might seem the beginning of the world as it ought to be.

As for an immediate verdict on this particular Hamburger Hill, it seems clear by obvious that both we and the North Vietnamese set up this bloody game of duck and a rock in an effort, such as it is, to improve our "position of strength" for the negotiations at Paris. From this point of view, we see no measurable result, from this, or from all the other expenditure of life both sides have so far treated upon as an accompaniment to the dance of words at Paris.

**Marcuse on Free Speech**

Professor Herbert Marcuse gave a public chat, the other day, to what may be the secret of his popularity as a philosopher for the "New Left."

What he said—and he said it directly to a meeting of the American Civil Liberties Union—likewise involved in free speech for everybody—was that he himself did not approve of free speech for anybody who advocates war, racism, exploitation, or brutality.

This was sound reasonable and critical and humane until one realizes that the New Left's philosopher would apparently leave it up to his own judgment to decide just what constitutes advocacy of what kind of war, what kind of racism, what kind of exploitation, and what kind of brutality when it happens to be preaching a theory, what would be the judgment of Marcuse in reverse, or what constitutes exploitation of one human being by another.

What Professor Marcuse really said, then, was that he disagreed with the right of free speech for people who might disagree with him.

This kind of statement has the charm and the virtue of a henney which is relatively rare among crumblers for any of our political or philosophical extremists. They do not very often come right out and say that their own particular revolution would, if it ever won its way to power, deny to others the same freedom, if so holistically claims for itself while it is on its way up.

**"Hamburger Hill"**

"Hamburger Hill" now becomes, in its moment, the best statement has the charm and the virtue of a henney which is relatively rare among crumblers for any of our political or philosophical extremists. They do not very often come right out and say that their own particular revolution would, if it ever won its way to power, deny to others the same freedom, if so holistically claims for itself while it is on its way up.

Professor Marcuse has enjoyed a great deal of sympathy, in recent months, because reactionary California elements have been trying to drive him out of his teaching post at San Diego, because rightist sides have threatened his life, all because they disagree with things he has written or said. Now he himself confesses that, had he the power, he himself would be a stopper of tongues, a banner of books, all of them, of course, being the bad and wicked ones, or at least those he himself classified as bad and wicked.

The system by which this democracy has lived so far depends upon our continuing to give Professor Marcuse his freedom of speech, and upon our agreeing to it that he doesn't get his freedom of action.

**On Washday Wonders**

Despite the triumphs of this modern age, I am one who still believes that the most wonderful thing about the washing machine is that it doesn't get his freedom of action.

Form "Hamburger Hill" does stand, by such events, as a dramatic symbol of the war, as it is being fought by our commanders and our men over in Vietnam.

But "Hamburger Hill" also has another side. Even while one man in uniform in Vietnam was storming up a hill, perhaps wondering why a United States Senator in Washington, on the floor of the Senate, was making a speech denouncing the military operation in question.

The speech was by Senator Edward Kennedy, whose family gave three brothers to the service of their country, and whose basic patriotism and loyalty to the American system is not under question. It was a speech, this speech in the United States Senate, appearing the fighting of this battle American boys were winning, even while the speech was being delivered.

