

# **Enemy Fails** In Big Strike **Along Border**

MIGON (AP) -North Vistnamess troops struck back to-day at the massive American air and ground campaign along the Cambodian frontier but failed to overrun an American patrol base in the heaviest attack since the border war flared anew more than two months

Troops of the North Vietnamese 1st Division also made rocket and mortar attacks on two other American bases within a 20-mile radius. The U.S. command said at least 119 of he enemy were killed and 29 there surrendered. The American detenders from the 1st Air Cavalry Division re-

orted 15 of their men killed and at least 87 wounded. In the beaviest attack, about 900 enamy troops stormed out of the bamboo jungles about 2 a.m. shind a mortar barrage and assaulted a patrol base named Carolyn from three sides.

The base in War Zone C, 65 miles northwest of Saigon, was defended by 300 Air Cavalrymen with 12 artillery guns. The North Vietnamese finally fied to the north just before dawn, driven off by the Air Cavalrymen. artillery guns firing at point-blank range, helicopter gun-

spokesmen said 101 Vietnamese and nine Americans were killed and 62 mericans were wounded. One

That being so, the Fortas statement

"Concluding that I could not undertake the assignment, I returned the fee with my thanks."

That, however, was 11 months later, after Wolfson had been formally indicted for selling unregistered securities. Justice Fortas, in his statement, fully

lenied having tried to intervene for Wolfion with the S.E.C. or any other govrnmental agency.

But taking all of the explanation and assurance Justice Fortas offers at face value, the point is still the same. Even on such a basis, he had no business entertaining the idea of service to or a fee from either an individual or an individual's foundation.

Membership on the nation's highest court is supposed to convey enough reward in honor, if not in money, to make it worth while for the member to conduct himself as if he were in a cloister, professionally speaking. Justice Fortas may be proving to be the present Court's worst offender against such standards of conduct, but he is not the only offender, as the willingness of other court members to appear on public platforms or at public microphones has illustrated.

Supreme Court Justices should not only be above suspicion, but above letting themselves become involved in circumstances which allow even the slightest question to be raised.

## Anti-War Trend Getting Serious?

Occasionally, one news development has proportions and impact which direct attention to a lot of other things that have been happening, and which suggest that this old world might conceivably be trying to head in a different and new direction.

The decision of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the largest holder of federal military research grants, to decline temporarily to accept a n y more classified projects from the government until a 22-man panel reports next October with recommendation on the subject, is such a potential milestone

The nature and direction of that October report may take that milestone down, or reinforce it.

But meanwhile the present reality is that a shocking new impact has been given to the possibility that we are really, in this age of ours, beginning to question and threaten to root out and abolish all the underlying routine assumptions on which the institution of war has been nourished throughout the history of man. Does all the pacifism of the day, all the draft dodging, all the conscientions objecting, all the open criticism of the articular war in which we are engaged,

mean that we are moving toward the possibility that we may some day bring an end to war just simply by refusing

to participate in it? The testative answer we might give such questions gets a very sharp prodling when M.I.T. takes such an action, questioning its own future participation in what was once volunteer patriotiam on the part of its staff and administra-

There have always been those ecat tered and irresponsible young idealists who have objected to the idea of the legalised murder which is war, and there have always been some idealistic statesmen who are envisioned a world of effective law against war. But it is something new when M.I.T.

starts deliberating whether to wash its It makes us all think that there may e biginning to be something real, after

a few thousand years, about this antiwar business. The real test, of course, lies ahead when all the rest of us may have to decide whether we really hate war, or merely feel "that we ought to.

## Six Days In May

One may say that, on the basis of its first few days, this has already been more of a May, and a more beautiful May, than any of us slothful human be ings may really deserve.

When we witness how instant and orderly was the transition from the daffodils of April to the tulips of May from the forsythia and the shadblow to the apple and the wild cherry, from the irresolute patchiness of the early spring lawn to the solid emerald sheen which follows the first mowing, we can only reel back in temporary abandonment of any of our own ideas of seasonal accomplishment, and hall the easy, complete master at work.

This year, aside from the perfect timing and the smooth flow of the performance, there are certain special flourishes meeting the eye. Here and there an apple tree stands in a hitherto unequalled solid mass of bloom, apparently a make-up effort for sparse budding a year ago. Lincs are in unusual vigor the purple raising closely woven parasols of blooms, the white lifting luminous irregular spires into the twilight.

All in all, those who have had some experience in Mays, and complete Mays at that, are saying that you could live a thousand years and never come upon more beautiful May in any year than we have already had this year, in just six

## The "Green Revolution" Paradox

In recent years, the awareness ha grown that the technology permeating our lives is not so much progress a paradox. Devices that solve existing problems create new ones, whether i advanced weaponry or advanced agri-

In the field of agriculture, for examicity is beginning to build up around the "green revolution"-the cent development of high yield varieties of such food staples as wheat, rice and corn. The breakthroughs are hailed as a major victory in efforts to delay the seemingly inevitable food-population catastrophe, especially in developing areas. But Clifton R. Wharton Jr., observes in the current Foreign Affairs that though the benefits of the new advances are obvious and undeniable, it is naive to view them with

In the first place, the existence of a technical discovery, even when of obvious tenefit, doesn't always lead to its widespread use. Thus the new food growing technology involves - much more than just planting new seeds successful harvests would also depend on new invectment in irrigation systems, and sophisticated use of pesticides, fertilizers and modern equipment. The problems of education and financing may prove formidable. Even if the new technology were o'ffused rapidly, however, a host of social, political and economic problems would threaten.


To mention a few: In the beginning at least, the advanced methods and mechanization would appear more suited for use by sophisticated large planter than the small subsistence farmer. Making the countryside more efficient would tend to displace the small farmer, rather than to enrich him. The impact on the already acute problem of migration to the cities, as well as on other estabilizing social trends, would seem of major proportions.

