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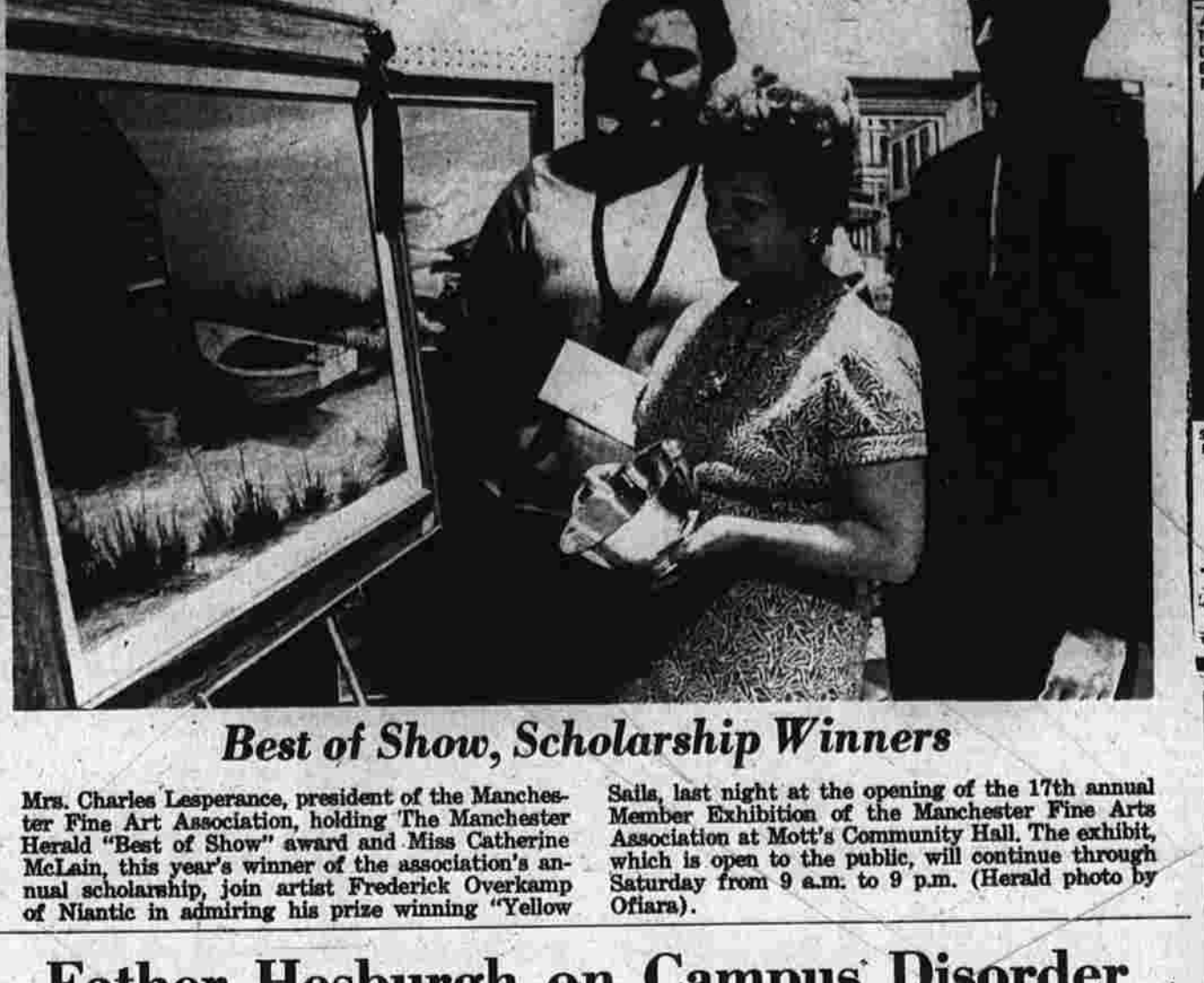

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Tolland Building in April Passes \$1 Million

Building permits issued for the month of April topped the \$1 million mark for the first time in many years, reaching \$1,021,000. The figure compares to \$907,700 last year, which included the \$400,000 Kingsbridge plant.

Building Inspector Charles Schuch announced permits valued at \$123,500 for the construction of 11 additional houses issued during the past two weeks. Added to the 25 houses at \$768,000 issued during the first week, new home construction totals \$1,021,000 at a total value of \$960,000.

Home improvement permits added up to \$120,000 during the past two weeks plus an additional \$28,500 for the first two weeks of the month, including 12 new houses.

New home permits issued during the past two weeks are Hillside, Bolton Rd., one house at \$20,000; Monroe Moore, Inglewood Circle, seven houses at \$14,000 each (\$128,000); Walter A. 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mean that we are moving toward the possibility that we may some day bring an end to war just simply by refusing to participate in it.

