U.S. Pilot Assures Soviet Search Ship 'We're Coming Down--Don't Fear'

By PHIL BROWN Associated Press Writer TACHIKAWA, Japan (AP) — "We're coming down, please don't fear," a Russian-speaking American pilot spoke to a Soviet destroyer. Then followed what the pilot called a "cordial" conversation with the Russians, who were helping U.S. forces search for remnants of an American Navy spy plane shot down in the Sea of Japan last Tuesday by the North Koreans.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Potent U.S. naval forces, including the battleship New Jersey and possibly a pair of aircraft carriers, were reported steaming to new positions today to provide protection for American intelligence missions off North Korea. The Pentagon announced redeployment of extensive forces Friday shortly after President Nixon ordered resumption of reconnaissance flights with the promise they will cease to be "fair game" for North Korean jets.

North Korea Claims U.S. Fled Meeting TOKYO (AP) — North Korea said today the United States "fled" from an armistice commission meeting at Panmunjom Friday because it feared exposure of the truth about its reconnaissance planes shot down in the Sea of Japan last Tuesday. The declaration was made by Maj. Gen. Lee Choon-sin North Korea's chief delegate to the meeting, who reiterated North Korean claims the U.S. Navy plane carrying its personnel was downed after it violated Communist air space.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Navy announced today that it had recovered the wreckage of a U.S. Navy plane shot down in the Sea of Japan last Tuesday. ### How Non-Violent Can 'Mannix' Be?

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The television networks have over-reacted to the outcry against violence, says Mike Connors, whose "Mannix" series has been profoundly affected by the curbs on rugged action. Connors, as the hard-bitten private sleuth Mannix, will be back for a third season on CBS, but he admits that the show almost didn't make it. "I was never in doubt that we would be renewed, as far as the ratings were concerned," he commented. "Mannix" held its own in the first season and then took off like a rocket in its second season. But, despite the ratings, I feared that the show would be canceled as a gesture to impress the FCC and the Mil-

ton Eisenhower commission on violence. "Then the network would be able to say, 'See-we had a successful show in 'Mannix' and we took it off because of its violence.'" While not defending violence in television, Connors believes that the campaign against it has reached absurd proportions. "All right, so you want to remove all violence from television," he propounded. "That means no more football; what could be more violent than knocking a halfback six feet in the air?" "No more boxing matches. Consider the violence of two men trying to beat each other's brains out, and for what purpose? To make money. At least the flatfights on 'Mannix' have a more worthwhile reason: the triumph of good over evil. "And if you're going to do away with all violence on the home screen, that means no more news shots of campus demonstrations. And no more coverage of the war in Vietnam."

On Wednesday night, for instance, NBC's "The Virginian" started its warm weather schedule with the rebroadcast of an episode first shown more than a year ago. ## In Soap Operas, Time Grinds Slow

NEW YORK (AP)—Time is out of joint, said Shakespeare, and nowhere is that more true than on television's soap operas. The plots grind slow on the soaps. One veteran used to describe them this way: "She lifts a cup of tea and sips for six weeks."

In her book on radio soap operas, "Tune in Tomorrow," Mary Jane Higby recalls the time Ma Perkins stood by her kitchen table for two weeks and a day deciding whether to open a package.

"If Ma was immobilized," she wrote, "the rest of the story wasn't. Meanwhile, in an ambulance rushing through the night . . ."

But that was radio 30 years ago. The times have changed. Or have they? Let's look at the story lines for NBC's "Days of Our Lives."

On Monday, Feb. 10: "Laura and Mickey advise Susan to tell Scott about her past."

Let's skip to Friday, April 4: "Susan tells Scott she would like to tell him more about her past."

What happens is that in a typical sudser the writer juggles about five major conflicts at all

times, along with numerous subplots. With 14 shows on the three networks that's enough excitement to keep the housewives of America hanging on their dustmops.

One addicted watcher contends there's very little lip movement on the soaps. Instead, they stand around trading looks of shock and dismay.

Here's how it goes on "Days of Our Lives" for a week or so: On Monday "a caseworker pays an unexpected call on Susan and Scott. Susan phones Julie, and they agree to meet that afternoon."

You should know they're not really going to meet that afternoon or even the next. First the whole idea has to be put through the grinder more times than a 25-cent hamburger. On Tuesday "Alice tells Tom of her apprehension about Julie's meeting with Susan. Tom discusses Julie's meeting with Laura."

Finally, on Wednesday, Julie arrives at Susan's apartment—but not before "Scott visits Laura and Mickey to discuss the blueprints for their future home."

The following week they are still chewing it over. On Wednesday, "Laura and Susan discuss Julie's strange reaction to her visit with Susan."

"Days of Our Lives" is the only sudser that issues story lines to the press. The others like to keep the housewives in cliff-hanging suspense. But no matter. The names are interchangeable. So are the plots. But the women love them.

In another scene Mannix was to put an armlock on a hood to discover who had poisoned him. Both the slugging and the armlock were ordered deleted by the network censor.
- "I blew my stack," Cornors admitted. "I telephoned the head of the network to tell him how ridiculous the things were getting. I said they should either let it remain an action show or else take it off the air."
