



WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nixon Administration marks its 100th day in power today with scores of holdovers from Demo cratic years still occupying key jobs in the vast federal cotab-lishment. A government-wide Associat-

The State of New York has annual sessions of its Legislature, and these sessions have no legal date for compulsory That means the legislators have all the time there is in the year to do



Many years ago May Day with one side representing Winwas an important festival celebrated in European countries with storg, dancing and games. This cistom originated with the pagan Romans who celebrated the coming of Spring with their Floral Games which began on April 28 and lasted until May 3. The crowning of the May Queen stems from this festival in honor of Flora, the Roman goddess of Spring.

May Day festivities were particularly popular in England during the Middle Ages when everyons, young and old, joined in the merry making. The night before, Maypoles, usually of birch, were set up in the village squares and decorated with garlands of flowers. Then at sunrise everyone went into the woods to gather flowers and hawthorne branches to decorate every door and window. Everyone wore a sprig of the "marrow hear" Elm tree. Those who were unfortunate enough to forget to wear it were dipped in a stream or pond. Elaborate processions were formed, led by woodsmen garlanded in try. They were followed by milkmaids wearing chaplet of primroses, carrying flower bedeeked pails and leading a white cow with a wreath of cowslips around her gilded horns. Six foresters in green tunies raised their horns to their lips to ammounce the approach of "Rootin Hood." Behind him came "Latties John", "will Stukely" and the host of "Merry Men". They were followed by "Maid Marian" and her maid-

ens. Leading citizens usually portrayed the principal characters in these pageants. When the procession reached the May pole, the Queen of the May was crowned and presided over her court in a bower of flowers. The rest of the day was about dancing around the Maypoles and engaging in games of strength and skill. In the days of knight-hood there were tournaments and later archery contests which always ended with "Robin Hood" as the victor.