The tentative answer we might give to such questions puts a very sharp point on M.I.T.'s stance on nuclear war, questioning its own future participation in what was once volunteer participation on the part of its staff and administration.

There have always been those scattered and irresponsible young idealists who have objected to the idea of the hospital which was war, and there have always been some idealistic statements who are envisioned a world of effective law against war.

But it is something new when M.I.T. starts deliberating whether to wash its hands.

It makes us all think that there may be beginning to be something real after a few thousand years, about this anti-war business.

The real test, of course, lies ahead, when all the rest of us may have to decide whether we really hate war, or merely feel that we ought to.

### Six Days in May

One may say that, on the basis of its first few days, this has already been more of a May than a May. More than any of our slothful human beings may really deserve.

When we witness how instant and orderly was the transition from the daffodils of April to the tulips of May, from the forsythias and the shadow to the apple and the wild cherry, from the iridescent patches of the early spring lawn to the solid emerald seen which follows the first mowing, we can only feel that in temporary abandonment of any of our own ideas of seasonal accomplishment, and all the easy, complete master at work.

This year, aside from the perfect timing and the smooth flow of the performance, there are certain special flourishes meeting the eye. Here and there an apple tree stands in a hitherto unequalled effort of bloom, apparently a make-up effort for sparse budding a year ago. Lilacs are in unusual vigor, the purple relating closely woven patterns of bloom, the white lifting luminous irregular apris into the twilight.

All in all, those who have had some experience in May, and complete May at that, are saying that you could live a thousand years and never come upon more beautiful May in a year than this. And those who have not, you can have already had this year, to just six days.

**High Court Ethics**

Even if the \$20,000 fee Justice Abner Fortas tentatively accepted and retained for 11 months before returning it had carried out the potential significance Justice Fortas himself claims, it would still have been totally wrong for a member of the Supreme Court to be involved with it, or anything like it.

The \$20,000 fee was actually tendered by a Wolton Family Foundation, not from the personal account of Louis Wolton, the family manufacturer of woolen industrial empire who is now serving a prison term for some of his flashiness.

And Justice Fortas, in the statement he has issued in answer to allegations by an article in Life Magazine, says his only interest was "in the significant and commendable work of Mr. Wolton and his family foundation in the field of harmonious racial and religious relations" and that "this is an area in which I have and have had a continuing interest from my official judicial or legal functions."

**The "Green Revolution" Paradox**

In recent years, the amazement has grown that the technology permeating our lives is not so much progress as a new kind of technology. The breakthrough problems create new ones, whether in advanced weaponry or advanced agriculture.

In the field of agriculture, for example, publicly is beginning to build up around the "green revolution"—the recent development of high yield varieties of such food staples as wheat, rice and corn. The breakthrough is hailed as a major victory in efforts to delay the seemingly inevitable food-population catastrophe, especially in developing areas. But Clifton H. Wharton, Jr., observes in the current Foreign Affairs that though the benefits of the new advances are obvious and undeniable, it is naive to view them with total optimism.

In the first place, the existence of a total food security, even when the obvious benefit, doesn't always lead to its widespread use. Thus the new food growing technology, with its advanced systems, and sophisticated use of pesticides, fertilizers and modern equipment, the problems of distribution and financing may prove formidable.

Even if the new technology were used, the problems of distribution and financing may prove formidable. Making the sophisticated large producer than the small subsistence farmer. Making the countryside more efficient would tend to displace the small farmer, rather than to enrich him. The impact on the already acute problem of rural to the cities, as well as on other destabilizing social trends, would seem of major proportions.

The paradox of technology results from the depressingly apparent fact that it has grown easier to devise technical means to solve practical problems than to effect human change. And disillusionment at best awaits those who fail to realize that for technical advance to be effective, it must often rely on massive human change as well.—WALL STREET JOURNAL

**TEL AVIV** — If Egypt persists in command-style rule, the government has a far better case to make against Israel than against commando bands in Jordan. The reason is that the United Nations, which is regarded here as hopelessly stacked against Israel, has received official reports from UN observers blaming Egypt for having started the cross-canal fighting.

Thus, barring an unlikely shift by Nasser, the Egyptian front will soon take on more serious characteristics of a hot war. And Israel is convinced she has nothing to lose and everything to gain.

With precise intelligence about every aspect of Egypt—probably as much information as the Egyptians themselves possess about their own country—Israel will use helicopters, paratroopers, and exotic equipment to attack, bit by bit, Egypt's economic bloodstream. The pattern will be swift, minutely timed assaults on strategic targets like bridges or power stations similar to the daring helicopter raid deep into Egyptian territory last year.

