Dam Gives Way In Flash Flood, Five Still Missing

GROVETON, N.H. (AP) - Five men were unaccounted for today following a flash flood and about three-quarters of a mile of road at South, about 100-foot earthen dam gave way, northwestern New Hampshire. State Selectman William Joyce said 20 to 30 feet of water roared down the stream bed. It caused an estimated \$100,000 damage to the bridge. Joyce said the Molton Bridge collapsed into the stream, and the 50-foot Nash Stream Bridge was washed completely downstream. Several families in Groveton evacuated their homes but were able to return when the water receded, leaving six to eight inches of silt on roads. The 25-foot high, long-retention dam had held back about 275 acres of water in the Nash Stream Pond. Stark has a population of 210. In the flood, a 20-foot wall of water from Nash Stream tore out bridge abutments, knocked down telephone poles and flooded the Groveton Paper Co. stream washed out two bridges. In Perilous Hours of Separation LEM Occupants To Depend On Young's Skill, Judgment

By Jim Strohman AP Associate Writer SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - For eight hours Thursday, the lives of two Apollo 11 astronauts will depend—as never before in a space flight—on pilot skill and judgment. Astronaut Thomas P. Stafford and Eugene A. Cernan will be flying around the moon in a spacecraft unable to safely return to earth, the lunar module (LEM) landing craft. John W. Young will be a long-range guardian, flying alone in the command module, up to 300 miles behind his comrades and on their own a quarter million miles from home. The LEM will dip to within 8.3 miles of the moon while the command module carrying Young stays in a 90-mile-high orbit. If Stafford and Cernan get in trouble, it will be up to Young to rescue them; or they will perish and he would face a 54-hour, 22,000-mile return trip alone. The lunar LEM cannot return to the earth's atmosphere without burning up. The flight plan calls for Young to unspool from the LEM and Stafford to fire the spider-like craft's small maneuvering rockets to near two miles away before returning near the command ship again. If all goes well in this initial maneuver, Stafford and Cernan then trigger LEM's big braking rocket to swoop to within 90,000 feet of Apollo 11's intended landing site in the moon's Sea of Tranquility. "We thought of asking for a 20-mile line of steel wire to tie us together," Stafford quipped in a pre flight interview. "But that was ruled out. This is our rendezvous we have to make." The engine burn to descend at some 3,000 miles an hour in the 9.8-mile low point will be perilous. "If we overburn by as much as three seconds, we'll make a crash landing at about 8,000 feet per second as we come over the top of one of those craters," Cernan said before the launch. "The burn is to last at second."

"We'll be diving straight in," Cernan said. "We're going to see that lunar surface coming up at us, and we're not sure just where we're going to stop. You've got to have a great deal of confidence in your equipment and your ability to stop at the around 80,000 feet." After the LEM takes steps over the moon at its low point, the braking rocket fires at an angle that will allow the command ship to pass and overtake the LEM. Then the LEM's ascent engine, a duplicate of the one which will blast Apollo 11 astronauts out of the moon's surface, will fire to start the rendezvous with Young. At lunar distance, tracking from the ground is not accurate enough to aid astronauts during the final close-in maneuver. They will rely on radar, computers on board the LEM and command ship. If these fail, they must count on their own eyesight and experience. Young, 32, will be in communication with both earth and the lunar module. But it is likely he will at times lose sight of the LEM. On the dark side of the moon, the only light will be from earthshine. The sun will be obscured. Young will pursue the lunar module around the moon, firing the command ship engines only if "they come up on a burn and can't do it." In case of a LEM failure, Young could swoop down within nine miles of the lunar surface should an emergency occur. To go beyond that point could be fatal. Bill Amendment Allows Any-Hour Welfare Probes. HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) - By accepting a Republican amendment the House nullified Tuesday a bill aimed at protecting welfare families from midnight visits by welfare investigators. The amendment would allow the state welfare commissioner to order inspections at any hour of the day or night if he suspects fraud. The bill would have required that inspections be made at "reasonable" times. Majority Leader Carl Albert and Minority Leader Stewart B. McKinney said public opinion is running strongly against welfare. McKinney said anything should be done to eliminate fraud should be a step toward improving welfare's image. Admitting he knows from his work on a study committee that there have been "tremendous abuses" by investigators, McKinney said he is "in politics."

