



The Scenario For Poverty Before Senator Edward Kennedy's Subcommittee on Indian Education wen to Alaska to investigate the plight o he Indians there, the subcommittee's chief of staff prepared a confidental memorandum to its members, for their guidance on their fact-finding tour. The thief of staff had spent time going through the territory in question, so he could plan the trip.

What his memorandum hald to the becommittee included the following:

"I think that the major focus of the trip, particularly in terms of the photo graphers and TV cameras, which will be accompanying the group, should be on native poverty contrasted with the affluence of the Government installations which can be found in practically every

"The natives tend to resent being called poor but can easily be drawn out by . . . getting them to compare what they have with what is available in the Federal Government compounds in most of the villages."

This is, in spirit and purpose, the typical blueprint for a political quest for some showcase poverty. It was obviously the technique used recently when other members of the U.S. Senate found and photographed poverty in Florida.

Poverty can always be found, and it would be ridiculous to try to pretend it does not blot and scar the general overall affluence of this American society.

But the technique with which our politicians set out to find it and exploit it is standard. They have to arrange to have it show up as effectively as possible for the cameras. And they have to condition and educate proud poor people to realize that their poverty is something to whine and wheedle about,

The result is usually a performance and a report so artificial if breeds skepticism rather than belief, and injures, rather than helps, that general crusade against poverty which ought to be this nation's number one humanitarian busi-

Why Bridge Long Island Sound? The more the planners toss around

the idea of building a bridge across Lone Island Sound, the better the question becomes: Is this trip necessary A few years ago, when the proposal

was to span a relatively narrow band of water between crowded Westchester Island, a bridge might have made some sense as a safety valve taking pressure off other travel arteries around Nev York City-except that communities at both ends feared they'd be buried under unwanted traffic. That plan was primaroutside the concern of Connecticutand one in which both the financing and the egineering were New York

Since then, this bridge of the planners' dreams has been creeping eastward. It's now a two-state proposition involving Connecticut and New York. And it's looming bigger and costlier all the

The latest location to be considered would cross the widest and deepest part of the Sound-from the New Haven area L. I. What sense does that make?

legislative study estimated that a bridge terminating in the Bridgeport area would cost about \$250 million. If that estimate is like most others on these projects, i will turn out to be low-maybe very low. Other estimates, or guesatimates, put the cost of a New Haven to Long Island bridge at up to \$500 million. There could also be an indirect loss. Traffic taking the cross-Sound bridge would be traffic not paying Connecticut Turnpike tolls west of New Haven, and traffic bent on getting away from Connecticut-not in providing economic support for this


And all for what? Long Islanders aren't overly anxious to have New Englanders swarm over them. And New Englanders feel the same about being swarmed over from the other direction Wisely, the Connecticut study said the State should move on the bridge program only "when all the facts are fully known and the crossing is determined to be of definite need and advantage to the State of Connecticut." And right now, the advantage seems to be all on the side of Long Island interests desiring ready access to strong New England

All of which ought to point straight at the fact that there's more than one way to cross the Sound. Boats-big ones of the wartime LST

(landing ship, tank) design capable of carrying large numbers of cars -could handle substantial vehicular traffic. Such large fernies could shuttle between selected points on the Connecti-cut and Long Island shores. Cars could be driven conveniently in one end and out the other end of these cavernous

At fair and reasonable fares, the boats would pay for themselves faster than a bridge. If the volume of traffic by people who really want to make the crossing proved sufficient to justify more acilities, more ferries could be added as required -all with greater case and less expense than bridge-building, and without creating the hazard to navigation, the scenic obstruction, and th totally new traffic factors that a bridge would represent.

The bridge project obviously needs more study on Connecticut's part, Why shouldn't that study include a thorough examination of the ferry possibilities Gov. Dempsey has shown no interest at all in the ideas for a Connecticut-Long Island highway bridge and we think this is understandable and right. In a time of tremendous State economic ressure the last thing Connecticut needs s the financial drain, the political strain, and the engineering uncertainty of an unneeded bridge 20 miles log.— NEW HAVEN REGISTER

## Campus Militants Harvard Dropping Seize ROTC Issue


