



earnest Councilman who was seeking to become the city's first Negro mayor. Councilman Bradley answered Mayor Yorty's obvious resorts to the poisons of poise. Yet he himself yielded enough to the temptations of his situation to resort to the rather easily made personal attacks on Mayor Yorty, thus, by his own indulgence in something less than high level campaigning, taking low level efforts.

In addition to all this help, Mayor Yorty also had the crucial assistance of those prejudices among Los Angeles voters to which be was directing his main appeal. There were indeed voters who allowed themselves to be frightened by his dire warnings of what would happen if Los Angeles got itself a black Mayor. There is indeed in this country, everywhere, some percentage of the population which lives in instinctive, almost ungovernable fear of the progress of integration in any of the processes of our

With all this special help, Mayor Yorty got some 53 per cent and Councilman Bradley some 47 per cent of the vote in a city which has a population

The result indicates that Mayor Yorty can guide his city with safety only if he makes himself a better Mayor and a more principled individual than he to be that the way he campaigned and the way he won have not re-poisoned the city of Watts beyond antidote.