Pension Change Just Formality For Directors

The Manchester Board of Directors, at its June 3 meeting, will go through the strange formality of conducting a public hearing and taking action on a revision to the Town Pension Ordinance it already has approved. On March 18 it unanimously approved a working agreement with Local 99, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO. The agreement, negotiated by Town Manager Robert Weiss, provides for pension contributions based on an employee's entire earnings, including overtime. The provision will be effective July 1. At present, contributions are computed on base pay only. Town Counsel John Shea ruled on Dec. 5, 1967, that collective bargaining by employe organizations include the right to bargain for pension benefits. He based his ruling on a statute adopted by the 1967 State Assembly, following a recommendation by the 1960 and 1967 Joint House and Senate Labor Committees. The House chairman at the time was Sen. James J. Blawie, and the Senate chairman was Sen. James J. Blawie.

## All About Greenland

COPENHAGEN, Greenland (AP)—A few Greenlanders still get their drinking water by hauling pails of ice from the coast, but this arctic island is on the move toward a modern life. No more igloos for the dwellers; the houses of the future, more like those of the towns in southern Greenland, they're too small for the island's needs. The houses are built on the ice-scaped land. Long apartment blocks, mostly two-and-a-half-story high, already dot the rocky plateaus of Godthaab, Nuuk, Sisimiut and other towns. They are warmed by central heating plants, lit by electricity and served with running water from pipes electrically heated where necessary to prevent freezing.

The Red, with a hand of tough Icelandic Vikings, started a Scandinavian colony in Greenland in 1951, but the Vikings disappeared in the 15th century. The Danes came back in 1721 when Hans Rigde, a minister, headed to the island to spread the Lutheran faith among the Eskimos. Greenland became a Danish colony.

And the Danes are determined that the 40,000 Greenlanders get a taste of the living standards enjoyed by their countrymen. They are spending about \$75 million a year to do it.

Godthaab, the capital and largest town, had 55 automobiles in 1967. Now there are 600, including 50 taxis. Godthaab's population, 7,000, may reach 10,000 in 1975.

Brightly painted houses are scattered over the snowy landscape. The two most important roads lead to the two harbors, old and new. There are no sidewalks.

People who live too far from the center of town—and many do—get their water from a truck. It is too expensive to lay water lines through the rock and frozen soil and keep them unfrozen. That applies to sewers as well.

Apartment blocks are more economical. New blocks with 200 apartments, the largest with two bathrooms, will be started next year.

A modern town center, with office buildings, a new hotel, movie theater and stores, is in the works. There will be enclosed passageways to protect against the subzero winter temperatures, among the stores.

Godthaab already has a supermarket with almost anything in food you could want, including fresh fruit. There is a department store with a "teen shop" and all the latest gear from Europe.

Miniskirts are popular at all seasons with the young set. The capital has five pop groups and a few hippies with shoulder-length hair, wavy beards and beads.

At the Seminarie Skolen, a secondary school, it is not uncommon to find boys beating out the latest pop on guitars in their rooms while down below the cleaning women are cutting strips from a recently caught fish and eating it raw for lunch.

You don't call anybody an Eskimo in Greenland any more. They are Greenlanders, and, above all, they are Danes because Greenland is Denmark's largest county although it is 1,460 miles from the royal palace in Copenhagen.

The Danes say there is hardly a Greenlandic who doesn't have some European genes, especially Danish genes, due to the long Scandinavian relationship with this land.

