Canada And NATO

nouncement by Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau that Canada will remain in the NATO alliance but begin. next year, a phased reduction of its 10, 000 man contribution to NATO forces in Europe is a compromise policy; there were members of his Cabinet who would like to have Canada get all the way out of the alliance, now.

Even the Canadian compromise, however, following the de Gaulle withdrawal of France's armed forces, has to be assified as bad news for the concept of the NATO alliance, unless, of course, one takes the view that that concept itself was always and always has been ad news. For good or ill, it is NATO tself which is obviously being phased own and, eventually out.

Whether it has been good or bad, ound policy or a mistake, may depend n judgments which will not be made mtil there has been some final disposi tion of NATO, and some conclusion written to the story of World War II.

Most contemporary comment remains ompletely generous to the NATO concept, and refrains from stating the other side of the coin, which is, nevertheess, always present.

One can get to both points of view very easily by taking the normal comment Prime Minister Trudeau himself made in announcing Canada's plans the other day, and turning it into its own direct opposite.

NATO has contributed to the maintenance of world peace through its stabilizing influence in Europe."

It could be said that NATO happens to have been the policy and the instrument which has kept Europe dangerous-

y divided into two armed camps. Prime Minister Trudeau said that 'NATO continues to contribute to peace by reducing the likelihood of a major conflict breaking out in Europe, where, ecause the vital interests of the two najor powers are involved, any outbreak of hostilities could easily escalate into a war of world proportions."

One could say that instead of preventng new world war, the chief function of NATO has been to prevent the proper ending of World War II, which it has prevented by a policy of dividing Germany in order to make a rearmed military ally out of one half of it.

Prime Minister Trudeau found that if is "the declared aim of NATO to foster nprovements in East-West relations." It would have to be said that the East's

response to the West's NATO was the Warsaw Pact, with that much more consequent hardening of the divisions between East and West. Even the simplest and most frequent-

ly used claim for NATO---that it prevented any Russian attempt to conquer all of Europe-has never even begun to prove that there was ever any such Russia plot or capability. Russia, at the moment, seems to be having trouble enough just trying to control events inside the Warsaw Pact.

And just as Russia is having trouble maintaining order and unity inside the Warsaw Pact, so the United States is having trouble with discipline inside NATO

The sooner both pacts go the better. Good luck to Czechoslovakia and to Can-

Everybody wonders what the Units States Government is going to do, now that it is being challenged by an inde-pendent power like Hughes, and first reports are that the United States is worried, so worried it is even considering the dramatic step of recognizing Hughes order to exchange ambassadors with him, and perhaps negotiate a treaty governing the depth and megaton limits of nuclear testing in territory where both the United States and Hughesland claim

Could Rolls Care Less?

We think we understand why all the Rolls-Royce and Bentley automobiles manufactured in the last four years have been recalled for correction of a potential defect.

The recall was swiftly becoming the mark of manufacturing distinction. And if ordinary, plebeian American manufacturers were auddenly discovering defects, potential or imaginary, which justified a solicitous recall of hundreds of thousands of new models, surely it would be reasonable to expect that the manufacturer of the Rolls-Royce, with his standards of refinement and precision, would be able to discover, or magine, something which would make it possible for Rolls owners to feel in the main current. It would be an intolerable situation for Rolls to seem to care less than General Motors.

At this point, with some Sherlock Holmes and a microscope called in for the task, a fancied imperfection was discovered in a nut at the steering wheel, and the joyous call went out to the 1,350 Rolls and Bentley owners in the United States, to bring in their automobiles just as if they were being mothered by General Motors.

No one will ever really imagine that there is really any such imperfection in the Rolls. It has to be merely a tender fiction of an imperfection, manufactured to show how much Rolls does love its products and their owners, a deception made innocent by its sentimental intent.

Community Interdependence

The interdependence between Waterbury and the surrounding communities has been graphically demonstrated by acing watertown in provi ing a new location for the Oakville Co. Division of Scovill's. Scovill is conside ing moving its plant to the new 500 acre industrial plot off Echo Lake Road. The problem lies in providing proper sewage disposal facilities.

Waterbury is on the verge of rebuilding its sewage plant to reduce pollution of the Naugatuck River as required by the state. Torrington has started a new treatment plant. Other communities along the river are also doing so.

The destruction of the Naugatuck River through pollution is evidence of the lack of concern we have had in past years for the God-given advantages o clean air and clean water. Incidentally Woodbury and Southbury must act now to save the Pomperaug River from similar destruction by pollution. It is important not merely from a scenic standpoint or because of recreation but because the Pomperaug Valley is the source of clean drinking water for the future. Pollution left unchecked now will increase and eliminate the river as a benefit to the entire area.

Waterbury can't afford to build a sewage plant of unlimited size. The neighboring towns have to some extent been dependent on the ciy for the disposal of some sewage and for providing pure

Too many residents of the neighboring communities look down their noses Waterbury's problems. Education in Waterbury is of concern to the nearby towns. If the core city cannot provide leadership, the area must suffer. Good fire protection is of concern to the nearby towns. The towns cannot afford some the sophisticated equipment that Waterbury can provide. Good refuse disposal, clean water, a proper sewage system, these are all of concern to the area. If Waterbury does not lead the way, the towns cannot follow.

In some areas, economy can best be served by regionalization. In other areas, economy can best be served by having the town help subsidize Waterbury's adconstruction costs for larger ditional facilities.

Waterbury can't ignore Watertown's need to provide proper sewage facilities for any major plant, Scovill or anyone else. If the plant is forced to move else where, the economy of the city must

Officials of Waterbury and Watertown should both do some prompt legal checking. Is it possible for a small town to contribute capital for the construction of a larger sewage plant in the big city? Is that the most economical way for Watertown to meet its problems? Officials of both communities must remember that the Connecticut General Assembly meets only every other year. Problems of modern life cannot be solved annually-only biennially. If the answer to the problem lies in legislation of any kind, there isn't much time to get it introduced. This is an area roblem which must be solved. Wateroury cannot turn its back on Watertown. Neither can town residents ignore the COPE CITY. -- WATERBURY REPUBLI-CAN
