MISAC To Break Ground For Apartments Sunday

Spiritual leaders of seven town religious bodies will hold ground breaking ceremonies Sunday at 2 p.m. at 247 Oakland St. for the 191-unit apartment complex their groups are sponsoring through MISAC.

MISAC is a non-profit corporation formed more than two years ago by the seven groups under a proposal by the Manchester Interfaith Social Action Committee, according to Aitzy Arnold H. Khan, executive secretary of MISAC.

The seven new Center Congregational Church, North United Methodist Church, St. James Episcopal Church, St. James Methodist Church, South United Methodist Church and Temple Beth Shalom. The complex is being built by Carabetta Enterprises of Meriden under the National Housing Act. The \$2,200,000 mortgage will be written by the Connecticut Bank and Trust Co. and guaranteed by the Federal Housing Administration.

The garden apartments are designed to house families of moderate income. Most units will have two bedrooms with a bath and a half. Rents will be \$125 for the two-bedroom units. It is one of the largest multiple-unit apartment complexes in New England. It will be open to all who qualify under the FHA income limitations which are \$9,000 for a family of three, or four.

It will be next to a 200-unit complex now under construction by Robert Burnham of West Hartford.

To Manslaughter Counts Youths Plead Guilty In Penknife Slaying

PLYMOUTH, Mass. (AP) - Two Michigan youths being tried on murder charges in the penknife slaying of a Boston College student were allowed to plead guilty today to lesser counts.

The youths, Craig Simon, 17, of Birmingham, Mich., and Rose G. Withwood, 17, of Brownfield, Mich., are sons of prominent Detroit area businessmen.

Simon pleaded guilty to manslaughter, personal larceny and larceny from an auto. Without pleading guilty to being an accessory before the fact of manslaughter, personal larceny and larceny from an auto.

The youths were accused of killing Robert V. Phelps Jr., 20, of Wethersfield, Conn.

Most of the time was spent with the prosecutor and defense attorneys conferring behind closed doors with Plymouth County Superior Court Judge Eugene A. Hodson.

A 16-member jury had been chosen, but it had remained outside the courtroom. The youths were arrested in Chicago four days after Phelps' body was found.

Police said at the time that they recovered a bloodstained shirt, a knife and a credit card belonging to the slain student with the arrests.

Scientist Dubs ABM 'Incredible Mistake'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Dr. Ralph E. Lapp, a key scientist adviser to Senate opponents of the Safeguard defense program, says the Nixon administration's decision to build the antiballistic missile system is an incredible mistake.

"Security just can't be achieved that way," physicist Lapp said in an interview. He is planning to publish a book on the proposed Safeguard ABM system. "It seems to me that this whole business is incredible."

Lapp, 51, is a long-time critic of the Defense Department and the Atomic Energy Commission who has had a way of turning out to be right.

His latest effort strikes at the core of the administration's reasoning for deploying the controversial Safeguard ABM system. "It seems to me that this whole business is incredible."

Lapp said this might give the Soviets the capability of defeating the United States before Washington could order retaliation.

In a report prepared voluntarily for senators opposing the Safeguard, Lapp said the SSB is not intended to give a first-strike capability because even a large-scale attack would not guarantee the Soviets against retaliation.

By 1975, he said, the SSB would be able to deliver which might require 1,000 five-megaton warheads—4,000 would be needed to neutralize the American missile force.

West Ready for Amity With Soviet, Nixon Says

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Nixon said today the Western allies stand ready "as conditions change" to turn the "first" of defense "into a hand of friendship" toward the Soviets and their allies.

At the same time Nixon, in a policy speech for the 20th anniversary of North Atlantic Treaty Organization military officers, said NATO is a policy of "friendship" toward the Soviets and their allies.

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He proposed: "Periodic meetings of NATO Deputy Foreign Ministers for a high-level review of major, long-range problems before the alliance."

"Creation of a special political planning group to 'streamline' NATO's policy and coordinate it to the longer-range problems we face."

"Formation of 'a committee on the challenges of modern society' to explore ways in which the experience and the resources of the Western nations could be used effectively to be marshaled toward improving the quality of life of our people."

In this connection, Nixon said the Western alliance as it enters the third decade needs not only a strong military defense but also a "more profound political dimension to our partnership of peace" and a "social dimension" in which the allies would pool their skills to meet social problems.