With 840,000 square miles, Greenland is the largest county in the world. Unfortunately, only one-tenth of the land is arable and the rest is almost all covered with ice and snow. The island is 2,000 miles long and 500 miles wide. This is where icebergs come from. It is estimated that more than a billion tons of ice are

pushed into the sea from the ice pack each year. Danish fishermen over Greenland are steadily depleting the North Atlantic to endanger shipping. You might think this a forbidding place, especially in winter when there are only a few hours of murky light. But some of the world's most magnificent scenery is found in the land's southern part.

Wild, jagged peaks thrust out of the sea. Long, snow-covered fjords slice in from the coast. In the spring enormous fields of pink ice crunch down from the north, cutting off the east coast. Along the west coast, an occasional small town, including the largest, Sisimiut, is built on a hillside. Helicopters cannot reach the east coast settlements across the sea.

Greenlanders pay no direct taxes. Only a few taxes such as tobacco, motor, beer and wine are levied. A package of 20 cigarettes costs about \$1. But income taxes are a possibility as the standard of living rises.

Denmark is footing almost all the bill now. At present the hope of making Greenland pay its way lies in the coal and shrimp which abound off its coast. There is also a hope that mineral deposits of oil may be found.

Denmark has sent in 400 teachers and is trying to attract more private capital to develop the island.

The United States maintains two military bases to guard against the threat of Soviet aggression or Communist infiltration. The bases are at Søndre Strømfjord and the old U.S. Air Base group of the Aerospace Defense Command. The group services the Navy's V-44, the DEW Line—radar installations stretching across Greenland.

Thinking further north, is designed to give warning of a missile attack.

There are plenty of reindeer in the Søndre Strømfjord area and occasionally a few wander across the airstrip. In the winter the temperature gets down to 45 degrees below zero.

Nevertheless, Lt. Richard Skinner, the base information officer, says it is a fascinating assignment with excellent fishing and hiking.

Some of the GIs stationed here on one-year hitchhike find it a little less fascinating.

"Every guy here can tell you the number of days he has left within two days," one said.

**Maid Is Man**  
VIENNA (AP)—A 64-year-old pensioner told the court he donned women's clothes and went to work in households because he was unable to do any other work and would not have been hired as a man.

The court session was started after police in a routine check noted that he had altered his identification card. He was fined 400 Schillings (\$18) for this.

The prosecutor said he did not care if the man continued going to work in women's garb. "As far as I am concerned you may buy yourself a nice hat to go with your dress," he said.

## Despite Old Superstitions, Chinese Ladies Hold Power

Beijing, China, (AP)—The Chinese women's movement is a stark contrast to the old superstitions of the past. In Communist China, women are not only equal to men in the workplace, but they are also equal in the home. In any case, it helps have a powerful husband.

The recent sixth Communist party congress disclosed that there is now a levy of ladies holding down high jobs. All are wives of highest level leaders.

Chiang Ching, Mao Tse-tung's fourth wife and female first lady of the great proletarian revolution, may have started a trend. For a time, a few years back, her climb to prominence over other women had the look of a monumental hair-pulling match.

Many husbands of these leaders, a former actress from Shanghai, now occupies a high post outside the five-man inner circle of the ruling Politburo. The queenly crown may be resting upon an unimpressive head, but there are a number of other women on the bridge of power.

Chiang Ching's husband, Premier Liu Shao-chi, is now denounced as an enemy of Mao, a "saboteur and renegade" and "China's Khrushchev."

Mrs. Mao, with a talent for venomous fighting, bore out the edges about her husband and the woman scorned. The lowly, smoky-eyed woman had a quiet character, but her other leading woman of the official family glittered in the light.

When Mrs. Mao married Chiang Ching against the party's wishes, the leadership insisted she stay in the back ground. For all that foreigners knew she didn't exist.

Wang Kang-wei and other women accompanied their husbands abroad, served as official hostesses at state functions and lived it up. Chiang Ching was a nobody. Then came the cultural revolution.

