

LONDON (AP) - A six-day strike by pilots of British Overseas Airways Corp, ended today after marathon talks that lasted 23 hours.


BOAC planes had been grounded around the world and the national airline estimated it lost \$6 million because of the

strike. Capt. Laurie Taylor, chair-man of the British Afrilines Pitots Association, joined BOAC's chief negotiator, James Ather-ton, in announcing the agree-

ment. Terms of settlement were withheld until the pilots' execu-tive council and membership atify them. The airline was unable to say how quickly normal flight schedules would be re-sumed, but one official said normal operations might now be possible before the end of next

The pilots have been demand-ing a basic minimum of \$18,000 a year for 600 credited hours of lying. BOAC countered with \$15.10 for 660 hours. A senior captain now is paid

The pay wrangle has been going on for several years, with one two-day stoppage and a 17-day strike last summer.



That Christianity which teaches the story of renewal and hope for the human being is itself in continual process of rebirth in its own functional and doctrinal existence.

As an inheritor of revealed truth, it never loses or exhausts the possibility of attaining the fuller, clearer meaning of its doctrine or the possibility of fine ing new application of the doctrine to the problems of a changing world.

It, too, is being continually reborn. Sometimes the process is made explicit, as when, playing a game or trying to make a parable, modern times try out modern language and modern methods. "God is dead!" was the name of the game in that long mock Good Friday which lasted so many months, a few months ago. It turned out, of course, that this was another way of saying that God was more alive than ever, and being continually reborn in new and cleaner and truer perceptions of what people ought to mean when they speak of God.

We live in times which have provided other symbols of the continual rebirth. In some instances, these signs of vitality shape themselves into unorthodox challenge to the common customs and common values of the past. No era of Christianity, except for those of actual schism, has paralleled this one for its efforts at insurrections and its efforts at disciplines. It is a lively, restive religion we have upon us. It questions itself; it seeks more immediate tion of its potential promises to the character of life on earth; perhaps It is in error in doing so; the contest between that patience which thinks most of a next world and the urgency which thinks of doing what ought to be done for this world is sometimes deep and bitter, in a realm where there should be no bitterness.

But out of this all, out of this new expression of ideas and testing of doctrine and flexing of muscles, there may come a religion which is the stronger because it has succeeded in adjusting its own eternal simplicities to the exciting and challenging modern variables of man's scientific ventures into universe space on one hand, into the behavioral psychology and biology of homo sapiens on the other.

Truth is never closed and finished, any more than the thirsts of the human spirit are ever permanently quenched. And religion, like life itself, renews itself in evolutionary struggle, a never-ending, never-static, never-complacent matching of changeless principles to the swiftly changing knowledge of a world which seems to be able to provide its own scientific formula for every possible need except that of saving itself.

Perhaps the boldest exhortation one could give at Easter, 1969, would be this: Do not be afraid if Christianity in our time comes to new life and to a new directness and immediacy of meaning.

No Single Last Word

Our agreement lies with CBS, the television network which rejected Senator Pastore's demand that the television industry agree to show its programs, in advance, to a code authority of the National Association of Broadcasters.

Conceivably, a system in which every program was submitted to a pre-screening for the determination of possible offense in the realm of sex and violence would wind up, in the end, giving up less sex and violence on the screen. It so, however, it would be a questionable kind of gain, which involved a price. And the price would be in the whole realm of the potential healthy, significance, vitality and social value of television as an entertainment media.

The ultimate censorship in televisionand the only censorship which ever really works with regard to any mediumis the eventual censorship of the patron public itself. When it rejects a certain type of program because it has grown sick of it, it rejects with authority. I rejects with its instinct and its taste and all its sensory perceptions, not by any rule by rule attempt to apply some predetermined code. And the final erdict of the patron public demands

respect and compliance, because it can

not be outwitted. What Senator Pastore has demande and what the other two networks have agreed to give him, is a screening process located between the industry and its patron public. Any such process has to try to set up some uniformity for itself. Any forced uniformity of code inevitably kills some good entertainment along with the bad, and, if it remains unchallenged, even tends to downgrade and regularise, in advance, the spirit and quality of the product offered to it. Dr. Frank Stanton, president of CBS, wrote Senator Pastore:

"In our society the determination of taste and propriety as to TV programs must be pluralistic. A single last word would be harmful, indeed dangerous." Somebody in television should figh as every medium should fight, any proposal which heads even part way in the direction of any single last word for anybody except the patron public itself.

The City Song Hit

If you wish to believe in the taste and sanity of those who buy records, or decree the purported popularity of song hits, it is sometimes better to take the statistics without ever hearing the song. "Galveston" has already sold more than 1,000,000 copies, and is supposed to be the latest hit song of the nation. To some ears, it doesn't sound that

If mere quality were to be the deter mining factor, we think "By the Time I get to Phoenix" might be the city song of the year. It's true we haven't even heard "Wichita Lineman" and that we have heard only snatches of something that seems to keep repeating something like "Seattle."