The formal anniversary ceremony was held in the main Constitution Avenue hall where the alliance against the Soviet threat was created in the last War days after World War II.

Now the foreign ministers are weighing what might be done to improve West-West relations and what response might be made to the Warsaw Pact's call last month for an East-West conference on European security.

Nixon did not refer directly to the proposal issued by the Communist Party in a Budapest communique March 17. But he recalled the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower had spoke of need for unity addressing the NATO ministers.

Eisenhower had noted there is not much strength in one finger if a hand but several fingers are balled into a fist. You have a very considerable instrument of defense."

"We need such an instrument of defense," the United States will be a "strong NATO ally," Nixon said.

Flexible Schedule Proposed In High School Curriculum

A curriculum proposal which would permit selected Tolland High School students to participate in an educational program consisting of flexible scheduling and independent study was presented to the Board of Education last night.

The curriculum proposal, as presented by Tolland Education Association Curriculum Committee Chairman Robert Italia, is the result of about 1 1/2 years of effort on the part of the teachers and department chairmen involved.

The 30-page curriculum is crammed with the details of an innovative educational philosophy, particularly in the areas of flexible scheduling, independent study and student resource centers. A dress code is also proposed but its implementation was played down by Italia.

Board members, although interested in the proposals, hesitated over what they termed a "lack of specifics." The proposal does not explain how the program can be effectively carried out at the local school.

Italia emphasizes the proposals are an extension of the existing philosophy of the high school which emphasizes the uniqueness of each student.

Superintendent of Schools Robert Brantion in a memo to the YEA Curriculum Committee proposes a partial adoption of the recommendations, but sees the basic limitations of budget and space as liabilities to adoption of the curriculum as proposed.

During last night's meeting, high school principal Howard Harvey noted the shortage of classrooms at the school next year, already causing scheduling difficulties.

The proposed curriculum was described by Italia as "a burst of energy on the part of the teachers" and "a break of looking beyond the present into the future."

Although devised by several teachers and department heads at the high school, it came in for criticism from Mrs. Doris Tobiansen, a long-time Tolland teacher and English Department Chairman.

She endorsed some of the ideas in the report but she stressed the fear of sacrificing academic progress in favor of innovation.

"I would be nostalgic to see academic progress," Italia replied. "I feel we can offer more for the improvement of the student."

The basic premise of the proposed curriculum is to shift student responsibility within an overall framework of education formulated by the school administration and the board.

"The town should be proud of the teachers for doing this job," a school administrator connected with Project ASK stated. "Other communities are not doing this simply because the teachers are too tired."

"It would be wonderful and profitable for the community to work together to determine how best to proceed from here," he added.

Flexible scheduling of the adoption of a policy of flexible scheduling would be the key to the rest of the recommendations included in the report, Italia told the 50 townspeople present.

Flexible scheduling would permit a student to spend more time in some classes and less time in others.

It is not always necessary for a gym period to be as long as a history or shop course. Some periods would be limited to 22 minutes while others could run for an hour, Italia explained.

are interested, without receiving credit toward graduation. This would permit a student to attend a class in a subject in which he was interested, but not for credit.

A student lounge would be provided for and maintained by the students, according to the proposed curriculum. The right to participate in the self-supervision program would have to be earned each quarter.

Three-Hour Discussion This concept seemed to raise the most objections from parents attending the meeting while the board appeared hesitant about its responsibility for the student while he is not in a class.

The presentation of the curriculum and the subsequent discussions continued for over three hours before board chairman David Cook.

Cook promised the board would not make any attempt to squelch the report, citing the holding of the public presentation as an illustration of this point.

He described the meeting as an attempt to get the report and its recommendations "out of private kitchens and into public knowledge where we can obtain direction and understanding."

Reaction to last night's meeting would indicate an eventual adoption of some of the report's recommendations, but not all of them. The actual implementation may be slow, due to the large part to the many students

housed at the high school, until the middle school is completed. Although the town has developed one of the most unstructured high school curriculums around, it likes to take a good look at proposed innovations before implementing them.

"You are working in a state New England community," board member Durham Kales told Italia. "We tend to move slowly, giving a proposal a good trial, giving a proposal a good trial, giving a proposal a good trial."