Chiang Ching had arrived. Mao made her a deputy chief of the party. While Mao's backers took out after Premier Liu, his wife sharpened the axe for Wang Kang-wei. Under her direction

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to control such standards. President Nixon seems to have established a fine, wholesome atmosphere at the White House. Let him not spoil it by attempting to legislate atmosphere and moral values for his countrymen.

**Give-Away On Give-Aways**  
There is any vitality in nothing when the squeaky station give-away games which have been advertising so many motorists and rewarding so few for the past several years, the defense for the game was not, not by the gasoline station proprietors, but by the firms which make up the game and sell them to the station dealer.

And whenever there is a proposal, like that now up for enactment down in the City Council in New York City, to put it into law that shopkeepers could claim immediate cash discounts instead of taking trading stamps, the big protest is not so much by the grocers, but by the stores or gasoline stations or other merchandisers as by the companies which sell and service the stamps and operate the redemption centers.

And such reaction, indeed, we think, precisely where the real profit lies in each instance.

**Looks Round**  
Sometimes situation and perspective give surprising weight to what might be otherwise routine observation.

It may not have been out of most of us had already heard or read and then accepted Commander Eugene O'Connor's casual remark the other day that we suddenly realized how important and valid a remark it was, coming from him, in his location, from his perspective.

When the astronaut said, from his vantage point 127,754 miles away from home, which he was looking at and which he was showing to us all with his camera, he said:

"I'm voting for the world being round."

This might be, at last, the first really free vote on the subject.

With such a picture before his eyes, and ours, Commander O'Connor didn't have to be didactic about it. He was merely expressing his own opinion, his own selection, "voting" for the conclusion which seemed to him most logical.

Nor is there any need for anybody to pass a law, decreeing that the roundness of the earth shall henceforth be required doctrine.

The flat earth people, for that matter, can still be entitled to their belief, if they can still believe it. They look at that lovely little sphere from 127,754 miles out. But we think that all history contains any declaration made from a position more authoritative than that occupied by Commander O'Connor when he ventured his opinion.

**How Get Rid Of Nerve Gases?**  
No wonder people are worried about 27,000 tons of nerve and mustard gas which, according to the Pentagon, are to be dumped in the Atlantic deep.

Only Sen. John J. Williams of Delaware, senior Republican on the Senate Finance Committee, backed up Mills. High Administration officials were loyally obedient to the idea of an expenditure limit. The two top members of the House Appropriations Committee—Democrat George Mahon of Texas and Republican Frank Row of Ohio—were not interested.

In just one month these skeptics have reluctantly swallowed the expenditure limit—a device Mahon dabbles in occasionally. Mahon was given this choice: Set a limit or the Ways and Means Committee will set jurisdiction and do it for you. Confronting that challenge, Mahon went along.

Simultaneously, Mills was making it clear to unhappy Treasury and Budget Bureau officials that an expenditure limit was the maximum price for permitting the surtax renewal to emerge from his Ways and Means Committee.

Mills, along with other senior members of the Congressional appropriations and tax-writing committees, was at the White House that evening for a private preview of President Nixon's budget estimates. Mr. Nixon was quite pleased with having allowed four billion dollars from President Johnson's last budget. So were most of the Congressional leaders present.

The budget simply was not tight enough, Mills bluntly told the President. When Mr. Nixon replied that nothing more could be cut, Mills replied he had heard the same kind of talk from Mr. Johnson. He then warned that, unless Congress placed an unimpeachable ceiling on expenditures, the extension of the 10 per cent surtax desired by Mr. Nixon was dead.

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# The Critics Sex Education Controversy

After five years of attracting attention, sex education courses in public schools have come under attack in at least 37 states within the past year.

The intensity of the campaign against sex education has increased in recent months, particularly because some conservative organizations have joined wholeheartedly in the controversy.

The struggle between the opposing factions is turning into a bitter, emotional warfare that has leapfrogged from the local school board to state legislatures to Congress.

