**Crime As A Quest For Identity** wered that there is a difference beveen the way middle class whites who live in Palo Alto and those who tive in he Bronx react to the presence of an elidomotua benobru

In the small city of Palo Alto the car was left untouched for a whole week by that city's well dreamed people. In the big, crowded Bronz, people equally well dreamed assaulted, plunder-ed and vandalized the abandoned autooble, reducing it to a "battered useous hulk of metal" in only three days. This proves that people who live in rowded cities are subjected to pressures which turn them toward violence. The rocess, according to the psychology involved, deprives people of traditional family life, makes them feel anonymous, mironts them with a world for which nobody seems really responsible, and than, having thus "deindividuated" them Il, leaves them nothing except violence as the instrument by which they can amounce their own being, presence, and ndividuality. They are, this psychology says, "potential assassins" by the time he big city pressures get through with

If you know who you yourself are, he theory goes, you are likely to have ne control over yourself.

But when you don't know who you are, and nobody else knows who you are, and you want to find out and ance who you are to fail for the feeling that some act of iolence will do it all for you. There are times when psychology

seems very logical. Many of us will buy, without very such trouble, the idea that the boy who throws a rock through a school window, or the teen-ager who screeches a stolen car around a corner, or the character who vandalizes the equipment in a children's playground, or the mistit who ireams of an assassination and perhaps commits it, is slways thinking, to himself, "There, this will show me and everybody else who I am."

And it does. Some people are lucky enough to have been taught, or to be able to learn, other ways, even though they happen to live in crowded cities. They establish their own identity, sometimes, by specializing in pleasant acts, by improving what they find, or by putting their own feet on the same indder used by the high and mighty.

But not all who fail to take this kind turn fall because they want to fall. Sometimes the cities and their crowded anonymities are too much for them. And some of the supposed improvements in big city living-like the mass housing project-miss their main psychological potentiality because the kind of atmosphere they provide has even more faceess anonymity in it than that of the sium it replaces. In the slum one could at least belong to one's particular misfortune; it knew its own children; it had a society, even if it was only a society of deprivation and suffering. The mass housing project offers comparative cleanliness and comfort and respectabil ity and yet, one senses, a terrible ione-

This is not to praise the crowded cities and the slums. It is to acknowledge the evil and the effect, and to note that one of our current answers to the problemmass rebuilding-doesn't do as much for people as would something like the estabshment of new communities, small enough for a boy to find himself in.

But as they view instance after in-stance of the few imposing their will by violence on campus, the untutored citizenry see a rather clear distinction between the freedom to express idea and the committing of lawless acts. They find it difficult to comprehend why the same distinction is not just as clear in the minds of most faculty members and

Certainly the commonalty may be pardoned if it draws from this academic attitude an inference that those who share it believe there should be, in free country, one law for the groves of Academe, and another for the rest of the republic.

No one has explained to John ( Citizen, who, directly or indirectly footing a part of the bill for the education of these violent children why this should be. The Constitution makes no mention of it. No statute can be point ed out as grounds for such a postulate It seems to derive from some strange mystique not applicable to the com-monalty, and the general citizenry doesn't like it. But there it is, and you can put tome six thousand students in the college stadium after such a camput incident and by a margin of some 60 or so votes they will affirm that it is a Capital Sin to enforce on campus the laws that apply to the rest of men, and no sin at all for SDS to break those laws in the first place. The inability to discern this distinction


so clear to the commonalty is an afflic-tion only of the campus liberals. The hard-core SDS boys and girls and their mentors who flit from campus to campus are inhibited by no such distinction. They are quite convinced that as New Left revolutionaries, who abhor liberalism, they are endowed in some mystical manner with the high privilege of raising hell with everyone else's enjoyment o the Bill of Rights, off campus as well as on it. They can decree who may talk with whom and who may be heard and who silenced.


