First, it may try to decide that gains sought by such blackmail, terroristic methods shall never be granted. Second, society may surrender to such tactics, in a mood of guilty meekness in which it acknowledges that its own sins of neglect and past indifference have been greater than the present sins of confrontation violence.

Neither alternative is satisfactory. To deny the reasonable part of gains unreasonably sought would be to dam up the whole problem. To bow meekly to all kinds of blackmail tactics would be to multiply the use of such tactics beyond

What we usually do is, like the deputy mayor said, something which rewards the "confrontation" tactic.

The only thing that can safely put unreasonable demanding in its place is the presence and recognizable appearance of a vibrant degree of progress organized by society itself.

But you can be working very hard at that, and still not escape being made part of the target. For those on the ictim side of the "confrontation politics" staged in that New York hotel ballroom the other day were all social workers, all of them engaged in some form of attack on the social problems for which the invading militants were, that particular day, staging their confrontation, and demanding the immediate payment of some ransom.



The reform movement has drawn upport from many quarters, including large portion, if not most, of the insurance industry, in the editorial opinion of a great many of the country's influential newspapers, and from the people themselves as shown in the overvhelming margins of public opinion