Some opponents see sex education in a conspiratorial light; patriotic, Communist-serving and breaking down the moral fabric of American youth.

Others see it as an intrusion into an area they feel should be left to the parents. They view it as one more manifestation of the permissive society.

"They're questioning that opposition to sex education is linked to public anxiety over the flood of sex in the movies, books, advertisements and mass media," said Gerald Sauter, international director of the Sex Information and Education Council of the U.S.

It is called, in a principal part, of the opponents. Legislators in Arizona, California, Idaho, Iowa, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Washington have considered measures to prohibit, control or investigate sex education.

A bill introduced in Congress would withhold federal aid from sex education courses or related teacher training.

The addition of the John Birch Society to the campaign brought a new element to a struggle already emotionally charged and pecked with an almost religious fervor.

The Birch Society through its Movement for the Rejection of Communism, added the suggestion of a Communist tactic.

Although legislators, the Birch Society waded enthusiastically into the battle and claimed major credit for keeping the sex boiling.

"I'm willing to bet you'll find a member of the society active in every state where there's opposition to sex education," said Wallace W. Wood, coordinator for ad hoc committees of the society.

But he said, "We assume that 90 to 99 per cent of those who will support Motere will not be members of the John Birch Society. In fact, they may completely disagree with our philosophy in other areas."

"I'm getting a little bitter about this, I don't mind telling you," said T. Bayard Williams Jr., president of the Parents and Citizens United for Responsible Education in Torrington, Calif.

POSE, Parents Opposed to Sex Education in Hopkins, Minn., and SOS, Sanity on Sex in Oklahoma City, Okla.

Opposition to sex education reaches a fever pitch in some areas. In Michigan City, Ind., William Hoffman, a school administrator who headed a group that recommended a sex education program, reported that threats had been made against him and his wife and his three children.

The threats were made after Hoffman described the proposed program to a group of about 800 parents at what he described as a "hostile" meeting. Hoffman described the courses as "insidious programs" bound to cause "emotional conflicts" in children.

# Only Area—Tiny Desks, Laps Legislators Sorely Pressed For Adequate Office Space

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Don't judge a Connecticut legislator by the size of his desk. The desks in either the House or the Senate in the Capitol building are so small that many legislators are forced to sit on the floor or on a chair to read the morning paper on his lap.

The legislators should be excused, however, because that desk—smaller than those provided to many public school children," as one study report described it—is the only one he has.

The problem of crowding at the Capitol is almost a joke. A senator, speaking recently on legislative changes needed to discover a solution to the problem of space in the capitol building, said that he had visited the capitol building, only to return later and find it crowded with aides from someone's lunch.

The problem of providing working room in the capitol building is a serious one. A 10-year-old Gothic building, designed by Felix for deep-sea divers. This means: individual office space for legislators, separate offices for legislative leaders, conference rooms for committee meetings and other legislative purposes, executive offices, hearing rooms, parking space for legislators and the public and such simple essentials as enough telephones and appropriate food service."

But back to that average legislator: He has been called away from his desk on business. To locate him, now, one may either leave a note at Desk 172 and hope he sees it or search him out on the floor. While it is possible to call him directly, there are four women who take the messages to his desk. Low morale is a common ailment among legislators—and low morale is expensive.

They have to travel in cramped conditions and some must even take home their dictionaries because there is no room at the Capitol for them to type transcripts.

"I'm amazed that the secretaries do as fine a job as they do," says Mrs. Dow, "when they often go without lunch, working into the night and the session and always have these crowded conditions."

Outdoors, on driveways that loop across spacious lawns, the atmosphere is much the same. A worker arriving at Capitol Hill after 9:30 a.m. on a busy day may spend 10 minutes looking for a parking space.

The attention should have improved in 1967, mused an auxiliary Capitol policeman who has supervised parking at the Capitol for 34 years. Then, the state of the House decreased from 284 to 177. But, at about the same time, a new limited access highway cut through to Capitol Avenue, robbing the existing parking area of about 100 spaces.

