

Iona To Be Sold, Will Stay in Town

Iona Manufacturing Co., Manchester's biggest em-ployer, has reached "an agreement in principle" to sell Iona to General Signal Corp. of New York City. William H. Sleith, presit-treasurer of Iona, announced the sale this noon be sold for an undisclosed number of shares of General Signal common stock.

Sleith said, "The lora line of electric appliances will broaden General Signal's part in the appliance deld and provide lona with the financial base necessary for continued expansion. "Selling may not be the right word," he added, "Merger may be better."

Sleith said the rapidly growing loss needs a large amount of capital to continue growing.
General Signal has that capital, In 1968, sales of the privately-owned Iona and its subsidiaries were about \$10 million. Products included food mixers, blenders, can openers, shoe polishers, hair dryers and knives.

General Signal had sales of \$175 million. It makes floor care appliances including a light weight vacuum cleaner. It also has divisions making electric controls for railroads, electric signals for hospital equipment and systems for water desalina-tion. Iona's staff will remain the same from top to bottom, Sleith said. He will become the presi-dent of the Iona division of Gen-eral Signal which has 18 disions with 24 plants in the U.S.

Could Dollars Decide? There are times when this nation gets flicting estimates of its own military pens most easily when one part of our military establishment is engaged in utting on a drive for more funds or new weapons and wishes to alarm Conpress and public into doing what it repards as the necessary thing, while, at he same time, another part of our military establishment is proud of the reapons it has developed for us.

The Navy admiral in charge of our leet of nuclear submarines has now responded, for instance, to an inference Defense Secretary Melvin Laird and Deputy Secretary David Packard have seen making in the course of their argument for adoption of the "Safe-guard" ABM system. They have been inferring that we could no longer be sure that our Polarie submarine missiles would be sure to have the last word in any nuclear war with Russia. Rear Admiral Levering Smith now responds with point by point reassurance on the continued value and dominance of the Polaris. He is convinced Russia submarines have not yet developed the capacity to follow our Polaris submarines. There are no new surface antisubmarine measures we need to fear. He doesn't believe anybody will ever be able to use satellites to detect sub-

marines under the water. Rear Admiral Levering came into the news with such reassurance about the released a new finding by its own chief of research in which he predicted that Russia will have the capacity by 1975 to launch upon us a missile attack of such proportions that only one tenth, or about 100, of our own land-based missiles would survive to reply to the Russian attack. This finding paid no attention to the role of the Polaris, but used such conclusions about our land-bas-

ed arsenal to recommend that we hurry ahead with our own anti-missile missiles. If, faced with such warring testimony, we don't know which side of our own military establishment to believe, perhaps we can take refuge, perhaps even comfort, in the statement of Richard M. Heims, our CIA director, which also

came into the news on this same day. He advanced the theory that the arms race between Russia and America may have to be brought to some kind of end because "the future costs of adequate defense may well prove impossible for both nations to bear." As we examine our own sparse knowledge and recollection of history, ancient

and modern, we do not seem able to recall a single instance in which any nation abandoned an armaments program because of its financial cost, or ever concluded that it could not afford, financially, to prepare for its next war. Nevertheless, present costs, and prospective costs are now reaching proportions which are almost unbelievable. Civilization has been waiting for something to prove powerful enough to turn man away from war. It has always been hoped that the terrible, tragic cost in human lives might ultimately persuade men and nations to live under law. But

## The Files We Keep

Somebody who has been studying America's office space needs has come up with the statistic that U.S. companies now have some 1,500,000,000,000 pieces paper on file. Of these 1,500,000,000,000 pieces of

paper in our files, only 2 per cent will ever be tooked at again. Only onefiftieth of what we keep and store will ever be used by us again. The trouble is, of course, that we never know which documents are going to be included in the 2 per cent for which we are going to have some future

problem which, for what it is worth, will be verified by almost all people

The particular pieces of paper one is going to need are usually the ones which get lost because they have somehow found their way into the wrong file. One would get approximately the same practical result if one threw everything away every 30 days.

### Avoidable Catastrophe

Mr. Robert McNamara's gesture in choosing a Roman Catholic audience at Notre Dame University, Illinois, last week for a passionate appeal for international action to control population growth was an uncharacteristic stroke f drama. No one should miss the point. He was looking for some way to make us all sit up and think again about what he regards as the most important dilemma facing humanity. The problem is only too familiar, but some of his interpretations are not as

well known as they ought to be. First, this is not just a problem for the future. Today the population explosion is the most important single reason why the efforts of the developed countries to help underdeveloped toward selfsustain ing growth have failed. The capital which ought to lay the foundations for improvement is swallowed up in the need to feed, shelter, and educate the extra millions. Small wonder that this is an especially urgent problem to Mr. McNamaru as President of the World Bank. In his own graphic words, he sees his funds going to sustain "a treadmill\_economy...dynamic misery growing ever wider and deeper."

The trouble is that many people who recognise the enormity of the problem negard it with despair. Again Mr. Mc-Namara, as an expert on logistics, has a more realistic point of view. Thanks developments in plant breeding and the use of fertilisers, the food supply at least could outpace the human need. But this does not mean we can forget the estimate, two more decades to solve it. against the task in hand. First, the new echnology of agriculture must be put into practice. In the breathing space that will allow, research and education must find an answer to limiting human fertility-matching medical progress, or "death confrol" as he calls it, with fertility control. Otherwise war and

famine will do the job in what will truly be hell on earth. The humane answer will not be found if we have to leave it to a world financial official to speak for humanity. This is a task in which any developed country can make a worthwhile contr bution at manageable cost. It ought to be an objective which could appeal to constructive idealism, as our present inward-looking grumbling does not. The problem, in fact, will only be solved when it becomes a live political issue; we are still waiting for a politician to take the lead-or now, to follow Mr. Me-Namara's. - MANCHESTER (ENG-
