

Voting this way, the people of France did something no one really believed they would do, once they found themselves inside the decisive portals of their

What they were doing, when they voted thus to end the career of the leader whom they called autocratic and dicatorial was to employ the basically emocratic device of the referendum, which he himself had insisted be included in the political practice of the new France he was trying to build, and which he himself voluntarily followed. Just as it is refreshing to realize that

the strong man was ousted by the democratic instrument he himself had been careful to provide, so other phases of the de Gaulle leadership and policy are likely to be under favorable review in the years ahead. The world's editorialists selves, in fact, devoting as much time and space to mourning his absence as they have hitherto been devoting to complaints about his presence on the national and the world scene.

He was a man and a mind, and sublimely matter of fact in his own gracious recognition of both capacities. Yet, in his benevolent imperiousness he was not always consistent, not al-

ways faithful to the same principle Even the most liberal accounts of his final downfall say that his weakness began with the student revolts of a year ago, saying that these revolts exposed the extent of internal dissatisfactions in the country.

But the student revolts were probably more significant in what they revealed about de Gaulle himself than in what they revealed about the country. In his effort to deal with that crisis a year ago, de Gaulle expended more in the realm of principle than any leader who intended to continue to submit to the democratic process could afford. He went back, in his hour of sudden need for power, to that same Army he had so neatly circumvented on the issue of Algeria, when he first came to this span of office. He went to the French people with appeals to their innate conservatism in relation to the stance of the students, and then found it impossible to be that conservative himself in practice. As seems to be happening almost everywhere, the students of the decade, revealing themselves in their sometimes shocking characteristics, also frequently denude and expose leadership. Exposed by a student revolt, defeated by his own democratic device, voted out by countrymen who still hardly realize that they have really done it, Charles de Gaulle has one sure place exactly where he would most like to

In his leisurely, oblique exposition of his administration's objectives, Presi-dent Nixon now indicates that ending the war in Vietnam holds top priority This is entirely as it should be, and for more than the obvious principal reasons, which are the avoidance of additions to the appalling casualty lists, an end to the vast expenditure on this pro-tracted and ever more dubious venture, and the recovery of the good opinion of peoples all over the world. The losses in life, resources, and prestige are by no means the only ones. Perhaps some day there will be a sociological study of the ill effects of this war on the American community. Already some of these are dismayingly apparent.
