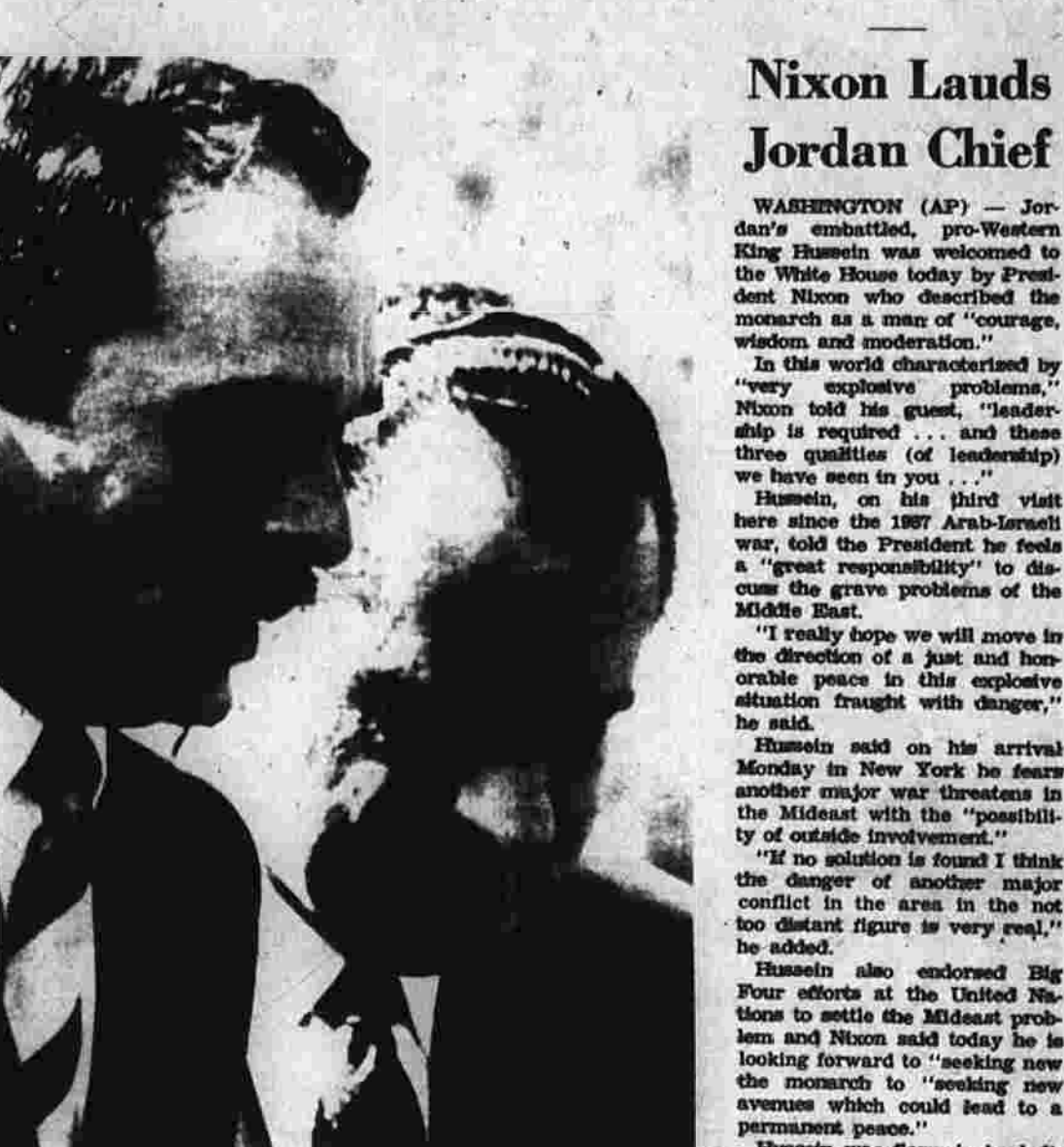

available, the artificial one was taken out, and that was that.

This is fascinating business. Even more fascinating, however, are some of the further problems that might be encountered.

What if the recipient, finding the artificial heart does not seem to be capable of keeping him alive for as long as he himself is content to remain tethered to the immovable pumping apparatus, should have decided that he did not want to take the risk of taking a human heart transplant in its place?

Suppose no human heart for transplant had ever shown up. Would the doctors who installed the artificial heart then have had the duty of maintaining it and operating it for the recipient in perpetuity, on pain of being guilty of murder if they attempted to remove it or allow it functioning to lapse?