There is now a vast lot at the foot of the hill near the State Attorney. Still, employees have to move their cars to other spaces when a full-house total of 800 legislators, top state executive members and special guests jam the driveways.

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### Minister by Day, by Night He Rides with Police Pals

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP) — Many married men have their weekly night out and the Rev. Robert Amundson is no exception. He spends every Friday night in a police squad car, taking the word of God to the street corners and ministering to the spiritual needs of his police pals.

To these pals, Amundson is simply "The Rev."  
Chaplain to the Fort Myers police force for the past five years, Amundson has become familiar with violence, screams in the night and flashing police lights. Last week was no exception. The squad car radio alerted Amundson to the trouble. Moments later the preacher, billy club in hand, scrambled out of the car. Seconds later he was comforting a man who was jittered by the body of a slain brother.  
"The Rev. joined us originally because policemen can't always attend church on Sunday morning, because we needed help with potential suicides and wayward juveniles and because the image of the policeman was slowly declining," said Police Chief Bert Underhill.  
"Now, we wouldn't want to be without him. We sometimes find it less sight of the dead that we can't leave God out of our plans."  
The Rev. moved easily through the streets of Fort Myers in the First Presbyterian Church where he is pastor, the 39-year-old Amundson says he never fears to spend every Friday night and many weekday hours riding

what they had seen to the tall minister who questioned them quickly and efficiently. Amundson later helped police to answer a family dispute, rode through hazy hangouts for house-arrestees who exchanged greetings with the kids, and sympathized with three young boys who were unable to find a regular drug peddler.

On the way home, he talked about his Friday nights. He said his wife accepted his unusual after-hours activities, even though she sometimes feared it would leave three children fatherless.  
For the Rev., police work is a way to repay the regular force he considers "unpaid, overworked and unappreciated."

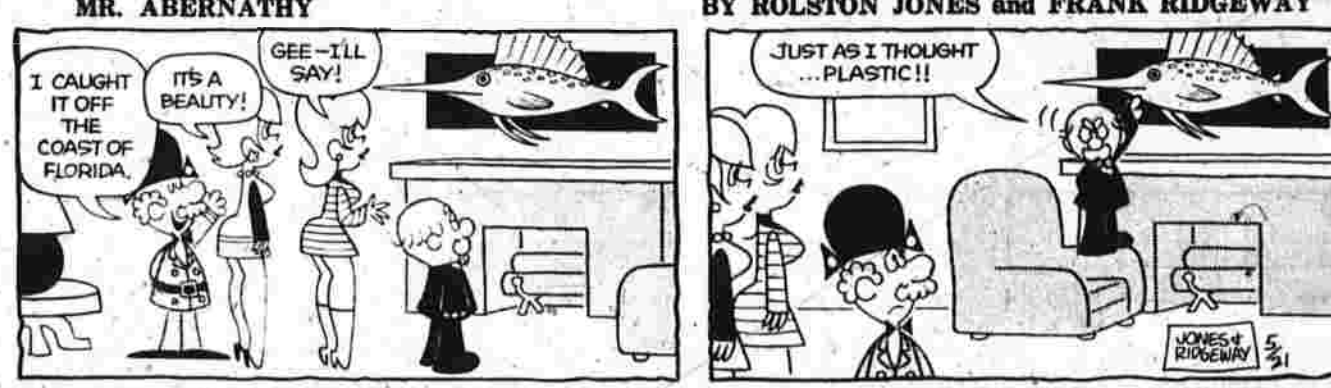

Mrs. Oude van is a member of Center Congregational Church, The Island General Synod is the legislative body of the three-million-member denomination, a union of the Congregational, Christian and Evangelical and Reformed Churches. ## New Chief Justice 'Law, Order' Judge

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon has selected his kind of "law and order" judge, Warren E. Burger, to succeed Earl Warren and serve as the 16th chief justice of the United States.