But with all Israel's confidence, this course runs a very real risk summed up in the following question: Can the Soviet Union, which has invested so many hundreds of millions of dollars in Egypt, stand by while its client is systematically depopulated?

If the Russians did intervene (an eventually repudiated hope), the Egyptian front would take on new life. Moreover, this possibility is not restricted to the prospect of Israeli reprisals across the canal. There is reason to believe the Egyptians want the Russians to move oil products now being refined at Aden (with the Port Suez refineries knocked out) to the Gulf of Suez to the bottom end of the canal in Port Suez.

"We have discovered the most sensitive parts of their body," an Israeli expert told us coolly, "and we will destroy them one by one if they continue attacking us across the canal."

The last banker to make that effort few the Egyptian flag, Israel should sink her before she could make it. If the Russians agreed to move refined oil to Port Suez, Israel would confront the most delicate decision since the start of the day war—whether to shell the tankers.

Given the go-it-alone mood here of supreme self-confidence and utter refusal to back down before the Arabs to agree to an absolutely secure peace, even this course would be wholly ruled out.

But the cost to Israel does not seem unbearable. A party state today, she spends 40 per cent of the total budget on military, and regards her self-protection as the most important priority in the world today. The cost may be high but morale is clearly higher.

Not having had access to the informal policy sessions which have been held in the office of Connecticut life, we cannot say whether or not Mr. John M. Bailey, professor of semiotics at the University of Connecticut, was the guiding and decisive spirit we once forecast he was about to become.

To give Mr. Bailey's subtle political stance credit, the actual hand has been seen, and less since the moment, toward the end of the first third of the current session, when he appeared on the scene as the only individual with power enough and nerve enough to grab hold of the state's financial situation at least in part.

What has been sporadic talk from Washington of having the federal government share back to the state a greater proportion of the revenue that flows from the state, Bailey and his fellow faculty claim to be originating in Connecticut an admirable scheme for getting Connecticut money back before it is even paid. The forthcoming Connecticut tax package is supposed to be one directed especially toward the prospect that the state will be able to pay additional taxes in Connecticut which are able to reduce a certain percentage of the additional state taxes through the deductions they can make in their federal tax reports. Connecticut manufacturers are supposed to evasion themselves, operating at such a nice profit level that the federal government will, in effect, be paying half the cost of the proposed state payroll tax.

How angrily and resentfully Connecticut manufacturers receive this supposed super-aid will be demonstrated at this week's public hearing. They thought from developments early in the session, that they were being politely encouraged by the worst unpopularity of the state's fiscal emergency, and now they find that what they consider the largest single dose of bitter medicine has, after all, been reserved for them.

Perhaps Professor Bailey has now succeeded in uniting Connecticut manufacturers, insurance companies, consumers, big people, little people—all in one common bond of mutual understanding at last. Now everybody is against the "Dumpey" tax program.

Councilmen last night were maintaining official silence on the statement by Board of Education Chairman Charles Lyons that the proposed \$200,000 high school was not necessary by 1970 and the project would be dropped.

According to Mayor Howard Fitts, until the Board of Education makes a decision on the question it would be premature to discuss the question.

Lyons statement, which came one day after the Public Budget Commission and the Board of Education had approved that the architect was going ahead with the project, apparently stemmed from evidence that up-to-date enrollment projections would not seem to justify the need for a new high school.

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**Drop in Birth Rate Cited for Decision**

Board of Education Chairman Charles Lyons today amplified on an earlier statement that the proposed new high school project was being reconsidered.

In explaining the board's decision to reconsider the need for a new high school, Lyons pointed out that planning for the school requires several years' lead time, and that enrollment projections must estimate population five to ten years into the future.

"The original plans," continued Lyons, "were based on enrollment projections made in the fall of 1966 which projected a steady and increased mid 1967 when the decision was made that this school was needed in the fall of 1971."

"This meant," said Lyons, "that land had to be purchased, plans had to be drawn, and construction had to be started in mid-1968 if the school was to be ready in time. Review of enrollment projections in the spring of 1968 indicated that the school could be delayed until September 1972 by enrolling in the 1971 school year."

In addition to the Board's projections of population, Lyons said that projections of the Planning and Zoning Commission's Plan of Development, the Capitol Region Planning Commission's Plan of Development, and the United States Office of Education's Job Nation figures all supported the board's early projections for enrollment.

In contrast to the board's projections, the actual birth rate, according to Lyons, has dropped from 381 in 1963 to only 287 in 1968.

How do you choose the right mattress? Let's start with a few don'ts. Don't accept a hand-me-down mattress from family or friends. Don't buy a mattress because you like its pretty cover. Don't choose a mattress because your mother or friend has one and likes it.

