

Black Studies At Yale To many people, the artificial creaton of departments of Afro-American tudies at our various colleges and universities seems one more instance operating more out of guilt for the set then in sound planning for the niture. It is thought of as a nice gesture, but an overemphasis of a subject not really and intrinsically worth as much campus time and space as are being assigned to it. And it has been criticised, by some Negro leaders themselves, as little more than the creation of easy courses for Negroes themselves

All these concepts and assumptions falter a little before first reports coming in about the design and content of the Afro-American courses being set up down at Yale University. During the past semester, the personnel for an Afro-American department has been assemble ed, and pilot courses have been offered all in preparation for the formal opening of the new section of the Yale curriculum next September.

And what the students at Yale who have been taking these courses—twothirds of them black, one-third whitehave discovered, to their mutual enrichment, is that there is more honest body and justifiable content available for such courses than anyone would have believed before the actual planning and organ-

In history, in music, in literature, in sociology, there has proved to be more to study and more to learn-with all of it related to general human experience and white American experience as well as to particular Negro experiences—than at first seemed possible. The classes in the Yale department