The gray-haired, 61-year-old midwesterner, who has 18 years on the U.S. Circuit Court here, is known as a strict constructionist who has criticized "appellate self-policing."

Senators, particularly conservative, hailed Burger as an excellent and easy to approach lawyer. Burger will step in next term for Warren, who is retiring at 78 after pleading the Supreme Court through its most active and liberal period.

The choice was a relatively obscure one, though Burger has a solid reputation in legal circles. His immediate predecessors, Warren, Fred M. Vinson, Harlan F. Stone and Charles Evans Hughes, all had national reputations when they were picked to chief justice.

Nixon announced the nomination to the country from the White House Wednesday night. He said it was the most important act as a President can make.

While campaigning for the presidency, Nixon said court decisions were "seriously handicapping the peace process and the economy and strengthening the criminal forces."

He called for "rehabilitation of the first civil right of every American, the right to prosecute in his home, business and person from domestic violence."

The White House, in a statement, said Burger's philosophy was reflected in a commencement speech he made two years ago at Ripon College. It began: "Government exists chiefly to foster the rights and interests of its citizens—to protect their names and property, their persons and their lives."

Burger called his selection "a tribute to all the brave and state judges of the nation who (See Page Fourteen)

## Execution Of Sirhan Ordered

LOS ANGELES (AP) — His face expressionless, Sirhan Bishara Sirhan was sentenced to die for the assassination of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, slain at a moment of political victory.

Superior Court Judge Victor V. Walker pronounced the death sentence Wednesday for the 25-year-old Palestinian Arab despite a plea from Kennedy's brother, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Calif., that one life not be taken for another.

Walker ordered that Sirhan be held in a death row cell at California's San Quentin prison—near his gas chamber—pending an appeal to the state supreme court.

"It is the judgment and sentence of this court," Walker told Sirhan, "that you should suffer the penalty of death... in the manner prescribed by law."

As the judge finished, Sirhan flashed a smile and then shrugged.

Kennedy was shot last June 5 in Los Angeles' Ambassador Hotel as he celebrated his triumph in the California Democratic presidential primary. Robert F. Kennedy was shot by five other persons were wounded by Sirhan and for this he was convicted on five counts of assault with a deadly weapon.

"Sirhan stood not one tear," Grant B. Cooper, Sirhan's chief defense attorney, said after accompanying the slim slayer to a heavily guarded cell in the courtroom.

Sirhan's mother, Cooper said, "broke down and cried when she left him in his cell."

Mary Sirhan, 65, had heard the death sentence for her son with her head in a sack next to the wall, halfway back in the spectator's section of the courtroom.

Beside her, another son, Martin, 22, listened calmly after Judge Walker denied a defense motion for a new trial and read into the record by Cooper. "He would not have any more to say about the taking of another life."

"You may recall his plea when he learned of the death of Martin Luther King. He said he had no violence or lawlessness but love and wisdom and compassion towards one another."

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## Astronauts Shift to LEM, Ready Mooncape Close-In

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Here are the critical moments in Apollo 10's second workday in lunar orbit Thursday—all times Eastern Daylight.

5:30 p.m.—The lunar module whips over the moon at 3.5 miles and Stafford and Cernan have the July 11 landing site of Apollo 11 view about 35 minutes.

5:45 p.m.—The lunar module fires its engine again to raise its orbital high point to more than 200 miles.

7:22—The lunar module discards its descent stage, the lower half of the craft which is distinguished by the four landing legs.

7:42 p.m.—The lunar module ascent stage engine is fired to place it on course to rendezvous with the command module. Moments later the lunar lander again passes 5.5 miles over the lunar surface.

8:33 p.m.—The lunar module performs another orbit step toward rendezvous on the back side of the moon, out of radio contact with earth.

9:31 p.m.—The lunar module again fires its rocket engine to line up the two spacecraft for a final step toward rendezvous.

10:09 p.m.—The terminal phase of the rendezvous is performed. This is a rocket firing that shoots the lunar module directly at the command module.

