THE SOUND OF MOUNTAIN
WATER, By Wallace Stegner. Doubleday, 25.95.

This is a refreshing, two-chancel appreciation of the American West by an accomplished writer who has a great affection for the area. The 16 essays collected here were written over a period of more than 20 years.

The first half of the book contains pieces on the wilderness—mountains and deserts—which characterizes the true West. Its topics include packhorse trips, camping, visits to the Havasupal and the Navajo and excursions to the canyon country and the New Mexico deserts. During this period of slow and incondusive diplomacy, there has been a condusive, battle-action end to the living f 11,700 young American soldiers, to the living of 13,340 South Vietnamese soldiers, and to the living of an esti-

nated 150,000 young Vietcong and North letnamene soldiers. To have the possibility of peace on a table at Paris and to have the sacrifice of life continuing in the field in Vietnam is an anguishing, non-civilized performance. It reflects, unfortunately, the alnost automatic zeal of each side of the lighting to make its position stronger for the talking in Paris by showing its willingness to fight and lose lives in the field. Each side went to Paris not to see how quickly such a thing as a ceasefire might be arranged, but to test strengths and positions out during a prolonged period in which diplomatic movement and continued firing would be mixed. It does not seem that the result has been clearly beneficial to either side. Both, it is to be hoped, have grown per-

A Matter Of Rhythm ist, a classification of brain rhythms so precise that one's particular type of brain functioning could be stamped on

And if it were stamped on all passports, and particularly on diplomatic passports, so that people with the same kind of rhythm could be assigned all tasks which require mutual understanding, we might have a better and more peaceful world. Dr. W. Grey Walter, the brain special

ist involved, says all the people in the world can be divided into three groups, one called the nonvisualists, another the pure visualists, and a third the mixed isualists. The pure visualists have thought processes based primarily on the functioning of the eye. The nonvisualist has brain rhythms which specialize in dealing with abstractions in thought Perhaps the ideal combination for a succesaful negotiation would be that of two mixed visualists—mixed to precisely the right proportions, that is-who might not only achieve perfect understanding between themselves, but have some side capacity for understanding brains of reater visual or abstract capacities. The worst combination, for making the world go round, would be that of the

pure visualist with the nonvisualist. They might fail miserably and totally in their effort to communicate with one another and succeed in wrecking everything from the smallest business deal up to the coexistence of nations. But get the right brain rhythms in the right place at the right time, and there might be nothing men could not do. How do you tell which type of brain

may be inside which individual? You measure the outside electric echoes of the brain at work, and get a reading which determines the classification. Eventually, the device by which the type of brain rhythm can be measured will be hooked into the brain in order to help set the rhythm, and we will all get along beautifully because we all hink alike. That will mean the end of all human disagreement and strife and leave us as the only peril to our existence an exquisitely stifling bore-

Dialogue And Change At Yale There seems to be plenty of dialogue at Yale. In effect, the administration, the student body and the faculty have participated in what might well be termed a present-day adaptation of the old New England town meeting.
