Nixon's Message

President Nixon's message to Congress n his domestic programs leaves the naion just about where it was before he elivered the message — accepting the President on faith and requiring it to

Mr. Nixon is open to accusation of having uttered only generalities which carry the promise of no specific programs. That judgement may be altered in the ensuing days if the details of the administration's plans are spelled out in further messages to the Congress. But there were in the President's message, however brief and general, a number of points which came through very clearly.

Foremost among them is the realization that until peace is achieved in Vietnam, there can be no vast improvement in the social problems that beset the country. It has been obvious all along that before great strides can be made in the fight on poverty, unemployment, erime, and bigotry, the nation must cut the cost in money and energy which has been taken up by the Vietnam con-

A second point that comes out clearly is that the administration is sticking to its determination to pursue slow and moderate programs. That seems to be in concert with the prevailing mood of most citizens, which, we can hope, is one not of retreat from social responsibilities, but of focus on goals which show promise of attainment. The whole Nixon stress is on the ef-

fectiveness of programs rather than on their inspirational appeal. "This," he said, "is not law we seek in order to have it 'on the books' but law that we need in action. It is designed not to look appealing in the record but to take effect in our lives." He wants legislation, he says, "that we can execute once it

Coupled with this approach is President Nixon's assurance that he has spent much of the time during his first 12 weeks in office revamping the government machinery so that it can carry out programs instead of becoming bogged

Critics of the Nixon administration will view the low-key message as an excuse for continuation of the inaction they say has marked the President's early days Indeed to a nation which has become

accustomed over a long period of years to being "fired-up" by the federal administration, this meager presentation by President Nixon may seem ominously anambitious. Liberals are not likely to find much solace in it. But if Mr. Nixon can achieve those

goals which appear more modest than they really are, he will find fewer and fewer critics among the citizens. He has given us so far only broad outlines of predictable targets; — increased Social Security; a crackdown on

crime; incentives for private finance to meet social neeeds; better state-federal fiscal sharing; more stress on equal employment, job training and similar

The specifics remain to be explained and the public waits to evaluate the workability of the programs Mr. Nixon will be unveiling in the next few weeks.

Diplomat Rejects Reported Demise Of Communism

Special to The Washington Post NEW YORK (AP) — Icicles still hung on his words when Charles E. Bohlen talks about the Cold War. The Soviet Union is still in the grips of a Stalinist system, he feels, and will move toward meaningful de-tente only when the Commu-

Bohlen last week rejected re-ports of the demise of the Communist monolith, and depicted it as alive, well and bent on

conquest.

Bohlen, who was the highest ranking career diplomat in the foreign service when he retired Jan. 20, made these assessments in three lectures at Columbia University.
The diplomat's lectures dwell

on Yalta, Potsdam and other events that occurred before many of the students were born. The questions they asked him after the final lecture centered on Vietnam, the "military-industrial complex" and arms to Vietnam, but his remarks on Boviet intentions there stood in

contrast to his otherwise un-Russians for provoking conflict with the west. It was American bombing of North Vietnam that drew the Soviet Union into a heavy involvement that "was not really n the Soviet interest," said the former ambassador to the Soviet Union and France.

He raised the "inference" that it was only after the bombing was halted that the Russians "felt free to use any influence they had" to get Hanol to talk

"It would have been simplest for the Soviet Union to stay out" of Vietnam, Bohlen said. But the Russian decision to send Hanoi 1 billion dollars a year in supplies "was entirely dictated by ideological considera-tions" stemming from the bombing.
"Once we began to bomb North Vietnam, they decided to go in . . . from the Communist point of view, if the Soviet Union

turned its back on a small na-tion" fighting the U.S., the Rus-sians "would have lost considerable standing."