Choose the mattress with the most durable covering, with a mattress you can't really see what you are buying. The inner



construction is the key to how comfortable it will be, what kind of support it will give, and how well it will wear.

For the most sleeping comfort, a mattress should be 10 inches longer than the tallest person who will sleep on it. A standard size bed is 75 inches long. That means that anyone over 5 foot 5 really needs an extra-length bed.

Width is important too. The old-fashioned double bed gives each sleeper only 37 inches of sleeping width—the exact width of a baby's crib! That's why the queen size, 60 inches wide by 80 inches long, has become the new standard size. For the ultimate in luxurious sleeping, consider the king size—78 inches wide and 80 inches long. It's best to decide on separate in the beginning rather than go to the expense of buying a standard size mattress and sheets only to change over after a year or so of marriage.

According to experts at the Serta Sleep Center, the golden rule for buying bedding is to buy both the mattress and its matching box springs. Mattresses and their matching box springs are designed to work together as a unit.

Don't be confused by coil count. The number of coils in a mattress is immaterial. What does count is the type of coil—the heavier, more durable coils are better. The way it is used in the mattress construction.

Here, called from the suggestions of bridal consultants, are some shopping do's and don'ts that will help ensure that the gown of your choice fulfills your expectations:

**SHOP EARLY.** Since most wedding gowns take from four to six weeks to be fitted and altered, you should begin shopping no later than two months before the big day.

To make sure you get the best personal service, it's smart to set up an appointment in advance. This is particularly important if you're shopping in a large store during the busy spring months.

**EXPLAIN YOUR NEEDS IN DETAIL.** You can avoid wasting your own and the bridal consultant's time by laying the proper groundwork. Tell her the date and time of your wedding, the degree of formality, the approximate price range you have in mind and your fashion likes and

dislikes.

**WEAR OR TAKE ALONG APPROPRIATE SHOES.** Have you ever seen a bride in boots? No gown can look very pretty that way, so take along the type of shoes you plan to wear. Many shops do provide shoes for trying on various styles of gowns.