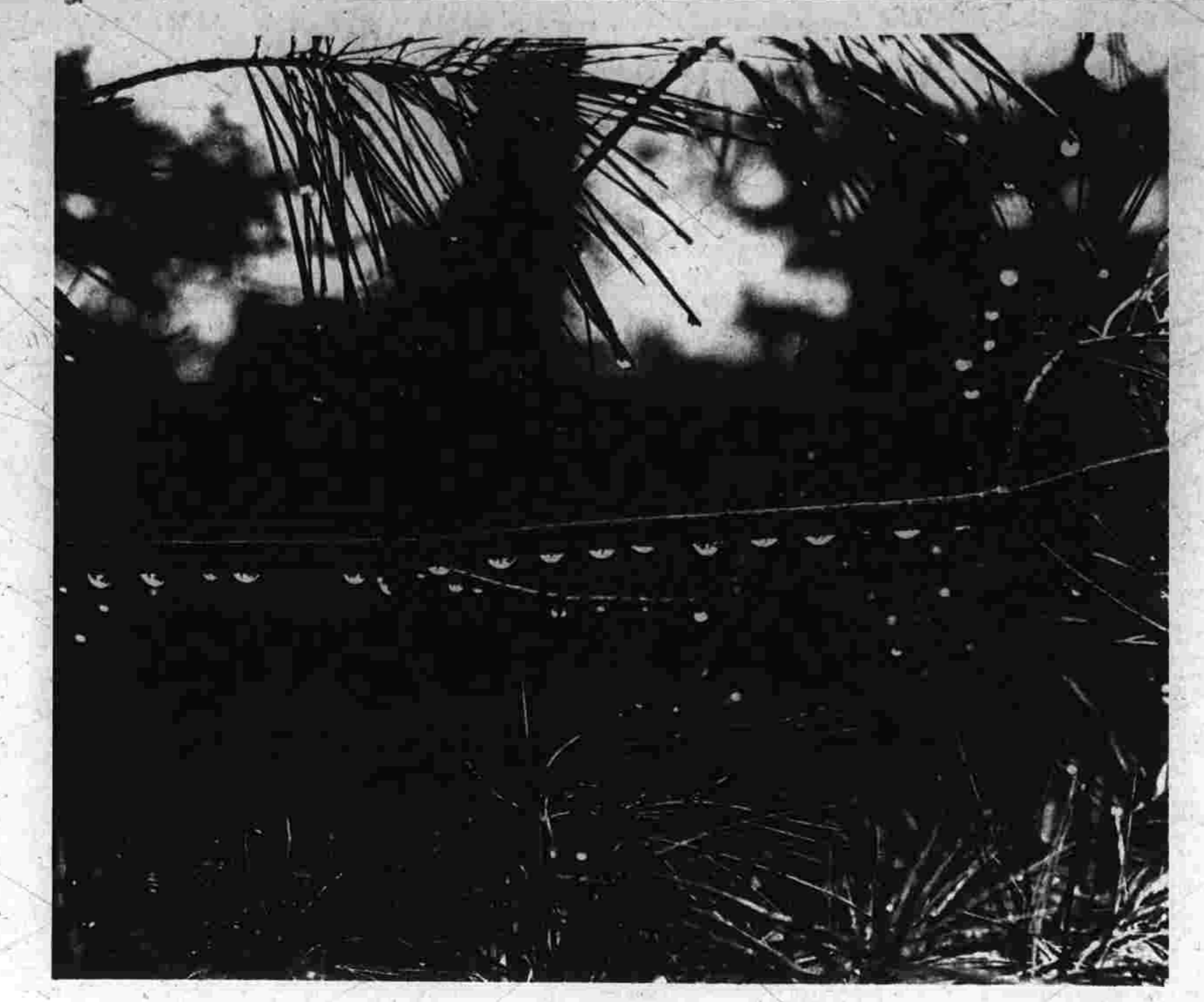
"President Nixon has told us," said Senator Kennedy, "that we seek no military victory, that we seek only peace. How can we justify sending our boys against a hill a dozen times or more, until soldiers themselves question the madness of the action? The assault on Hamburger Hill is only symptomatic of a mentality and a policy that require immediate attention."

Senator Kennedy called the battle itself "senseless and irresponsible" and said "American lives are too valuable to be sacrificed for military pride." He was speaking on the floor of the Senate, by the Republican whip, Senator Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, who answered from the context of American history to now, and who answered by disputing the right or the propriety of his colleague in trying to take the right to fight any single battle away from our generals.

That will not be the end of public debate over the battle of Hamburger Hill. The Hill will be watched, to see whether, having conquered it, our commanders think it is worth having our men stay there. And if we don't bother to keep the price we won, that will shift argument back to the bottom of the hill ratio and find some people asking whether it is worth while giving 43 American lives to get 430 North Vietnamese lives, or whether, as some of us should consider it merely a game of statistics if we could get the 430 North Vietnamese lives for nothing.

All this illustrates the kind of world, the kind of country, this has become, when political leaders dare question the value of a battle even while it is still being fought, when the population grows so soft and civilized that neither lives relatives to dead heroes, when even the men in uniform are allowed to question the orders they are receiving. It begs to look more and more like a world which might, some day, find itself actually incapable of waging war. What, if some day, both sides should refuse to set up the next Hamburger Hill between themselves?

