy his political opponents and he could not cope with mob violence wrecking Pakistan's eastern flank on the other side of India.

"My first task will be to restore administration back to the rule," Yahya said. "Strikes and industrial unrest have brought the nation to the edge of an abyss."

"The nation has to be pulled back to safety and normal conditions have to be restored without delay. I and the armed forces could not remain idle spectators of this state of near anarchy."

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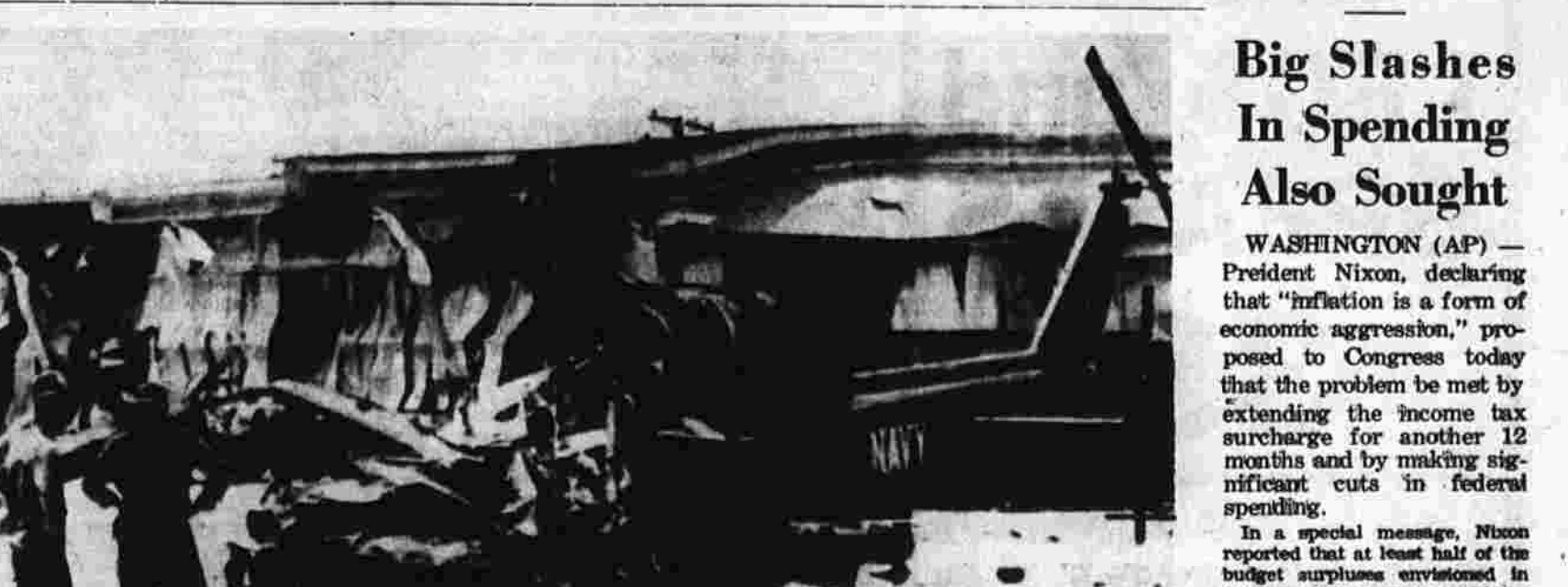

BOSTON (AP)—Forecasters of dry weather for at least the next two days eased the flood threat today in southern New England where 1 to 3 inches of rain Tuesday turned streets into lakes and poured water into basements.

An engineer spokesman said 200,000 sand bags had been distributed as a precautionary measure and 100,000 more were stockpiled in Ft. Devens in Ayer.

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Packard Grilled Over 'Safeguard'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chairman J. W. Fulbright of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee put new pressure on the Nixon administration today to seek arms control talks with the Soviet Union before deploying the Safeguard antimissile system.

"Test the water and see what their attitude is," he told Deputy Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird. "They say they are in the mood to do it. I can't understand our reluctance."

"It's not my place to decide when arms control talks are going to be undertaken," replied Packard, who appeared before the foreign relations subcommittee to submit technical data in support of the Safeguard system.

But he modified that statement to say his responsibility includes helping to bring about talks on limiting nuclear arms.

Packard encountered much of the same hostile questioning and comments that greeted Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird when he appeared Friday in support of the \$7 billion Safeguard plan to protect the nation's retaliatory nuclear strength.

The deputy secretary declined to draw into speculation about potential damage to U.S. cities if Safeguard missiles intercepted and destroyed incoming enemy nuclear missiles.

"The name of the game is not to get us into a nuclear war," he said. "Noting the Safeguard's mission is to protect the U.S. nuclear capability, Packard said it

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Ammunition Dumps Explode

SAIGON (AP)—Enemy mortars struck a major U.S. base south of Saigon early today, blowing up 500 tons of ammunition, wrecking scores of buildings and destroying three helicopters, killing a few Americans and wounding more than 60 others.

Shells of the headquarters base of the 9th Infantry Division at Dong Tam, 40 miles south of Saigon, were one of 30 rocket and mortar attacks by the Viet Cong on the 32nd night of their spring offensive.

North Vietnamese troops followed up one of the attacks with an infantry charge that carried them to the barbed wire perimeter of another American base 40 miles northwest of Saigon. Before they were driven off eight American air cavalrymen were killed, 17 were wounded and only two enemy bodies were found on the barbed wire.

Col. Ira Hunt of McLean, Va., chief of staff of the 9th Division, estimated that as much as 500 tons of ammunition, mostly small arms, went up in the attack on the Dong Tam base.

"We were expecting it because we had information from a prisoner," Hunt told AP photographer Max Hunt. Hunt said about 13 rounds of 120mm mortars, the biggest in the enemy arsenal, slammed into the base on April 2 and a half before midnight, but caused little damage.

"We thought that was it," said Hunt. "Many men had left their bunkers after the first attack."

Then came another barrage about midnight. One of the first shells hit an ammunition storage pad, triggering a series of explosions in at least half a dozen more pads. After that the base was hit by a mortar attack that killed two men and wounded 10 others.

Two crews got their helicopters off the ground but were knocked down by the exploding shells. A third helicopter was destroyed on the ground.

The 9th Division base has been shelled more than a dozen times during the enemy's spring offensive.

Scores of helicopters and hundreds of men were in the area when the attack on the Dong Tam base.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The chairman of a House subcommittee has accused the Army of a "billion-dollar boo boo" in developing a new tank because:

—Although the tank is for reconnaissance, it can be heard three miles away.

—It has a "rocket tail exhaust" system that makes it an easy target.

—The ceaseless ammunition is ultra-inflammable, leaves burning residue in the breach which can prematurely ignite a round, and is adversely affected by moisture, oil, and rough handling.