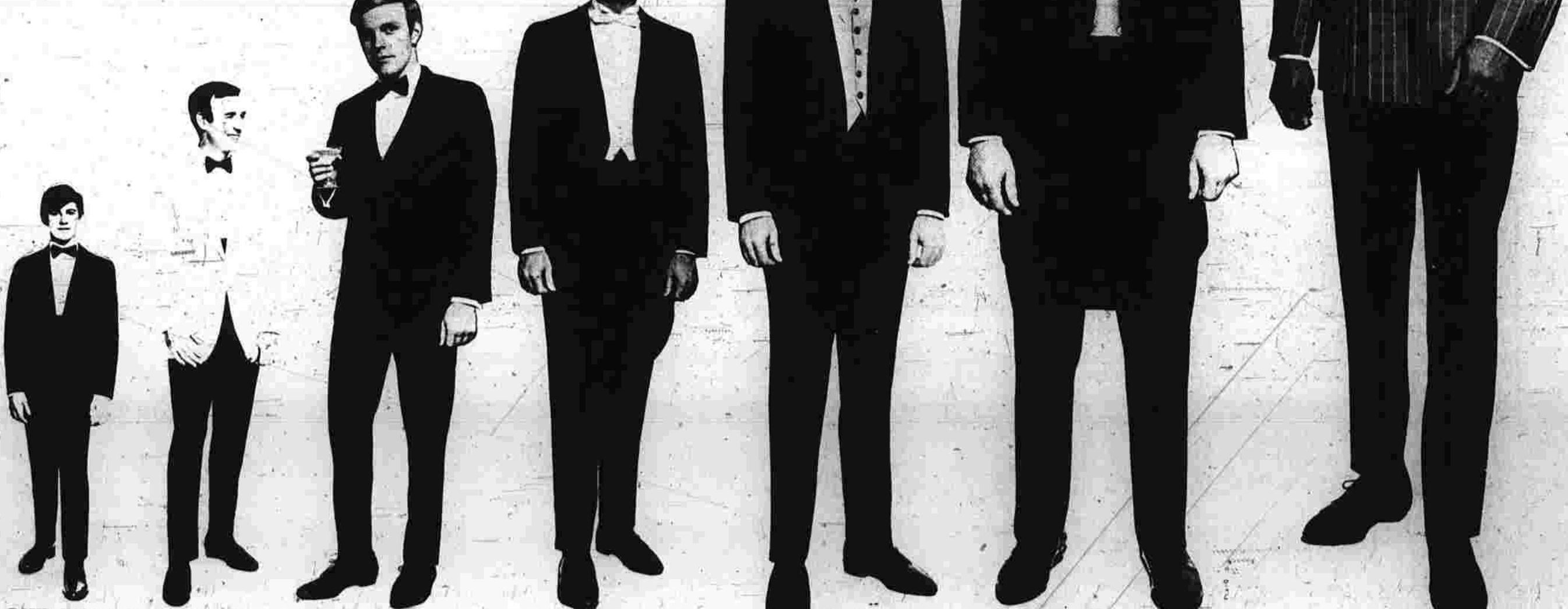

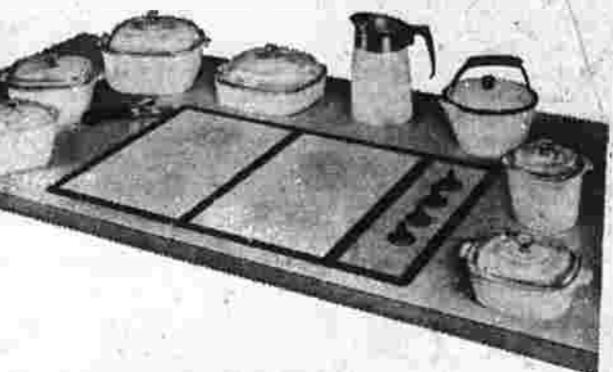

## Do Freeze Chicken

**TO BUY:** Your supermarket bird is ready to cook. This means that the chicken has been dressed in skin and cut. It is free of feathers and entrails—the head, feet and inedible organs have been removed before the bird was weighed for pricing.

Since tastes differ, it may be more economical for you to buy chicken parts. For example, if you like white meat only, just buy chicken breasts. Although chicken parts cost a little more per pound, you save money with less waste.

You will need approximately 3/4 pound chicken per serving. A three-pound bird yields four servings; a top-pound bird two servings.

**TO STORE:** The supermarket tray pack is acceptable for short term storage but it was not intended for full-term storage. In the latter case, remove the bird from the tray and rewrap.

Chicken may be stored in a normally cold refrigerator for one or two days. Store the chicken wrapped in the supermarket tray for this short term of storage.

**TO FREEZE:** Uncooked chicken may be frozen whole or in partitioned chicken also takes well to the freezer.

Maximum storage time for chicken wrapped, frozen and stored under most favorable conditions is 12 months for uncooked chicken and six months for cooked chicken dishes—with the exception of fried chicken which keeps well for about four months.

Moisture-vapor resistant material suitable for wrapping chicken includes heavy-duty aluminum foil; cellophane coated freezer paper; polyethylene freezer paper and plastic freezer bags.

When using cellophane bags, press the air out of package before sealing.

Label each package with date, kind of chicken, weight and number of servings.

Time-saving tip: freeze in one package the number of portions normally served at one time. Do not stuff whole chickens before freezing.

It is best to thaw the chicken in the refrigerator. To speed thawing, refrigerate on tray or plate. Whole frozen chickens under four pounds require 12 to 16 hours refrigerator time to thaw. To thaw chicken parts, refrigerate four to six hours.

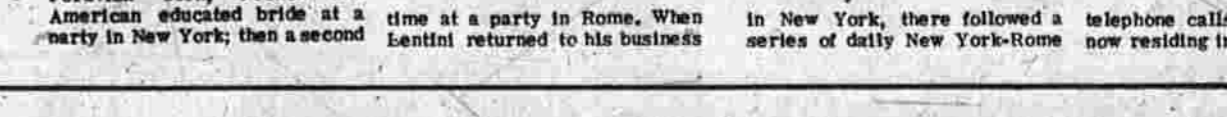

Many a modern miss asked to define the words "paper trossage" may think it refers to the paper-papart dresses and sport paper plates.

Traditionally, the wedding invitation was handwritten by someone who specialized in calligraphy. These scribes are a dying breed so engraving or the less costly thermography is now used. Formal invitations should be mailed at least three weeks in advance of the ceremony. Informal wedding invitations may take the form of handwritten notes or telephone calls but there is nothing wrong in sending out formal invitations to a small, informal wedding.

