Even the Connecticut town which has just reduced its tax rate by almost as much as we are raising ours treated itself to a 9 mill increase last year, which evens things out. It is quite possible that the cure is never going to come from us, from our

own efforts to manage our own affairs. but will arrive as the result of some assumption of our financial burden by the state or the federal government, which will rescue all cities and towns at the same time by the same program. No one has yet found an effective way to end poverty -money alone is not the

answer —and a way may not exist.

The problem is not pollution as much as devising effective ways to control the ifresponsibility of the polluters. The blem is not nuclear war as much as the inability of nations to settle dispute peacefully, made more harrowing in a

macicar age.

The problem, in short, is still man's unwillingness to rise above pettiness, selfishness, violence and greed —inter-gible human barriers which prohibit practical means of fully controlling threatening developments. And pure awareness that the threats are frighteningly real has not yet tended to cure hese human weaknesses. It may prove true that the new values