Eventually, it is obviously hoped, recipients of such artificial hearts will be able to carry their own power and pumping apparatus around with them.

Until that happens, one can visualize what would be full of artificial hearts keeping people temporarily alive, perhaps on one uniform pumping system into which any number could be plugged, beating as one, while they wait for something as they can take home.

Whatever is wonderful and impossible, that's what they'll think of, and then do.

Play What?

People who could at one time name most of the players in the game now even name the teams. There are 24 such teams to memorize, if one chooses to do that. No many of them are easily memorable because they have a certain fame or because they have certain famous and popular stars wearing their uniform. The biggest individual attraction of the 1969 season is the reorganization, in the capacity of manager, of one of the great player stars of yesterday.

If one cares who the 24 teams are, he discovers that the 12 teams in each league—the League are still titled National League and American League, have been divided into two divisions, one in each of Eastern, the other Western.

One advantage of this arrangement is that although there are 12 teams in each league, no team need ever divide home and away games. Each team will play six home games, and statistically, everybody is going to play a lot better baseball this year.

In order to accommodate the playoff series of five games between the two divisional leaders in each league, the season has been lengthened by a week, which means that the season will open at the earliest date in history. The season will be complete by the end of September.

Another thing that will be accomplished by the increase in the number of teams in each league is that the total attendance which has been recorded in recent years. The rule of thumb seems to be to add four new teams every year by the election year of 1970.