For some, any such development might seem like the end of the world as we have known it. For others, it

**Legislative Briefs**

**Sterilization**

HARTFORD (AP) — A bill that would restrict the state's power to sterilize state prisoners and state mental hospital patients was passed Wednesday by the House and sent to the governor.

The law now allows sterilization of persons found likely by an interested physician to be a danger to themselves or others, mental illness or mental defect, and who were not likely to be cured.

The new law would retain only the power to sterilize mentally retarded inmates at the state training schools in Southbury and Mansfield.

**Wire Tapping**

HARTFORD (AP) — The Legislature's Judiciary Committee endorsed Wednesday a bill that would authorize use of wire tapping to combat crimes of gambling, narcotics and violence.

Permission to tap a wire or bug a room could be granted, under the terms of the bill, by the chief justice of the state Supreme Court, the chief court administrator, or superior court judges authorized by them.

The bill would limit access to the products of the wire tapping to state police officers and prosecuting attorneys.

**Welfare Lobby**

HARTFORD (AP) — Some 75 persons rallied outside the state Capitol Wednesday and then went inside to lobby for a number of welfare bills.

The move on behalf of poor and underprivileged persons throughout the state was the latest in a series of such gatherings.

William Jones, an official of the Caucus of Connecticut Democrats, noted that the bills were so far passed only seven of about 70 bills that would strengthen civil rights laws and improve the lot of the poor.

## New Satellite Replaces Failure

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — A new communications satellite whirled around earth today to establish the first global commercial telephone-relay satellite network and replace a faulty spacecraft now hovering over the Pacific.

Launched Wednesday night, the \$4.8-million payload—called Intelsat II—coasted into an elliptical orbit expected to carry it to a peak altitude of about 27,000 miles Friday at 10:45 p.m. Ground controllers planned to trigger a spacecraft motor to kick the satellite into a stationary orbit 23,300 miles over the Gilbert Islands in the Pacific.

Trackers confirmed that Intelsat II was in transfer orbit about four hours after launch. The ground station at Carnarvon, Australia, picked up signals from the spacecraft at 1:18 a.m. and verified that the orbit was as good as, ranging from 180 to 27,700 miles in space.

"Everything looks beautiful," launch director Robert Gray said after studying initial data. The new satellite was to replace a similar craft which experienced electrical problems that require some ground stations to use 10 times the normal amount of power to relay signals through it.

The 60-ton station International Telecommunications Satellite Consortium, Inc., based in Washington, D.C., planned to shift the troublesome craft in two to three weeks over the Indian Ocean, where there is less telephone and television traffic. Combined with spacecraft over the Pacific and Atlantic, that would complete the first satellite network.

Jews Will Mark Feast of Weeks

The Jewish holiday of Shavuot, or Feast of Weeks, will begin today at sundown and will continue through tomorrow and Saturday. Holiday services will be held at Temple Beth Shalom this evening at 7:30, tomorrow at 10 a.m. (Family Service) and at 6:15 p.m. (Confirmation Service) and on Saturday at 10 a.m. (Memorial Service).

The name of the holiday is derived from the fact that it follows seven weeks after Passover. It is also referred to as Pentecost, a Greek term denoting that the holiday comes 50 days after Passover. In ancient Palestine, Shavuot was observed as an early agricultural festival marking the beginning of the summer harvest season. On this occasion the farmers would make a pilgrimage to Jerusalem and bring the first fruits of the harvest to the Temple.

The holiday was also observed as the anniversary of the giving of the Ten Commandments to the Israelites on Mt. Sinai in their way to the Promised Land. It is this aspect of the holiday that has been stressed for the past 2000 years since the destruction of Palestine as a Jewish State. In modern times the holiday is marked by special confirmation services held on the holiday at which the young people are confirmed in the faith of their fathers.

As Sinai marked the beginning of the spiritual odyssey of the Hebrew people and because the source and fountainhead of their religious and spiritual heritage, the events that took place there at the giving of the Ten Commandments and the giving of the Law have been given the name of transmitting God's words to humanity.
