

If the United States must continue air sance near North Korea, and dent Nixon is evidently convinced hat it must, then his decision to provide rotection for the planes is right. It gives some comfort and reassurnce to the American people who are norrified at the prospect of leaving. crews at the mercy of an irresponsible and headstrong nation.

It does not, however, automatically uarantee the safety of the missions. there is every reason to believe that North Korea, acting without any kind of operation or sanction from any major mmunist power, is intent on provoking the United States into military realiation. The Pueblo incident, to the credit of American diplomacy, did not do that. It merely caused the United States a loss of face.

The EC121 affair, as President Nixon pointed out in his press conference yesterday, required a further stretch by the North Koreans. They gave no prior warnings, as they had in the Pueblo incident, and there is confirmation from several sources - including Russian radar reading to which this nation has access - that the assault occurred in international territory.

The North Koreans must have known that flights like this one were part of this country's routine surveillance. It seems clear that North Korea acted alone and with the sole purpose of provoking us, a move that might have several objectives for Kim II Sung, the ambitious North Korean

personal stock in the Communist world. It could give him a blackmail weapon against the Soviet Union in his quest for better weapons. It could revitalize his people who are no doubt tired of war and tired of comparing themselves with their South Korean brothers who have greater prosperity.

There is reason to believe that Kim has been busy tunneling his key military and industrial facilities into the ground, even to the point of carving waterways into mountains along the coast to provide a place for hiding submarines, according to one source. Veterans of Korean war bombing mis-

sions will recall the difficulty of locating and destroying such targets. This is one argument for continuing reconnaissance and at the same time an explanation of why North Korea can

afford the provocation. Is there any real guarantee then that an armed escort will dissuade the North Koreans if this episode fails to produce the results they seek, and fortunately so far it has failed?

The surest way to avoid provocation would be to avoid the flights, but, if they are a necessity for security, that will be impossible.

President Nixon did not say that protecting the flights was the only action that would be taken in the aftermath of the shooting, but he did leave the clear impression that no headstrong response would be made that would affect our position in the worldwide picture. He echoed the thought of Secretary of State William P. Rogers who said, "The weak can be rash, the powerful must be more restrained."

The nation can breath easier having heard the moderate tone of his remarks A real accomplishment now would be to quietly phase out as many potential sources of provocation as possible without endangering security. This will take a careful balancing of diplomatic and military necessities.