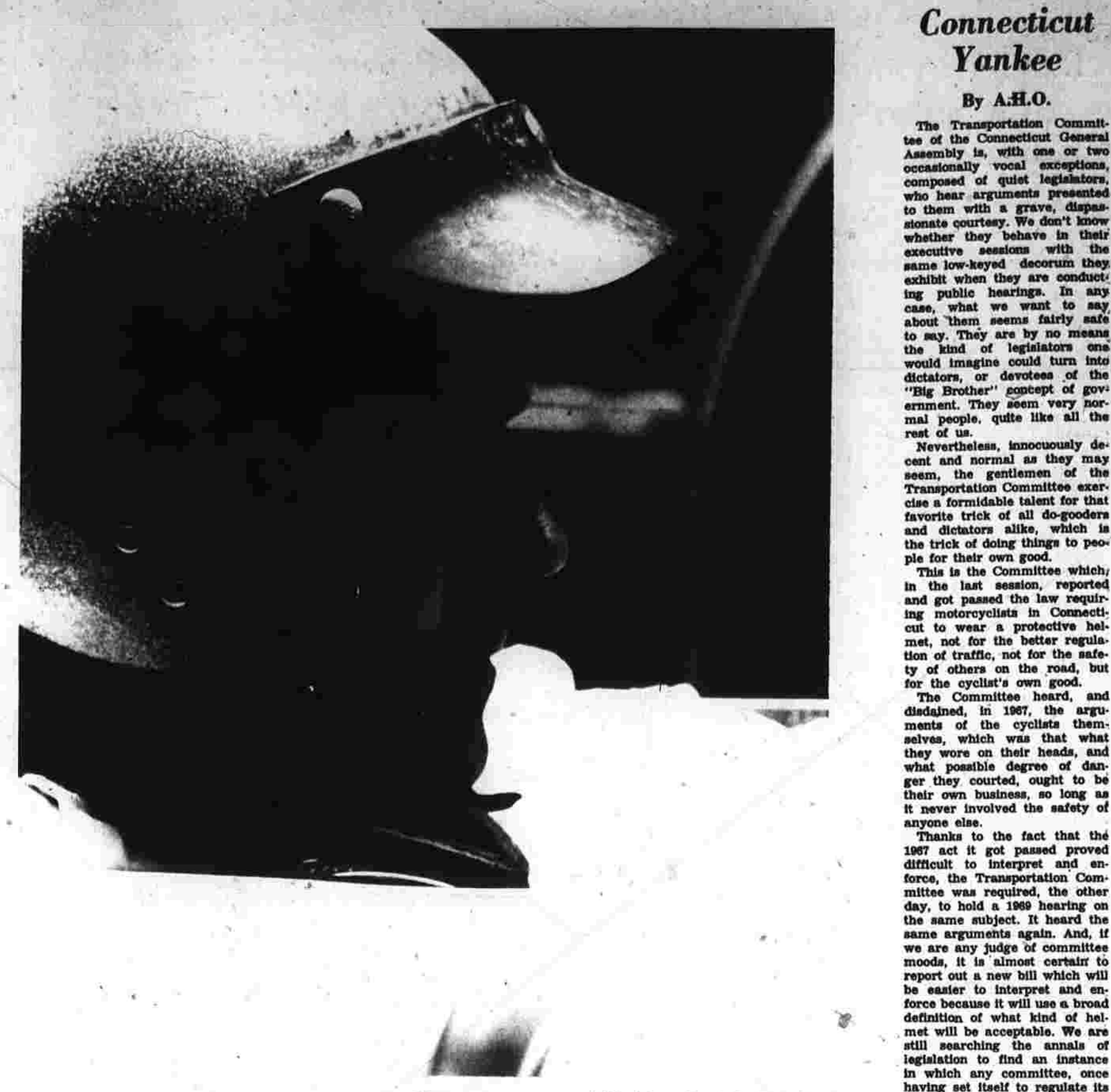

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The Town's Drug Problem As Some Users See It
 By DRUG USERS

Through various means, The Herald interviewed several drug users whose views ranged from smoking "pot" or marijuana to "snorting" heroin or heroin. Most of those interviewed were young, but one was an older man who quit drugs when he faced the prospect of becoming a trimmer.

The following are excerpts from each interview:

An 18-year-old high school senior said, "I don't believe marijuana is nearly as dangerous as it is supposed to be. I've been stoned on it for six months straight without any noticeable ill effects."

"I think it is better for your body and mind than things like alcohol and certainly less dangerous than cigarettes and narcotics for their own good."

"Some of the other drugs, like speed, are extremely dangerous. I'd start smoking pot about age 18. It tapers off about 24 or 36 hours. It's not addictive, but they had had some involved. But blue is a drug. Except for some very hard core users, plus is not."

"Pot is the drug most used here. Mostly the poorer forms. The kids aren't that into it. They like the good marijuana."

"I don't just try it once or twice. A few of us really enjoy its effects. It lets you see your subconscious mind. It sets you on a pattern of improvement."

A 17-year-old high school senior said, "You can't put pot in the high school. It's around town."

You don't have to be rich, you just have to have your own money.

"I haven't heard anything about heroin here, but most other stuff."

"The girls use pot just as much as the boys. But they want the boys to get it. They don't pay cause it's usually a girl friend. Girls stick mostly to marijuana."

"A pot party: You all get into a small room. You fill up a pipe and let it go around the room for awhile. Everybody takes a puff. There's usually just one pipe, but it doesn't matter, everybody gets some."

"Kids don't always know it's going to be a pot party. I don't know anybody who would smoke a pipe. Everybody gets stoned. It's a different feeling altogether. I mean, I feel like I'm in a tank. I know you have your temples pound, your eyes get red. It's really different. Not too many of my friends mind it. It's a different high. Everything has a different high. It's pleasant but it really messes up your mind. The kids are aware of brain damage from it. They can get involved up to their ears if you let yourself."

"It's a great thing and shouldn't be fooled with. I haven't seen anybody do anything rash. Marijuana is not that bizarre. Teen can smoke marijuana. Unfortunately, it's illegal. It doesn't rot your liver, it doesn't mess up your brain. It's not like a package store. There's all that junk."

"The police? Help, the paranoias are after me."

"If you're black or a minor, you'll have a lot more trouble with the police."

"About heroin I know virtually nothing. But I think if you slow them the real facts, and I don't mean show them the pain of the junkies, I think they will shape up."

"I turned on to grass. But it was no good. I learned what I wanted to learn. I saw the trees better. Now I've become almost trained to see without marijuana. I see it like it is."

A 26-year-old Manchester man active in Alcoholics Anonymous said, "The sore spot with me is that some people are senseless enough to want to do it (pot) and not do it."