11:04 p.m.—The two spacecraft rendezvous in orbit of the moon.

11:20 p.m.—Young guides the command module to a docking with the lunar module. Twelve latches grab the ladder.

12:00 a.m.—Friday—Stafford and Cernan start transferring back to the command module.

1:09 a.m.—Friday—Lunar module is jettisoned.

**U.S., Allies Insisting On Joint Withdrawal**

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — over a greater share of the nations fighting on the side of South Vietnam called today for a mutual withdrawal of allied and North Vietnamese troops.

The communique issued at the end of a one-day meeting of all seven allies also called for withdrawal of "externally introduced forces" from Laos and Cambodia.

## Payroll Tax Gets Support Of Committee

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The legislative Finance Committee Wednesday that would make Connecticut the only state in the nation with a payroll tax on employers rather than employees.

Through advertisements in the news media, the Manufacturers Association of Connecticut, the Connecticut State Bar Association, Commerce and other groups have been vigorously opposing the payroll tax bill.

The payroll tax bill is one of a package of Democratic tax measures brought out by the Finance Committee Wednesday.

The others would: —Boost the sales tax from its present 3.5 per cent to 5 per cent and extend it to the trade-in allowance on used cars. Only clothing for children 10 years old and younger would remain exempt, instead of the present exemption on clothing for all youngsters 18 and under. —Impose a 2 per cent tax on premiums of Connecticut Medical Service and Connecticut Blue Cross Health Insurance policies. —Boost the corporation tax from 8.25 per cent to 9 per cent. —Boost the tax on investment income of insurance companies from 7.5 per cent to 8 per cent. —Raise truck registration fees and impose a four-mile tax on 181 tractors and 8 new in weight. —Impose a tax on real estate transactions—one-fourth of one per cent on transactions under \$25,000, three-eighths of one per cent on those from \$25,000 to \$50,000 and 5 per cent on those over \$50,000.

The committee killed bills that would have imposed a tax on the income of individuals from investments, savings accounts and capital gains, extended the unincorporated business tax to professionals such as architects and lawyers, and extended the sales tax to all insurance premiums.

The committee gave a favorable report to a bill—similar to one that got lost in the shut-off on the last night of the 1967 session—that would phase out local property taxes on the in- (See Page Fifteen)

## The Big Farm Payments

WASHINGTON — Jim Eastland of South Carolina, Miss., also known as the Hon. James O. Eastland, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee and a member of the Agriculture Committee—received 118,978 dollars in federal farm payments in 1968.

But he was a piker compared with some of the really big farm operators, appropriations bill on the house floor next Tuesday that will limit annual payments to any one recipient to 20,000 dollars. He says the big payments are decreasing U.S. agriculture.

Friday's legislation, the first made public for the year 1968, show that farmers received about 8.3 billion dollars as crop subsidies, payments for not planting and the like, chiefly in California with the heat, cotton and feed programs. Thousands received in excess of 25,000 dollars each, and their names were put into the Washington Post's Sugar Act and Wool Payments, which were not available.

The top taker was the J.O. Boswell Co. of Kings County, Calif., which received 8 million dollars. This firm led in 1967, when it received 7.5 million.

Second in 1968 was Gillett, Inc. of Fresno County, Calif., with 2,712,187 dollars, and then South Lake Farms of Kings County, 1,177,250 dollars. Dozens of others, chiefly in California and Arizona, received in the hundreds of thousands.

The payment list presented some interesting curios: —Firm in Texas (254,301 dollars), Arkansas (154,613), Louisiana (50,775) and Mississippi (27,885) received over a half million dollars in federal farm payments.

—Banks and industrial companies as well as state institutions benefited from federal largesse. Reynolds Metal Co. got 45,941 dollars in payments for acreage in Henderson County, Ky. The Southern National Bank got 10,044 dollars for holdings in North Carolina (See Page Two)
