Anti-War Protests Called in 43 Cities

NEW YORK (AP)—A coalition of anti-war groups was organized today in 43 cities around the nation, reversing protests that have been generally absent in the first two months of the Nixon administration.

The National Action Group, a coalition of a dozen organizations opposing U.S. participation in Vietnam, said thousands would march in New York as part of the Easter weekend series.

It also planned "death watches" at draft boards, "teach-outs" at defense plants, and public vigils for peace.

On Friday a group of women planned a "candlelight vigil" for each American soldier killed in Vietnam the past week—in the small park across from the Federal courthouse in lower Manhattan.

The women were joined later by a number of men, all carrying signs and carrying photos of wounded and dead in Vietnam.

In San Francisco, a rally outside the gates of the 4th Army's Presidio was planned by the G.I.-Civilian Peace March Committee following a procession from the Civic Center.

In Seattle, the G.I.-Civilian Alliance for Peace prepared a weekend series of anti-war conferences to acquaint G.I.s and civilians with the nationwide anti-war movement.

In Honolulu, about 200 anti-war demonstrators proceeded Friday through the Waikiki area to the Army's Ft. of Ruess.

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Pope Paul VI will light a Paschal candle at a vigil service today as Christians around the world prepare to celebrate the resurrection of Christ.

New Heart Device Functions in Man

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—An artificial heart made of fabric and plastic functioned today in the chest of a 47-year-old man, the first recipient of such a device.

A surgical team headed by Dr. Denton A. Cooley performed the three-hour operation Friday at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital.

The recipient, Haskell Karp of Rockville, Ill., was in satisfactory condition after physicians removed his ailing heart and replaced it with the mechanical device.

Cooley, who has performed 18 human heart transplant operations, more than any other surgeon, said the device "is built in a way that it could work indefinitely, but eventually it will wear out only until a donor can be found for a human heart transplant operation."

Lt. Gen. Frank T. Milner, deputy commanding general of the 800,000 U.S. Army troops in Vietnam, said he would be pleased to see the device used to replace the hearts of wounded soldiers.

Tributes Across Nation Memorialize Dr. King

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Henry Loeb and cool rain headed the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, was to lead the march. He memorized the service for King in Memphis Friday.

The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., speaking at a special Good Friday service in suburban Evanston, called on blacks and whites to follow the nonviolent principles of his son.

"Violence pains nothing," the elder King said. "Good men will always be opposed to looting, killing and rioting. We must strive continually for peace, justice and fair play."

President Nixon sent a message of condolence to Dr. King's widow, Coretta, in Atlanta which was delivered by Robert H. Finch, secretary of health, education and welfare, on the eve of the anniversary.

Mrs. King avoided public ceremonies during the day but did visit her husband's grave with her four children. She placed a red and white cross of flowers on the gravestone inscribed: "Free at last, free at last, thank God Almighty I'm free at last."

In Nashville some 300 demonstrators marched to the grounds of the Tennessee State Penitentiary where James Earl Ray is serving a 99-year sentence for King's murder. They said their purpose was to remind Ray "of what he did."

Boston Mayor Kevin White called on Congress to declare King's birthday a national holiday. Later husband of Negroes held a black-only rally in King's honor, at one point asking a Roman Catholic priest and four nuns, all white, to leave.

In Alaska a member of the John Birch Society led the opposition forces that defeated a resolution in the State Senate to declare King's birthday a national day of mourning.

BOAC Pilots' Strike Ends

LONDON (AP)—A six-day strike by pilots of British Overseas Airways Corp. ended today after marathon talks that lasted 28 hours.

BOAC planes had been grounded around the world and the national airline estimated it lost \$8 million because of the strike.

Capt. Laurie Taylor, chairman of the British Airline Pilots Association, joined BOAC's chief negotiator, James Atherton, in announcing the agreement.

Terms of settlement were withheld until the pilots' executive council and membership agreed, but one official said normal flight schedules would be resumed, but one official said normal operations might now be possible before the end of next week.

The pilots have been demanding a basic minimum of \$10,000 a year for 600 credit hours of flying. BOAC countered with \$12,000 for 600 hours.