The huge new harvests will rot in the fields without wide, and no doubt costly, expansion of storage, drying or ther handling facilities. The prospect of market gluts, depressed prices and other economic consequences of a quantum jump in production might well destroy incentives to plant the high yield seeds. Economically sound new markets for the new harvests must be developed; as Mr. Wharton bserves, no matter how hungry, people cannot buy food if they have no money to pay for it.

In some regions, trade ties between food exporting and food importing countries are a source of politically unifying economic integration. If the importers become self-sufficient with the new agricultural technology, they may simultaneously destroy the economy of a friendly nation, with unpredictable results.

It would be superficial, of course, to suggest the new agriculture should be uppressed because it won't solve the problem of hunger easily. But an early awareness? of the difficulties that are likely to develop is crucial.

The paradox of technology results from the depressingly apparent fact that it has grown easier to devise technical means to solve practical problems than to effect human change. And disillusionment at best awaits those who fail to realize that for technical advance to be effective, it must often rely on massive human change as well .-WALL STREET JOURNAL

# **Use Shades** For Colors

Apartment dwelless who have a window that looks out on upiness — whether it's an un-appealing blank wall or an str shaft — can help matters by decorating an ordinary window shade. The list of possibilities is nearly endless. Materials in-clude tringes, treads, gimp and tape in hundreds of colors. For a very modern room, block cutilings in strong colors at the top and bottom of the shade offer combrast. If delloary shade offer contrast. If delicacy is desired, cutline the bottom of the shades in braid, using contrasting color. The edges of the window frame can also be decorated with braid, particu-larly eys -detching if the win-dow is a small one, as this technique enlarges the window. In addition to the standard trimmings, ribbors (in gros-grain, velvet or novelty weaves), systet edging, rick rack and other braids can be

used as design. If an unsightly radiator is positioned beneath the window block it out by a small folding screen, decorated with trim that matches the window shade de-

matches the window shade de-sign. If you prefer an oval or scal-loped edging at the bottom of the shade, order a shade with what is called an unfinished "apron," and cut it to suit your own tasts. A novice decorator might do well to stretch the shade on the floor, and arrange the trim. for a trial preview, before ap-plying it. Adhesive is the pro-ferred adherent, since it is very difficult to sew trim on shades.

Many a father of the bride, suffering from the post-wedding day blues, has been heard to moan, "I wish they would have eloped." The modern couple need not go that far to provide financial relief to the bride's father.

More and more young working couples who want a larger and more elaborate wedding than would be possible while keeping within the bride's parents' financial means, are paying all or part of the costs traditionally borne by the bride and her family. For example, a couple who wants steak instead of the chicken that the bride's budget calls for may elect to pay the price dif- graduate says that most brides ference themselves. Or if the couple wants more guests than the bridal budget allows for, they may chip in the additional cash, It's not unusual-even if Emily Post won't agree-for the groom or the groom's family to assume some expenses tradiionally borne by the bride-particularly if the groom's family is considerably wealthier than that of the bride. If the groom himself is financially established he may wish to foot all the wedding expenses. (In keeping with propriety, however, he should not pay or the more intimate items in his bride's trousseau.)

Sometimes, particularly when the bride has no family, the groom's family will make the couple a gift of the entire wedding and get much pleasure by doing so. One mother of a recent groom explained the situation thus: "When my son, a recent college graduate, got engaged he and his flancee came to us and explained that because of the bride's family circumstances-her father was dead and she was sending herself through collegethey would be unable to have an elaborate reception unless w helped out. And an elaborate wedding with the works was what they both wanted. We're well able to afford it so we offered to pay for everything. Not only did they get what they wanted, but it made us very happy too; it's a gift which will always give us cherishable memories."

Even the formal etiquette books have bent in recent years and now list several expenses that are optional or set by local custom. However, in most cases these so-called optional expenses don't give any financial break to the father of the bride-they only add to his burden, items in this classification include: Bride's bouquet, traditionally a gift from the groom, may be purchased by bride's family as part of her outfit. Bachelor dinner is given by groom in some areas; by his attendants in others, Rehearsal dinner may be hosted by either the bride's or groom's family, Bridesmalos' luncheon, usually given by the bride, may be given by the attendants. Corsages for mothers and grandmothers are usually provided by the groom but the bride may buy those for her own mother and grandmother. For those who believe in complying with etiquette rules to the letter of the law, here's a traditional, etiquette-sanctioned breakdown of other wedding expenses:

Groom or his family pays for: Bride's engagement and wedding rings Marriage license Clergyman's fee

Gifts for best man and ushers: gloves, men in wedding party Complete wedding trip Wedding gift for bride

Divorce Rate Up WASHINGTON (AP)—An esti-mated 534,000 decrees of di-vorce or annulment were granted in the United States in 1967,the latest year for which figures are available, reports the Depart-ment of Health, Education and Welfare. Compared with an es-timated 494,000 for 1966, this is an increases of 40,000 or 8 per an increase of 40,000 or 8 per cent. The increase in divorce between 1965 and 1966 was only 2.7 per cent. ## A Tax Break

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Navy's decision not to bring disciplinary action in the Pueblo case apparently clears the way for House action on a bill to give the ship's crew a tax break. A pending bill would waive in-come tax on the pay of enlisted men and on the first \$500 monthly pay of officers for the 11 months they were held captive in North Korea.

Navy sources said some men found themselves in financial difficulty because they received lump-sum payment upon their release, without income tax withholding, and spent the mon-

ey promptly. The bill was approved by the House Ways and Means Committee more than two weeks ago, but was held up because of a feeling that if the Navy took action against the men the measure would have been in trouble. Plans now are to bring it to the House floor next week