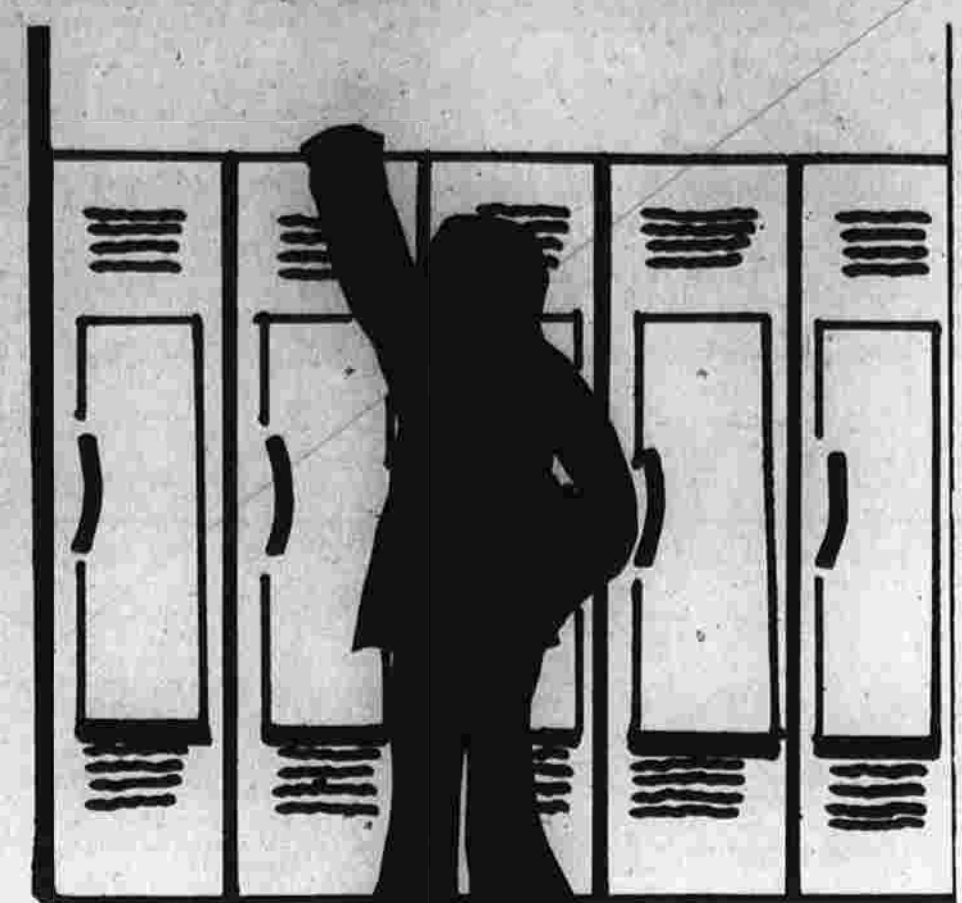
"When I was drinking and smoking, I was playing beautiful piano. But it struck me a road tour. I laid in bed for a week. I couldn't call them today. They cost about \$1 a piece. You had to keep them to buy it. I never questioned the boys about where they got it in the first place."

"They took benies (benzodrine pills). I was becoming depressed. One day I got involved. I couldn't play without them. I'd shake apart on the stand."

"I went home. I had nine dollars out of that crazy world."

"Lots of marijuana were on drugs and booze. The public was not aware. Bunny Berrigan and Rex Barberback were among the victims. Bud Call body lay in a New York morgue for three days unclaimed after he died from a heart attack."

"And what about families. They're really hurt by drugs."

Major Drugs; Their Effect

Marijuana—Called "pot" or "grass." Derived from female hemp plant. Usually smoked. A mild hallucinogen that distorts perceptions of time, space and coordination. Strong doses can cause short-term psychotic reactions. Long-term effects are not known. To use marijuana is to "get high," "turn on," or "get stoned." Marijuana cigarettes are called "hash."

Amphetamines—Called "junk," "speed," or "pep pills." Brain and nervous cause psychological dependence. Gradually cause greater physical effects. Cocaine is similar.

NEW YORK (AP)—Professional baseball's second century got underway Monday and for Ted Williams and Oystie King, two of the sport's new managers, the next 100 years can only get better.

Williams' Boston Senators were named #4 by the New York Yankees in the presidential election. King's debut was two out from becoming a success when the Atlanta Braves pushed another two runs in the bottom of the ninth and shipped the San Francisco Giants to Los Angeles.

The Cincinnati Reds, descendants of the first pro baseball team back in 1869, dropped their traditional home opener 3-2 to Los Angeles.

The remaining 18 teams, including expansionists Montreal and San Diego in the National League and Kansas City and Seattle in the American, swing into action today.

The Yankees unveiled their new lineup as Roy White stole two bases and Bill Robinson one.

It was the first time in 19 years the Yankees were without Mickey Mantle on the roster and the Washington scoreboard flashed the following message:

"He's fishing, somewhere off Apaloo, I think," said Phil Rizzuto, a Yankee broadcaster.

Four unseated runs in the fourth wrapped it up as Mel Stephens staggered to a 14-run home run in the ninth by Roy White. The majors' 1969 two-run home in the ninth by Stephens and Bobby Murcer walloped consecutive home runs.

The Senators' starting pitcher, Jim Bouton, threw 14-10.
