One of the objects of justice in this case is the obvious one of punishing the guilty person as a means of deterring future crimes like the murder. This objective can be satisfied just as well by giving Sirhan a life sentence as by putting him to death.

Another result of the conviction should be to bring home to people the anguish which can come about when violence and lawlessness become the chief means of political and social expression.

The assassinations of the senator, of President Kennedy, and of Martin Luter King, sprang from a milieu of national violence. That does not absolve those who pulled the triggers from in-

Neither would the mood of violence on by the momentum of his convictions destroys something he might come to regard in retrospect as precious, like an institution, a career, a reputation, or a

The Israeli Gap

Israeli has its own version of the generation gap of course, and now it appears it may have its own version of the politician who courts popularity among the young.

The Israeli gap is between the orthodox faithful and the young people who in discotheque talk call them "supersonies." It is in part between the immigrants and the native borns or "sabras." And it is in part between the establishment which is largely represented by older persons (Prime Minister Golda Meir is 70) and impatient youth who want a greater voice in their affairs. Part of the restlessness is undoubtedly due to the garrison-like state of Israeli national life.

No doubt close observers recognize in this division many characteristics that are peculiarly Israeli.

But to the casual observer the split seems to echo the inevitable distance between age and youth, the same impatience with social and political strictures handed down by the eager to the unwilling.

Recently there has developed in mysterious Israeli politics, the hints of a phenomenon familiar to Americans.

General Moshe Dayan, one of the unannounced candidates for the post of premier, is generally conceded to be one of the most popular political figures among the young, and he does not hesitate to make himself available to

Dayan has made enemies among the established members of his Labor Party, the largest and most influential in the nation, and he does very little to patch up the enmittes.

Part of his popularity stems from his being a sabra which identifies him somewhat automatically with the young. Mostly, however, he seems to please the young by his disarming outspoken manoccasionally saying things that give the Arabs a measure of credit.

Draft-Dayan propaganda has appeared and despite party admonitions to so do, Dayan has refused to repudiate it. He has also admitted that he might be induced to bolt the Labor Party and

Cutting Back The Years

If a man wants a regular facelift, he can have it for about \$1,000 and three to four days in a hospital. But because the average man may not have enough mir to help cover the scars for a regular facelift, as it does for women who have their faces cut, the beauty surgeons usually prefer to give their male patients what they call mini-surgery.

For about \$500 to \$1,000 they can remove baggy eyelids, with only a two day stay in the hospital. One or two days, and \$500, can take care of folds in the face or neck. The procedure in facelift surgery, as

we understand the description of it, seems rather like the technique farm boys used to use for skinning the pelt rom a skunk er muskrat. Farm boys (the very thought makes us feel younger already) would take the loose skin and stretch it tight over a curing board; the surgeons snip off a few inches of it and then stretch the rest of it back over the face they're working on. No philosopher should ever try to tell

any of these beauty-questing males that people are, after all, as young as they feel. They know, from morning after morning of experience of peering in the mirror and then estimating the day ahead, that it is terribly easy to feel as old as one looks.
