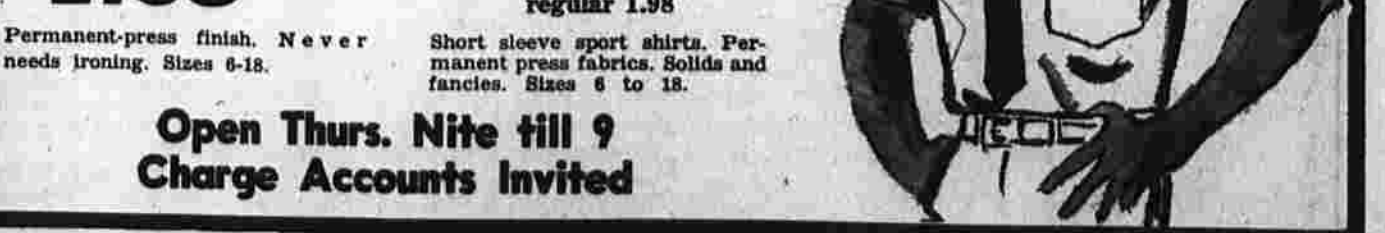

Mamie Eisenhower Bids Abilene Gracious Farewell

ABILENE, Kan. (AP)—The little town of Dwight D. Eisenhower's boyhood and burial is still.

The body of its greatest son lies in the tranquil hills of the chapel near the home where he grew up.

A spray of yellow gladioli lies on the marble slab covering the vault where the body rests in its plain, GI coffin.

They were left by Mamie in final, tender tribute to the 83 years she had been his wife.

Desolate, the widow who had carried herself with grace and dignity through five wrenching days of national tribute, wearily retraced today the route of the funeral train back to the town.

This time, there was no flag-draped coffin to accompany her in a nearby hearse car. Her companions were family, friends, a few military officers, and the Secret Service bodyguard that was an echo of her eight years as "First Lady" to the 34th president of the United States.

At the chapel on Buckeye Street, near the entrance to the Eisenhower Center where there used to be only a cemetery, an impressive crowd gathered after Wednesday's funeral to see the general's tomb.

Less than an hour after the tearful widow had left the burial service, the Stars and Stripes folded and crumpled to her bosom, laughing children were romping in the playground, and the little Lincoln grammar school a few yards away.

By the Army's estimate, 100,000 persons overflowed the town of 8,000 for the final tribute. A massive crowd took place before nightfall.

Two guards from the General Services Administration, which runs the Eisenhower complex, had replaced the scores of trim soldiers who had formed a cordon around the grounds a few hours earlier.

One estimated that perhaps 5,000 had entered the "Place of Meditation" by the time the doors were locked in the chilly, early spring twilight.

By then, only a dozen persons stood before the chapel, talking quietly, taking pictures around the circular fountain.

A few others wandered the grounds nearby peering in the windows of the white-trimmed boyhood home or the glassed-in garage sheltering the olive drab 1942 Cadillac that was his start car when he was supreme allied commander in Europe.

Those who entered the chapel stepped to a low metal grating and gazed down into a sunken stop sign, yesterday. He is scheduled to appear in Manchester Circuit Court 12 April.

South Windsor High School 'Loft' Concept May Save the Town Money

The new "loft" concept for the proposed new high school compares favorably in cost to the standard type of construction, said Robert O'Connell, chairman of the Public Buildings Commission this week.

The preliminary plans unveiled by town officials by architect Russell L. Stocker and Louis J. Calaveccio this week show the school would cost the town \$8.8 million if all the Board of Education's specifications are met.

According to O'Connell, how the school would be built would be able to make a reduction of about \$1 million in cost "in the educational area."

The primary consideration in reducing the overall cost of the school is the town's bonding capacity of the town as of July 1 would be \$7.8 million. The report also recommended that the Town Council authorize an amount of money for the proposed high school not to exceed \$2,200,000.

Now that the board has presented a plan which encompasses all the board's requirements, the board and the architect will work toward reducing the total figure, said O'Connell.

At this time, according to O'Connell, the board is very anxious to cooperate, and every one is very excited about the "loft" concept.

Using the "loft" concept the architects are able to make great economies in construction by eliminating corridors, and to increase the ratio of interior walls to exterior walls, according to the O'Connell.

The basic layout would be that three floors containing 700 students each would be lined up opposite a similar group of buildings which would serve as a swimming pool, auditorium and so on. In between the two groups of buildings would be built a neighborhood which would serve as a corridor for the passage of students from one area to another.

In this type of design, said O'Connell, 80 per cent of the available space is used for educational space, rather than the 52 per cent of the average school building, according to O'Connell.

Managers of the Ford Foundation is considering financial assistance to the town for defraying the cost of development of this type of school.

The town officials will be going to New Bedford, N. H., next Monday to tour a building which is similar in concept to the "loft" concept.

March Building 33% Higher Than in 1968

sights on some 80 Southern counties with heavy Negro population. In addition, there are plans to enlist garbage collectors, janitors and other low-paid workers in local campaigns. A national student conference is planned in Atlanta this summer. But Abernathy said, "The forces of evil are becoming so sophisticated that it will be very difficult to rally here a conventional march."

"You're just not going to have another Bull Connor and Jim Clark," Abernathy said. It was Connor who as police commissioner provoked white segregationist symbol in King's 1963 Birmingham, Ala., campaign that galled police dogs and fire hoses against Negro marchers—and produced a federal civil rights law.

Clark was a county sheriff likewise cast in the villain role for the 1966 Selma, Ala., drive that brought the voting rights act.

This problem, however, is not the basis of the most persistent question raised about SCLC from the outside: Will it survive as an effective force without King?

"Unquestionably there were two institutions: Dr. King and the SCLC," said Home L. Williams, director of voter registration and political education. He said when King was killed "everybody on the staff went through a period of hopelessness."

But now, Williams said, staff members are beginning to recover and to rally behind Abernathy's leadership.

Abernathy describes his first year at the SCLC helm as a "creative one." He still tends to be defensive but is less preoccupied with the inevitable comparisons between him and King.

Abernathy said Abernathy's job would be made harder, unintentionally, by Mrs. King's efforts to raise millions of dollars for memorial projects honoring King.

But Williams said he wasn't worried. "When I go out in the field, I'm just going to leave it to the Lord and Rev. Abernathy."

"SCLC's last mail appeal did 'pretty well,'" said Young. But an appeal last Thanksgiving, "usually our biggest"—brought meager returns, he said.

"We got only about one-fourth of what we usually get," he said. Young interpreted that as a result of multiple demands on the same source—by SCLC, "peace" candidates and the political campaigns of Sen. Edward Kennedy and Robert F. Kennedy; and former Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

An important factor: About 20 of the top staff members draw salaries from sources other than SCLC. Williams, for example, is supported by a church agency. Persistent speculation that Abernathy's leadership might be shaky or facing challenge from Young or the Rev. Jesse Jackson, young Chicago minister who directs Operation Breadbasket, came into the open recently. A published report said Abernathy would give Mrs. King a bigger role to bolster his own standing.

Abernathy denied the report. And Mrs. King said she already was active in SCLC but had a book to complete and now is moving into the memorial projects.
