





Prof. Pinsky Offers New Welfare Plan HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) -

A proposal to restructure Connecticut's social welfare system was presented Wednesday to the legislature's Welfare Committee. The new system, proposed by Prof. David Pinsky of the Uni-versity of Connecticut, would provide monthly lump sums for welfare recipients to spend as needed, but it would also impose penalties for refusing suitable training or employment.
Following a closed-door discussion with Pinsky, committee chairman Morris Cohen, D-Bloomfield, said the proposed no-strings-attached allotment would also mean no supplement-al funds would be allowed. He said "if they run out of money it will be their own fault-and Cohen pointed out what he considered a major feature of the act, dealing with employ-ment opportunity or persons

The retiring President felt easier, however, about his intervention in the Dominican Republic. This, he was willing to claim, had been all success, and had come out right. And there had been a great deal of contemporary comment ready to admit that, despite the deep national division our intervention caused at the time, both in the Dominican Republic and here at home, things came

out pretty well. This complacent assumption was seriously challenged the other day, however, by one observer, Lewis H. Diuguid of the Washington Post, writing from Santo

He found the Dominican Republic still divided, and "obsessively dependent" on American help and advice and enterprise. "Democracy," he reported, "is only a catchword in the remarkably cynical Dominican game of politics." Even the erstwhile Dominican liberals, who once held power by virtue of a democratic election, and who lost that power at the hands of the Dominican army and the U.S. Marines four years ago, have gone sour on the idea that iemocracy is a thing that can work for Dominicans, and are now talking about bypassing the electoral process, if they get a chance, and establishing a "popular

Only the belief that the Marines w land again, writes this correspondent, keeps the Dominican politicians from having out, again, the same showdown they were staging in 1955, when President Johnson ordered in our troops. Our 1955 intervention, concludes Cor-

respondent Diuguid, may have resolved nothing, but merely postponed the con-Not all observers will take this view. They will note that surface law and order prevail in the Dominican Republic, and

they will tend to discount some of the tales of oppression by the regime which maintains such law and order. And they will say this is better for the Dominicans, as well as safer for the United States, than it would have been to allow some suspiciously liberal regime win the 1955 revolution, and perhaps establish ties with Castro. For those of us who like to play the

game of balance sheets with current history, the main thing seems to be that the record of the Dominican intervention is still open for continuing returns. If the four years of enforced relative quiet and order have also been years of deepening. unrelenting stress and strain, of new oppressions generating new instincts toward rebellion, of American military strength serving as the unofficial boss of country supposed to develop its own capacity for self government, then there may be an eventual price greater for the Dominicans than they would ever have paid if our Marines had stayed home in 1955.

A Credibility Lag? One would have thought there had been

enough public attention paid to a thing called a credibility gap, during a previous administration, to warn all members of the new national administration. Certainly the leader of that new administration, President Nixon himself, has been more than scrupulous in establishing candor as his number one standard in his relations with the press, or in his pursuit of policy objectives.

But the lesson he has learned rather easily, perhaps because he is a practiced politician, does not seem to have penetrated some of the less experienced newcomers to high Washington place. So far, the chief offender has been Deputy Secretary of Defense David Packard. His first mistake lay in telling the Senate Disarmament Subcommittee that he had "consulted" a West Coast scientist on the anti-missile missile defense system, when all he had done was exchange a word or two with the scientist at an airport.

Packard's second mistake was to try to discredit a witness against the antiballistic missile program by claiming that he had previously been pessimistic and negative about our Polaris missile program. However it happened, Packard was mistaken about the scientist's record with regard to Polarie.

In each onse, the Deputy Secretary o Defense was giving spontaneous off-hand answers to questions or comments posed to him during the committee hearing. But he was, of course, functioning in a national goldfish bowl. In each case, he revealed himself over-eager to reach for evidence or testimony that might impress the committee. In each case, he built up future suspicion of his own future public statements.

This performance, together with that of Defense Secretary Laird which preceded it, has helped get the new Department of Defense, and its Pentagon prompters, off to a very poor start in the new age of credibility.

Lord Snow, Flatterer

It would, of course, take a wise old character like C. P. Snow, the famous British novelist and physicist combined, to present the proposition to an audience at a Jewish Institute of Religion during the Passover season. But what C. P. Snow wanted to know

is a problem that has intrigued many lesser minds, too, and tempted them toward the kind of answer he gave. "Why," asked Lord Snow before his not-unsympathetic audience, 'have the Jews been so successful?

"The record," he went on, "is remarkable, and quite outside any sort of statistical probabilities. Well, take any test of achievement you like-in any branch of science, mathematics, literature, music, public life. The Jewish performance has been not only disproportionate, but almost ridiculously disproportionate. To use a crude criterion, run your eye down the lists of Nobel Prize winners for the last 25 years. You will find something between a third and a quarter have Jewish names. "Roughly the same astonishing per-

formance turns up whatever kind of human excellence you examine. "This isn't arguable," Lord Snow continued. "The facts are plain. But why is it? One answer is, of course, that the Jewish environment makes for the utmost use of talent. The very obvious truth that a Jewish person starts with two strikes against him means that he will struggle through where others

Lord Snow wondered, as he made that point, whether the progressive easing of that struggle will cause "the explosion of talent in due course to lose its

"Will that happen?" he asked. "Or is there something in the Jewish gene-pool which produces talent on quite a different scale from, say, the Anglo-Saxon gene-pool. I am prepared to believe that may be so."

What most of us think, we guess, is that the subjects of Lord Snow's admiration have both things going for them-they are born smarter and, then, on top of that, they work harder. As for the final question, they don't seem to let success spoil them, either. Or, for that matter, Lord Snow, flattery.

Annual Sessions

With all the talk of annual sessions of the General Assembly buzzing around the halls of the State Capitol at Hartford, it is interesting to note that the Virginia House of Delegates last week unanimously approved annual sessions for the legislature. The action means that the annual session proposal will be incorporated in the state's new constitu-

It is expected to win approval of the Senate and later by the voters in a constitutional referendum. This will end a century-long tradition of biennial ses-Strangely enough in Virginia, however, the State Commission on Constitu-

tional Revision recommended retention of the biennial sessions. Brevity is clearly defined in the proposal for the annual sessions. Under the legislative article approved by the House, the Assembly will meet for a period of 60 days in every even-numbered year, and for 30 days in every





Zip Codes

Zip codes, which the Post Office Department urges all letter writers to use, are rarely utilized by clerks in sorting individual pieces of first-class mail. Most such mail is still sorted into mail sacks arranged in "schemes" or systems based on town names. Zip coding's principal value is in better sorting and distribution of bulk mailings of second- and third-class mail. The Post Office Department is proud, however, that some 70 per cent of all individual letters now include a zip code. This widespread use, spokesmen say, will expedite mail handling if automatic code-reading letter-sorting machines become widely used by the department. — THE NATIONAL OB