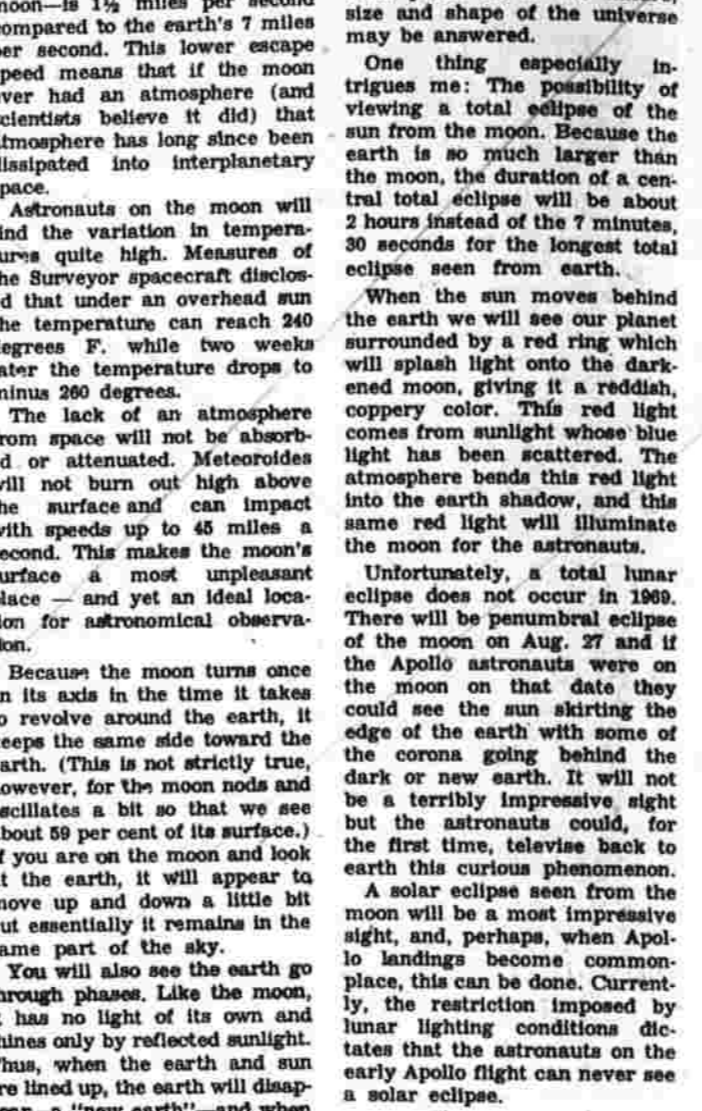

Miss Copeland is getting accustomed to being glared at in buses and sniffed at by female

passengers in subways. She knows that the show's producers withhold most of the hate mail Andrea receives, but Joan did receive a letter signed "The Viewers."

"You'd better stop this," she was told. "We are writing your husband Sam and his friends so that they know what you are doing."

She receives a lot of earnest mail pleading with her to give Sam a divorce and to reform.

Andrea is not only a frustrated murderer but she is a solitary drinker and the only member of the cast allowed to smoke cigarettes.

But Miss Copeland, veteran of five Broadway shows and an early member of the Actors' Studio, insists that Andrea is just misguided.

End of the '21st Century'

NEW YORK (AP) — Time files for television: "The 21st Century" will disappear after only three seasons.

The CBS series of that name will be terminated at the end of this season, but not from the usual cause of TV death.

The show's ratings actually have held pretty well, considering that it arrives early Sunday evenings, just outside of prime time, and for the early part each season was occasionally washed by an overlong football game.

"The 21st Century" will be displaced the first of next season by a new series called "Challenge". Its executive producer, Burton Benjamin, thinks

the new title will give his staff more scope.

The present series concentrates on the broader aspects—among this season's subjects have been the new medicine, the new biology, transportation changes, oceanography and such. Next year, it can give close-ups of the people making the new world.

Presumably Benjamin's half-hour documentary next Thursday night—"Volcano: An Island Is Born"—would have been one of the forthcoming instead of a special. It will show an island rising from the sea after an eruption from an undersea volcano.

Benjamin, a man of broad enthusiasms and a reporter's curiosity, is the senior executive producer of CBS News with a string of "CBS Reports" to his credit. He spent some chilly months during World War II on a Coast Guard weather ship near Iceland, which indirectly led to the volcano documentary.

"I've been interested in any-

thing to do with Iceland since the war," he said. "So when I read about the volcano and the eruption and the emergence of the island, I wondered if by any chance anybody had made some film of it."

It turned out that somebody had, and by good fortune it was a professional. The film was excellent. In addition, Burton learned, the island of volcanic residues was of special interest to scientists because over the past six years plant life—lichens and moss—have begun to appear. Birds and a few adventurous seals now are moving in.

"Some of them believe that, for the first time, they can see how life started on the earth itself," the producer said.

MORE CLASSICS

Television, in its quest for entertainment, is increasingly tapping the classics for specials. CBS had already presented "Midsummer's Night Dream" and plans "King Lear" for next season. NBC has "Little Women" coming up next month in

ballet form, and now has signed Sir Laurence Olivier, Sir Ralph Richardson, Michael Redgrave and Dame May Evans for a production of "David Copperfield" next season.

## Petula Clark: Style's the Thing

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — She seems tiny, even frail, but when Petula Clark begins to sing, there is no mistaking her authority. Her admirers will be able to see and hear their Pet Monday when she stars in her second television special on NBC.

To casual listeners who heard her "Downtown" and other big selling records, Petula Clark seemed to be another teen-age favorite. Such an attitude ranks the British singer, who pointed out that she was no rock 'n' roller but a performer who has appeared in cabarets and concert halls throughout Europe.

More recently she has added a new dimension to her career: movies. She can currently be seen with Fred Astaire in "Finian's Rainbow." Coming up: "Goodbye, Mr. Chips" with Peter O'Toole.

Between tapings for Monday's special with guests Andy Williams, Oscar nominee Ron Moody and guitarist-singer

Sacha Distel, Petula mused on how her own singing style has developed.

"It has changed a great deal in the past two or three years," she remarked. "Some of it has to do with what happens when you have a certain success, like 'Downtown.' Suddenly you have enough confidence to let yourself go, to relax and perform the way you would like to."

"But I think the change in my style began even before 'Downtown.' It really started when I spent some time singing in France."

The singer is married to a Frenchman, Claude Wolfe, and until recently they and their two children made their home in Paris. Now they reside in Geneva "because privacy isn't respected in France any more," as well as for tax advantages.

"Singing in France was especially good for my style," Petula said. "The French aren't very musical; they care more about the lyric than the melody. For that reason there aren't many good singers in France, but there are many excellent performers who know how to interpret songs. They seem to know how to get inside the meaning of the words."

"The simple matter of singing is only part of it. Anyone with a fair amount of voice can sing. The difference is in how you deliver the lyrics. That's what sets people like Frank Sinatra and Tony Bennett apart from the others. They seem able to digest their songs."

"If a singer can touch the audience, not only musically but with the meaning of a song as well, that's the real thrill."

Petula has mixed feelings about her film debut as a singing star. "Finian's Rainbow" was something of a stepchild at Warner Brothers, she observed, since it followed the expensive and temperamentally explosive "Camelot."
