than a general, thereby becoming the perfect military leader for his cause in tween the young professional student and his time. In this reputation, he stands at a guaranteed peak at the moment of He is assured of another place in history as a President. Here his reputation and standing seem certain to grow as

tives on what he did. He became President with the cold war at its height, and with all the hatreds and suspicions of the cold war seemingly dominant in the relations between Americans themselves at home and in the relations between our nation and the rest of the world. He substituted for suspicion and hatred the beginning of mutual respect and trust, at home and abroad. le took bold strokes in behalf of the concept of world law, as when he held that the United Nations must enforce it even against our own best friends at the time of Suez. He took bold stens in the direction of peace. He declared, unequivocally, that in our time it was war, not peace, which had become the impossibility. As general and President combined

he said there could be no more victories. He was not always lucky in the gambles he took toward peace. The potential dove moment which might have saved his successors both Cuba and Vietnam was blasted when one of his own spy planes was shot down over Russia, and when second round advice talked alm out of his first reaction instinct, which was to apologize for it.

But when the historians of the future get around to finding out how sick his nation and his world were when he became President, and realize how much healing he tried to do, and how much he did really accomplish, they are going to have to determine that this was one of the few really great American Pres-

He was this exceptional general, he had this potential greatness as President, because he was a certain kind of individual. He will certainly go down in our national history as one of the finest, truest examples of native, natural product of our soil and our culture and our time and our democracy.

We hope such breeding, by Americans in an American atmosphere, does not now desert us completely. We hope it does not have to be recorded that Dwight Eisenhower was the last of a certain kind of American.

But what an American he has been! As American as corn, and as prairie, and as boyhood in a small town, and as football, as American as church and luncheon club and high golf scores and farm and cattle, as American as Gettys-

There was an innocence, a goodness. a candor, an uncomplicated honesty, a fellowship, an eagerness to like and be liked which draped a natural nobility over this product of a Kansas town. Washington was more of a rock, and Lincoln was more of a saint, but these were relatively early, specialized products of the American soil and the American scene. Dwight Eisenhower has been the all-time all-American, the one individual in whom all our best qualities were mixed into the shape and feature which were so much all of us, at our peak best, that we look at him now, for our national farewells, and see the good image of The American. We fear, from the tempers and diseases and trends of the time, that he may prove to have been the last real demonstration of the breed, along with being its first perfection. But he himself would have been the first to say that good things do not really die, though their symbols may prove mortal. He was all of us, at our best. May we be that good some day again.

Those young present day medical stuints who are making headlines for hemselves and kicking over the traditional applecart by refusing the usual gifts made to medical students by various drug manufacturers are not, of course, inferring that all the physicians now practicing who accepted those gifts during their own student days have ever ince remained in the clutches of the

One of the drug manufacturers involved counters this point with the contention that if the companies ceased all their help to young medical students, that wouldn't reduce the cost of pills more than one-twentieth of a cent per prescription. But the young rebels think they are making their point, nonetheless.

What do we think of it? Are these rebels. by their public show of excess "honesty" going to succeed in ending the practice and thereby make things tougher for some other young medical students who may happen to need free textbooks and instruments, and who may never really have to sell their soul in return for them? What great evil can be proved from the "wicked" past, in which this attempted "bribery" was taken as one of the traditions of the relationship be-

Or should any gift which really doesn't make sense unless it is intended as a bribe of some sort be rejected automatically and flatly? Should a young student entering a sacred and idealistic calling be forgiven if he decides to try to keep his own principles as clean and sharp as the instruments he must learn to use? Is there ever such a thing as too

sympathy for the manufacturers whose tender, generous feelings may have been hurt, is in favor of this revolutionary youthful idea of honesty. And rather than saying it might be too much, we think we regret that such noble ideas of our idealistic youthtimes do not survive better into our practicing maturities. And our reason is as much pragmatic as it is principled. In the long run, when all the psychological returns are in, honesty

'Swiftly Into Adulthood'

The armed forces offers a young man

important satisfactions and accomplishments. He can grow physically, mentally, and spiritually. Military service is a unique testing ground. Its equality is pitiless and unparalleled. Family, culture, religion, wealth, education, and station make no difference. A lad is on his own. Nobody saves him from the con sequences of his actions. He is placed among his peers in the most elemental circumstances and tested to see of what stuff he is made. In barracks and aboard ship he lives with men of all typescoarse and refined, brutish and sensitive rich and poor, intelligent and stupid. He need not like them all, but he must work with them and share in a common life. There is value in this, To win acceptance on the basis of performance alone is one of life's deep satisfactions. The services make maximum demands but they also reward performance. The hard-won corporal's stripes mean vastly more than a minuscule pay raise. And there is no escape from having to "deliver the goods."

Military service is an opportunity to participate in a special way in the affairs of one's time. No man wisely seeks to escape the common experience of his age. The child's question, "Where were you during the war, Daddy?" implies an expectation that Daddy was occupied with something relevant. When the rest of society is caught up in momentous events, one loses something if one has to say, "I had no part in them."

To learn to function as a member of team with full acceptance of personal accountability to its other members; to win such mastery over self that one can keep going while aching to quit; to be able to obey orders and accept discipline; to know that one is reliable—these are major accomplishments. They retain their value in civilian life. Thus, military service has a refining, purging ef-

Also, it offers a breathing period withwhich to read and think and talk. The give-and-take with one's peers in totally new surroundings is an invigorating experience. Exposure to the harsher side of life yields insights which come slowly to civilians. In the service one learns that life is a succession of examinations. The need to stay abreast of political and technological developments eventually felt by every serviceman. He must learn new skills, drill, and keep relevance. — REV. EDWARD I. 



Tin chandelier in dining room is suspended from oak beam.





land a decade ago was a far cry from what it is today. There was hardly a whole roof over their head as they could stand in the kitchen on a rainy day and the rain would drizzle down on their heads if they didn't watch out. The water supply was a problem, too. Gradually holes were fixed and plumbing was updated and rooms were painted and papered to make the home attractive and livable. But a friend of the Cummings, a Mr. Edwin J. Meyer, whose avocation is restoring homes of the early 1700's, saw tremendous possibilities in their home. I was through Meyer's persistent hat the Cummi took a complete house gutting to restore it to its original state. Known as the Elijah Chapmar Homestead, it is believed to have been built about 1730. Records reveal that English officers were housed here during the siege of Yorktown. Little did the Cummings guess what they would discov-er as they took out not one wall, not two walls, but three walls before the original wall

Before the days of central heating, it was thought that the addition of an extra interior wall would help keep out the cold. This may have helped when the only heat came from fireplace in an inside wall. 





