There have, in the past, been such honest workmanlike city songs as "Chicago," and "Manhattan," but only one undeniable classic, which was, and is, and forever will be, "I Left My Heart in San Francisco."

That is the target all these present day would be glorifications of some completely nondescript cities are aiming at.

They don't even come close, Of course, one can't tell what can happen, in the realm of music, when the proper inspiration is present. Who knows what melodies will be born when some composer starts dreaming about Bridgeport, or what lyrics will evolve when somebody starts thinking up rhymes for Manchester?

"Manchester, Manchester, da da di di Manchester!" Sounds pretty good already, like, maybe, half a million copies?

Dangers Of Neglecting History

In order to discover the advantages of studying history, we may consider the dangers of neglecting history. For both nations and individuals have sometimes made a virtue of neglecting history; and history has taken its revenge on them. One instance of such historical revenge is the rise of nationalism in the 19th century. In many ways nationalism is the revolt of historically minded people against rulers who have thought in nonhistorical terms. In 18th century Europe most enlightened men were cosmopolitan, international. They looked back a history and saw it as a "gothic" pas from which they had emerged into the full light of freedom of the present; and they regarded "patriotism," national loyalty, national pride, as a vulgar relic of tribalism. How condescendingly the enlightened" French Encyclopaedist looked at the literature of the past, of which one of them, D'Alembert, would have made a periodic bonfire! How contemptuously they dismissed the atavistic. irrational complaints of the bigoted, unenlightened Poles who squealed and squirmed in a most undignified fashion when their country was carved up and absorbed by the Enlightened Despots of Prussia, Russia and Austria! How impatiently, a generation later, the Bonapartist afrancesados of Spain looked down on the obscurantist bigots who resisted their rational reforms!

But this triumph of reason did not last. In the next century the nations revolted; and their revolt was nourished, everywhere, by history. It was the "historic nations," the nations which were conscious of their history -- the Poles. Italians, Germans --which led the revolt; and all the nations in revolt began by discovering, or inventing, their history. No doubt the history which they discovered was not very good: The cosmopolitans of the 18th century were probably better as historians; but there was a large area of history which those historians had dangerously ignored and which now took its revenge.

We see the same process today in historic Asia and unhistoric Africa. In 1900 the colonial empires seemed "enlightened"; did they not bring material in provement, utility, modernity? The West was benevolent, cosmopolitan, the educator of the world. In 1942, Mr. Wendell Willkie, Franklin Roosevelt's defeated rival for the Presidency of the United States, flew from country to country preaching the glowing message of "One World," and Vice President Wallace afterwards further defined the new American ideal as "the century of the common man." I confess, I detest both these concepts of these two well-meaning men. I prefer variety and sophistication to such uniform banality. But quite apart from personal preference, such variety, I believe, is necessary The variety of custom in the world is not merely the superficial diversity of a fundamentally uniform humanity: It has independent historic roots, and those roots will continue to thrust up shoots, after their kind: Shoots which may be ignored, or cut, or fostered or distort. ed, but cannot be arbitrarily changed. This has been shown clearly in the past 20 years. In 1957, the concrete proposition was to legalize the assumption, by he town and city governments of the state, of the responsibility for busing children to non-public schools. It was stipulated, however, that it would take a local referendum in each community to accomplish this.

In 1969 the proposition is to have the state pay a money grant to the parents of children attending parochial or non-public schools. There would be no referendum involved anywhere; passage of the bill by the Legslature and signature by the Governor would put the system of payments into effect.

And the chief difference between these two requests might seem to be one of degree. this time a lot more money is involved, and any possibility o local community option is removed. But the 1969 proposition could be, in the net, merely an extension of the 1957 propo sition.

That isn't, however, guite the way the proposition sits with this observer. We find ourselves troubled with a feeling that the

two situations are not exactly In 1957 the struggle was primarily symbolic. It was a struggle waged to determine whether this could forever remain "Yankee Connecticut" and whether its Catholic citizens could forever be held in a "second class" status. And when Speaker Nelson Brown cast the deciding vote which broke the tie in the Hcuse of Representatives, that was the grace note which put into the history of the State of Connecticut the symbolic end of the Yankee dominance, the symbolic abolition of grades of

Afterward, it was to be noted just about everybody felt good and clean and healthy and sanctified by the result. But it was also to be noted that, the symbolic victory having been gained, not very much was ever done about putting the symbolic victory to the practical test. And, in truth, the symbolism was vastly more important than the specific issue involved. It was about Catholics as citizens more than it was about buses or parochial schools.
