Town Faces Up To Drug Problem

A Sept. 20, 1968 news item on the front page of The Herald began, "Six Manchester youths, ranging in age from 17-20, were taken into custody at their respective residences this morning and served 12th Circuit Court warrants charging them with violating sections of Public Act 265 dealing with the sale of controlled drugs and narcotics."

It was the fiercest attack yet on the "City of Village Charm" image of Manchester. The town had the big-city problem of drug abuse. The police department has long suspected the drastic rise in store and house breaks in the last five years has been due largely to drug users needing to pay for their habits which can cost up to \$100 per day. Police Chief James M. Reardon said recently about 50 per cent of local house breaks are due directly to drugs.

There were 41 store and house breaks reported last year. Chief Reardon has said he thinks only about one per cent of local youth is involved with drugs. His files of known drug users and pushers is small, just over 100. But few of the listed users are over 21. Robert J. Digan, coordinator of youth services for the Board of Education, has also been heavily aware. Youths used to be absent from school to take a look somewhere. Now, some of them take days off because they are in no shape from drugs to make it through a school day.

The Drug Advisory Committee sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce began last spring as a conversation club. Drug abuse bothered them and they wanted to know if there was something they could do to stop it. DAC members include doctors, clergy, psychologists, school leaders, police, pharmacists and concerned men.

The police were beginning a major crackdown which has resulted in over 60 arrests for the sale of drugs. The Child Guidance Clinic

Vernon School Panel Votes Repairs In RHS Fire

Superintendent of Schools Raymond Ramsdell was given permission last night by the Board of Education to proceed with repairing damage at the high school caused by a fire last week.

The early morning fire destroyed the morning room on the second floor of the high school, a baby grand piano, film and lighting cabinets, and considerable smoke damage throughout the auditorium.

Dr. Ramsdell will put the painting work out to bid along with the replacement of the curtains and the risers on the stage. He explained it would be difficult to write up specifications for the carpentry and wiring work. The board agreed to have him proceed to get estimates for this portion of the job.

Dr. Ramsdell said he is working with the insurance adjusters in an attempt to get the replacement value of the piano, curtain and chairs rather than the cost value.

The curtains and backdrop originally cost \$2,700; the piano, \$800; the scenery section, \$800; and the folding chairs, \$24 each. It is imperative that the work be finished as soon as possible as the auditorium is used for a variety of school activities.

Jury Erred, Says Court

Vernon Supt. Ramsdell Will Hire Assistant on Curriculum

The Board of Education last night gave its approval to Superintendent Raymond Ramsdell to hire an assistant who will specialize in curriculum work.

Job descriptions will be sent out to the various colleges and anyone now working in the curriculum area will be eligible to apply.

Several months ago, the board approved the hiring of Albert Kerkin as an assistant to the superintendent in charge of the personnel department, presently serving as assistant principal at the Vernon Center School and has been doing extensive work in the special education field. His appointment has not been ratified as yet.

This latest new position will call for the person hired to function as a team member along with the superintendent and the other assistants.

Although the assistant will assume the leadership in the development of the elementary curriculum, he must have an overall concept and understanding of the curriculum needs for kindergarten through Grade 12.

His general responsibilities will be to assist Dr. Ramsdell and the other assistant in delegated matters pertaining to administration, supervision and curriculum planning for the school system.

In the absence of the superintendent, he must be ready to assume full responsibility and the authority of his office and attend Board of Education meetings.

The specific responsibilities of the position will include planning supervisory procedures, preparing recommendations for the school system.

Bolton 'Positive' Action Asked on Tax List

"Let's do something positive," pleaded Ray Coocconi, chairman of the Board of Assessors, which has recently been re-elected after the discovery of an omission of some \$200,000 in taxable property from the tax list prepared by a state processing at a bank.

A statement issued yesterday by the board, because all the information on the missing property appeared on the assessors' cards and should have been transferred.

The missing property was discovered by the Board of Tax Review in a comparison of the bank's list, or "abstract," and the assessors' cards. The tax review findings were announced at a selectmen's meeting April 11 and have been under fire since.

Manchester Area Residents Testify At Abortion Hearing

Testimony during yesterday's crowded and lengthy hearing on House Bill 6400, otherwise known as the Abortion Act, was about evenly split, but was those in favor of legalized abortion were opposed.

Tolland County legislators did not attend the hearing, but several young children were present on the floor of the House.

The hearing of the bill was postponed because of the illness of originally scheduled the day after the funeral of former President Eisenhower.

Testifying in favor of the proposed bill were Manchester abortionists Dr. Robert Alsbury and Dr. Philip Hammer.

Mrs. Barbara Lou Fausy of Manchester and a trained social worker testified in favor of the bill.

At 3 p.m. it was announced that 100 speakers were still waiting for their turn to address the Judiciary Committee.

Speakers were called in turn by speakers both pro and con and spoke in favor of the bill were Mrs. Alice Jackson Mend of Vernon, arts chairman of the Connecticut League for Abortion Law Reform.

The main debate appeared to be between members and supporters of the Connecticut Right to Life Committee which opposes the bill and the Connecticut League for Abortion Law Reform.

The State Right to Life Committee submitted petitions recently carrying 27,000 names opposing the concept of legal, induced abortion as proposed in H.R. 6400.

The fate of the bill is uncertain, but will likely be reported out of committee possibly with an unfavorable report.

This would permit a full debate of the bill on the floor of the House and if passed in the Senate.

Senate Minority Leader Wallace Barnes yesterday expressed the hope the bill would be reported out because "it is so important an issue to be buried in committee."

If the Judiciary Committee failed to report the bill out of committee it could be petticoated out with 48 signatures, according to Rep. Beck.
