# It Seems An Excellent Choice

Judge Warren E. Burger looks like Chief Justice should, and the only cessible slight shadow on his record s that he has indulged himself rather generously in the business of public comment on the conduct of courts, including the Court over which he will soon be

But his public comment has at least been limited to judicial theory and has not gone down into the public arena to indulge in controversy over political or policy issues which might be likely to come before any court. When the Senators get through investigating Judge Burger, they seem certain to pronounce him clean and pure. And he seems likey to make a fine Chief Justice, good or the Court, good for the country. It is to be noted, of course, that the most genuine expressions of approval of the President's choice come from the have been merely polite. But surely a resident elected with Mr. Nixon's previous record is not fooling or betraying anybody if he makes a conservative

And surely, after the era through which it has just passed, the Court itself can survive and perhaps benefit from the experience of having a conservative Chief Justice. Above all, however, past experience

with nominees to this Court by many Presidents indicates that the Court itself often has its ways of adjusting and nodulating the philosophies of its members. Somebody is always being surprised at the way a particular nominee

The prospect with Judge Burger is that, although there may be surprises, hey are likely to be pleasant ones, comforting to the nation's sense of sanity. The first impression is that President Nixon has chosen well.

# People Vs. Pavement

It is very often - but not always nerely the story of trying to lock the stable door too late. And mostly it makes one think of all the ugliness and scar and destruction the urban centers of the ountry might have saved themselves if they had resisted the demands of the specializations to be allowed to run arough their best sections and neighfiscods. But occasionally an historic battle is being won — as in the case of the San Francisco citizens' movement which finally did balt the construction of the Freeway which, if completed rould have out most of that city off rom its view of that famous Bay.

Altogether, there are now some 25 serious office which can boast citizens alligent enough and lively enough to residential sections from superhigh-ways usually being built, ironically, to give through traffic a "bypass" route. 'This is not, however, the normal exmits by the office and towns, and upon the federal highway department by the states, would be likely to reveal.

The usual experience in the past has been that the typical American community can't wait to have the superhighway driven through its heart. Most comnumities not as if they had in mind the goal of Los Angeles, which has the intinction of using more space to let people go through it than it uses to let

Too late, in most instances, but still in time in some cases, people are be-ginning to wake up and realize that a road can and should be, in relation the community it is supposed to serve, a convenience but not a domination, and should be classified as a public service, not on end in itself.

Astronauts Tell The World SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)—The Apollo 10 astronauts ended their moon odyssey and streaked for planet earth today sharing their thoughts and views with mankind as they headed home.

Air Force Col. Thomas P. Stafford and Navy Cmdrs.

John W. Young and Eugene A. Cernan fired Apollo 10's engine at 6:25 a.m. EDT to dart out of moon orbit and start the quarter million-mile homeward journey.

The astronauts are to cover a 246,383-mile return path in 54 hours, splashing down in the Pacific Ocean Monday.

They had circled the moon for 2½ days during which they cleared the way for two American astronauts to land on the moon in July.

The critical firing occurred behind the moon's backside, out of radio contact. Mission control center in Houston waited a suspenseful nine minutes before Apollo 10 rounded the edge and flashed the reassuring radio signals.