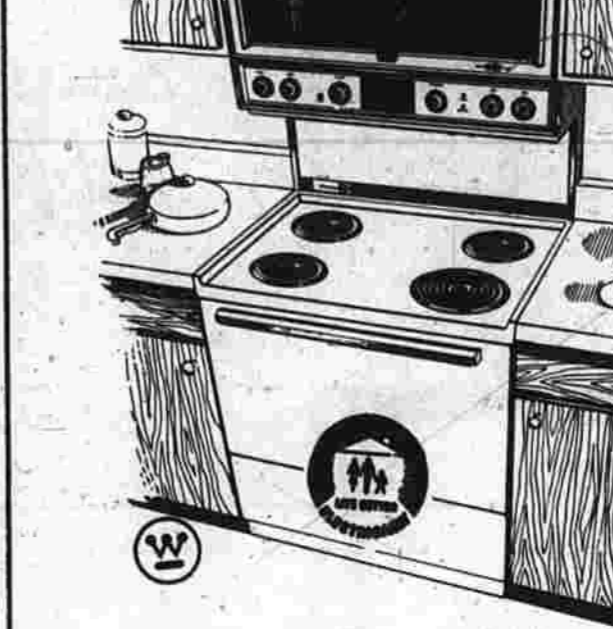

In addition, if you live in a rural area or suburb, preferably in the Northeast and you're married, you've earned money on your own and also finished school and you're now, too, earning money regularly, you're better than a 100 to 1 favorite to achieve stability and wedded bliss.

According to statistics compiled by the Census Bureau of the U. S. Department of Commerce, the three latest related elements most essential for a stable marriage are maturity, a good education, and a steady income.

Some qualifications in this regard should be noted. The percentage of marriages that end in divorce is decreasing, a trend supported by the fact that 18 of 20 men who marry before the age of 30 and 19 of 20 women who marry before the age of 20 are still married three years later. In fact, those who will wait 25, 30 or 35 years before marrying are three times more likely to be married than those who marry before the age of 20.

The more education a person gets, the older he tends to be when he marries. Male college graduates are 20 percent older than those who are high school graduates. The same is true of women. Beyond the age of 20, and who tend to marry more approximately their own age—have the greatest chance for marital success. Conversely, the youngest marriages occur among men with limited education and income. Beyond the age of 20, the Census takers find, the more schooling a man has, the higher his income and the

### Postwar Baby Marriage Rate Highest Since World War II

Marriage is more popular than ever, according to the latest statistics compiled by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

In the United States who marry each year has increased substantially and without interruption since 1952. Not since the close of World War II have marriages reached the 1957 figure of 1,915,000, and last October the end of the Korean conflict has the marriage rate reached its highest level of 2.7 marriages per 1,000 population. The magnitude of annual increases in marriages between 1952 and 1957 which have averaged 65,000—well above average annual increases in marriages for any other five year period since World War II.

Although, since 1952, marriages have increased both in absolute numbers and in proportion to the total population only about one out of every 14 women of eligible age married during 1957 as compared to one out of eight in 1942. High postwar birth rates, resulting in the current large number of young people of marriageable age, are the factors affecting the upward swing. A continuing high level of marriages through 1970 is forecast by the Health, Education and Welfare department.

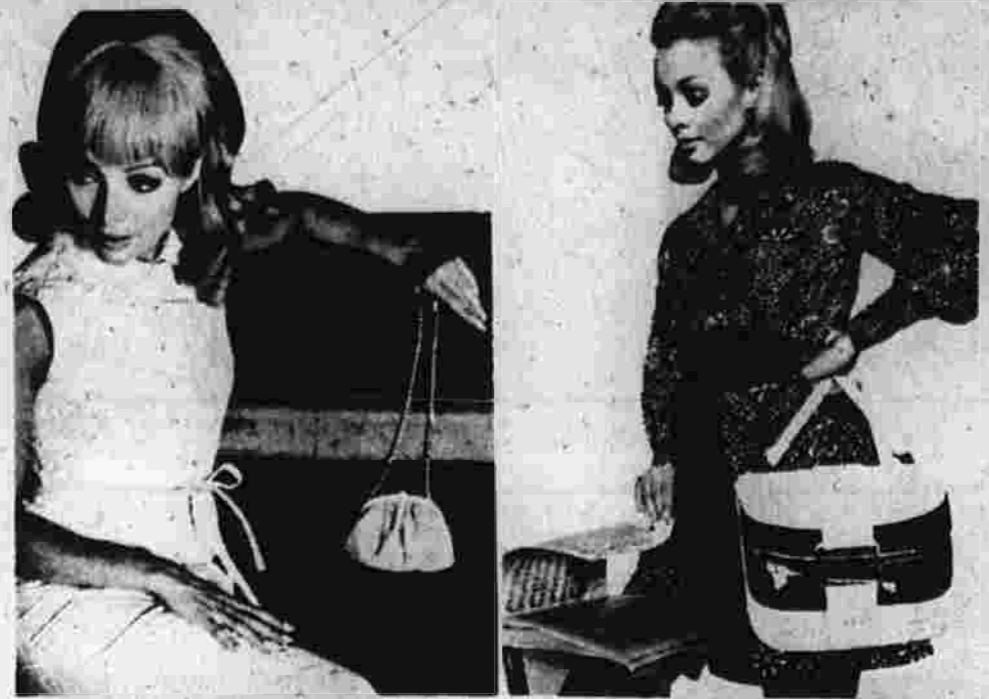

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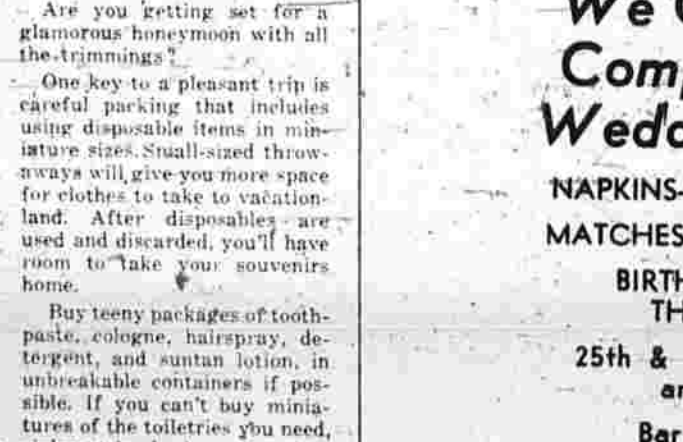
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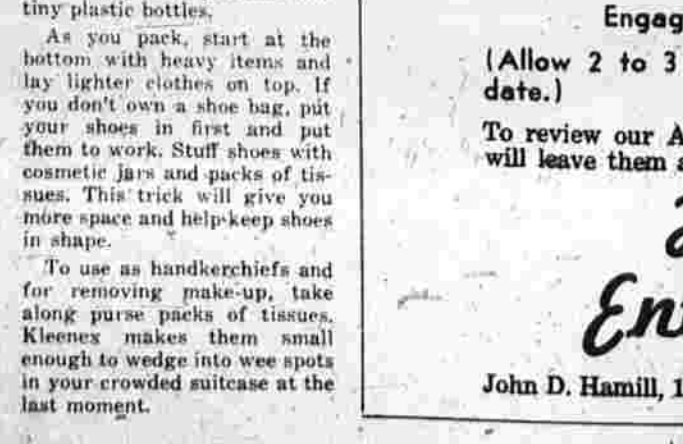
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List Items, Then Pack

Efficient packing starts before a couple is married. First, prior to laying out the honeymoon wardrobe, make a list of the items to be packed and the day and evening clothes that will be needed. Don't forget lingerie, cosmetics and grooming needs. Once the list has been compiled and checked, you can lay out the items to be packed. Since a bride will usually have her wardrobe case to hold basic clothing and a beauty or overnight case for cosmetics and items wanted en route, the items to be included in each case should be segregated accordingly.

The beauty or overnight case should have a tray to hold things like travel-size cosmetics, jewelry, a small sewing kit, flashlights, film cartridges. This is the place for all the little items you might need en route and immediately upon your arrival. It's best to keep your camera literally by your side. It's necessary to pack it, the beauty case is the place for it. Most items go into the wardrobe case. Roll your lingerie in neat rolls toward the front and lay these rolls in the bottom of the suitcase. Rightgowns and travel robes can also be rolled.

Next, put in the round retaining rod to hold all dresses in place at the waist and strapless dresses over the built-in padding bar. Fold suit skirts lengthwise from the waist to the hem and lay them over the padding bar. Lift the padding bar into place and fasten the divider pad. This will hold all your packed dresses and suits firmly without crushing or wrinkling them.

One word to the wise—be efficient as luggage handling. It can get lost on occasion. To expedite its speedy return get identification inside as well as outside all cases.

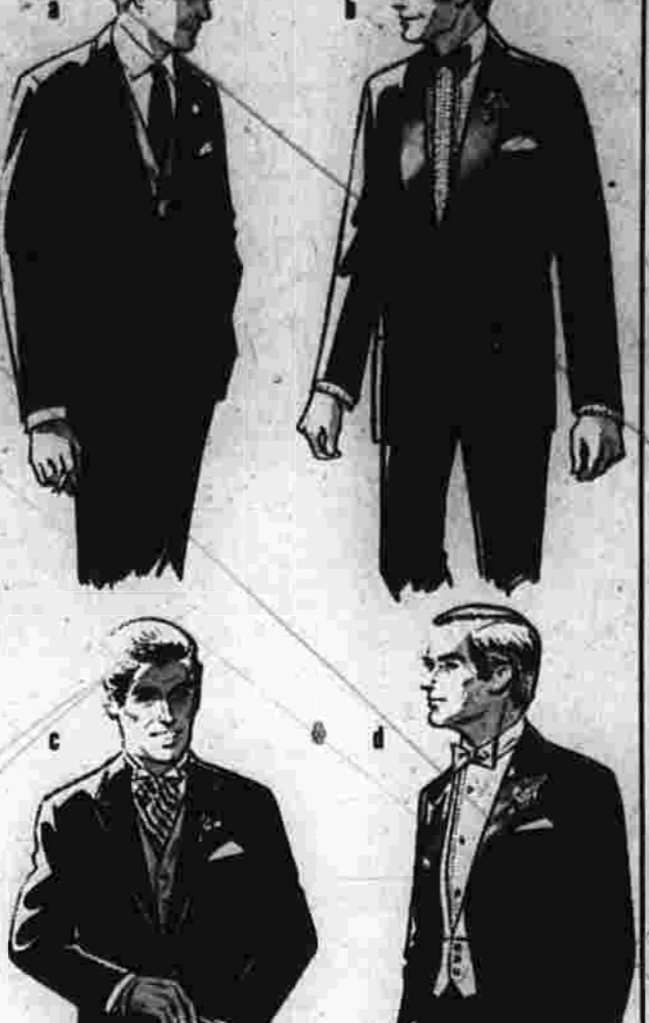

Commercial laundering will not harm quality linens. For at-home use, follow the instructions given for your machines.

Many soaps and detergents already contain bleaching ingredients. If you add your own, bleaching should be thoroughly rinsed out.

Use warm water (100 F) and half the original amount of soap. Trow with a clean towel or with the aid of a sprayer.

Store freshly laundered sheets and pillow cases at the bottom of the stacks or in a container that will assure rotation of use.

To Remove Stains: Lipstick comes out in hot soapy water, or can be bleached out with hydrogen peroxide.

Mildew should be bleached with a mild solution of water and household ammonia.

Stained areas should be dampened, then stretched out in the sun.

Blanket Care: Blankets should be aired several times a year and stored in cool places.

Never use hot water. Today's cold-water soaps are excellent for cleaning blankets in the shade, distributing weight evenly on either side.

Never rub blankets while washing, or twist them in wringing.

Never rub blankets as washing machines for more than two minutes and always follow the instructions given for your own machine.

Hang blankets in the shade, distributing weight evenly on either side.

When a garbage can is not a garbage can? When it's dressed up and decorated, that's when. Then, with a little imagination, a garbage can can perform a number of chores and be a decorative asset as well.

First, to glamorize your garbage can, dress it up with a colorful coat of paint in a color that blends or contrasts with your home's exterior color.

Depend on your artistic ability, you might paint flowers, leaves, birds, etc., in a contrasting color. Even if you haven't got the artistic touch you can always give it a pop art appearance by painting circles, triangles, squares in psychedelic colors.

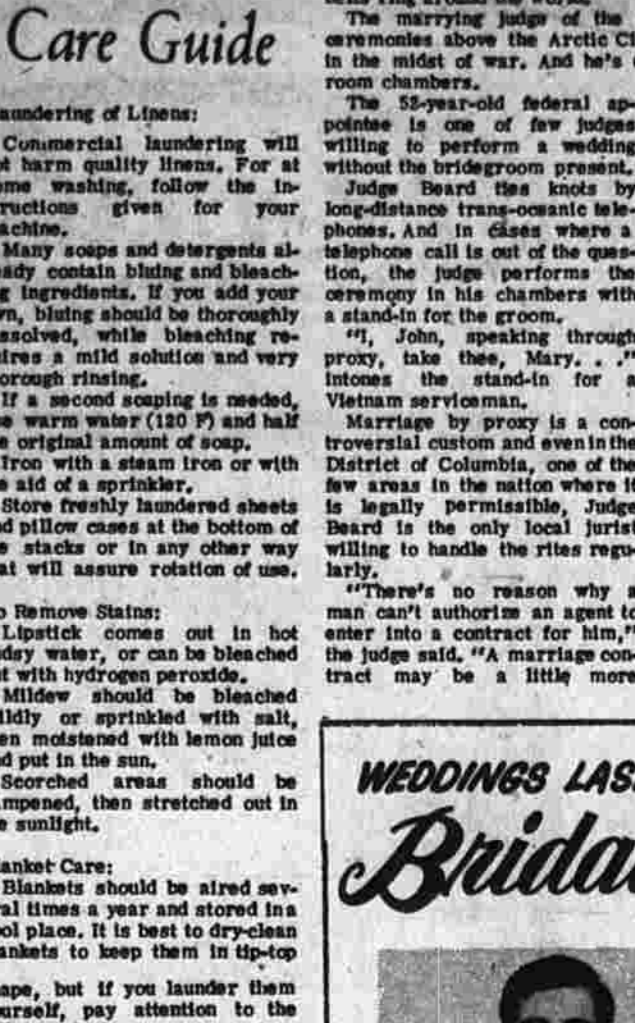
Saturate the clippings with water every time a fresh supply is added. Surround your plants with the compost to enrich the soil and keep weeds from growing.
