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Nixon Experimenting With 'Negative Tax'

The administration, a poor family of four would be entitled to payments of 1,000 dollars a year. As in most negative income tax plans, the family would lose 1 dollar in payments for every 2 dollars earned. Thus, federal aid was to be paid off for families with incomes of 3,000 dollars. But the aid cutoff point would be higher where federal aid was supplemented by state or local welfare funds.

The three-year test of "negative income tax" will be conducted by the University of Wisconsin's Institute for Research on Poverty and financed by grants totaling 3.5 million dollars from the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Informants said the administration had approved an initial grant of \$10,000 dollars to get the project started.

In the application, the university said that, as in the New Jersey Experiment, families for the rural test would be selected at random in a pre-designated area and would be randomly assigned to one of two groups—a test group which would receive the payments and a control group which would not.

It said two thousand would be selected for the experiment—one in the mid-west, probably in Illinois or Iowa; and

NORWALK, Conn. (AP)—A masked man, long blond hair, robbed a branch of the Connecticut National Bank and fled with \$4,875 this morning.

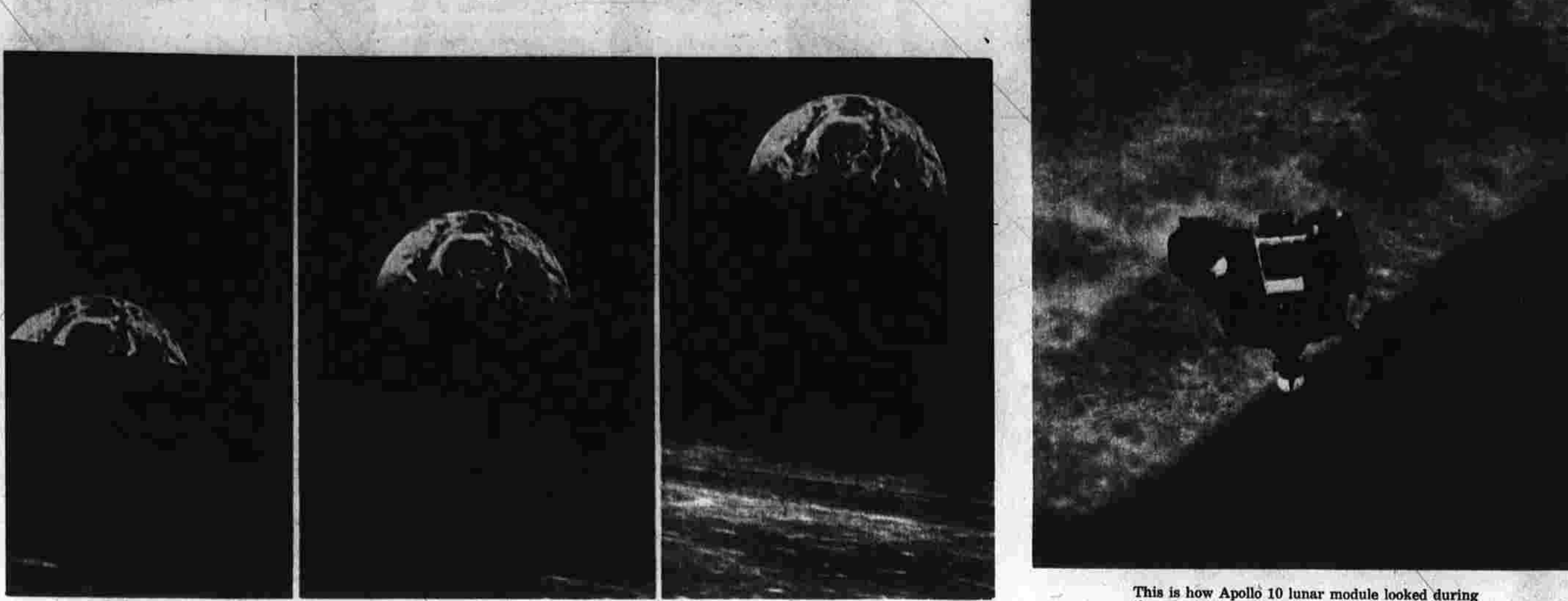

No shots were fired during the robbery which occurred shortly after 9:30 a.m. at the bank on the corner of Main Street and Ohio Avenue.

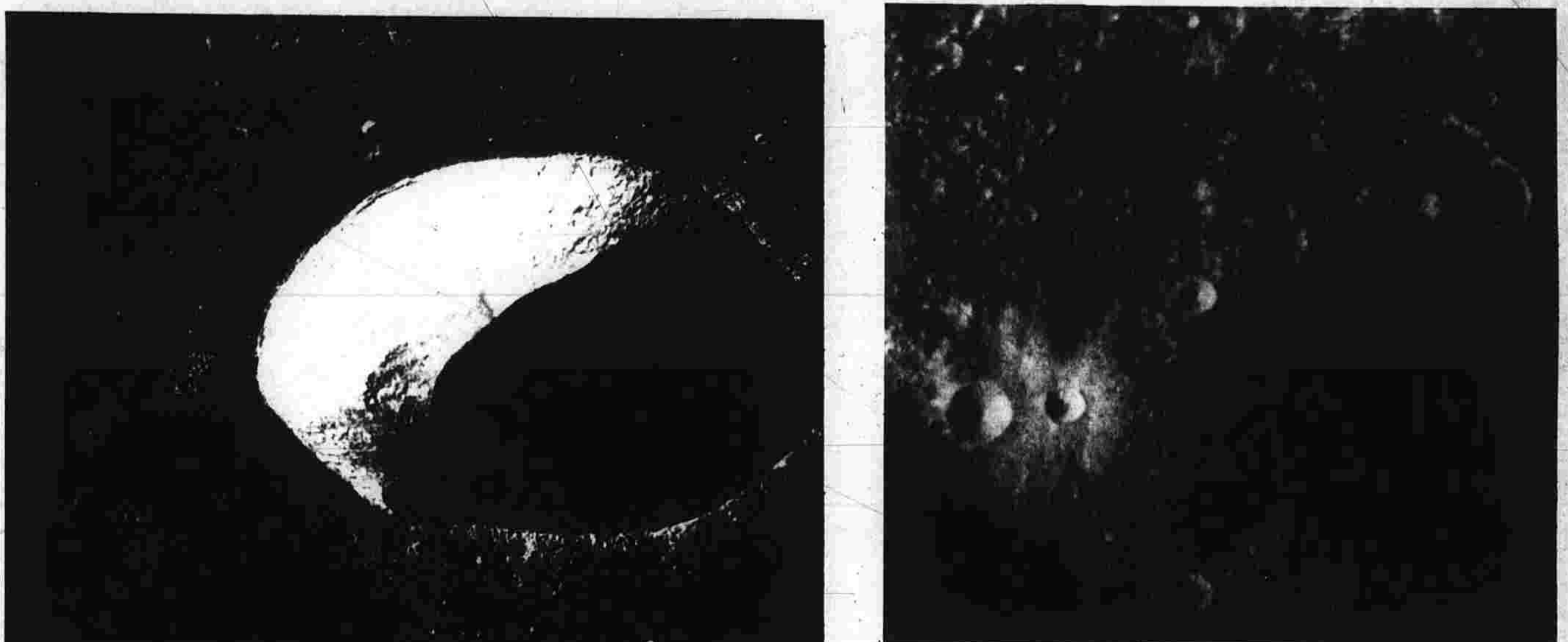

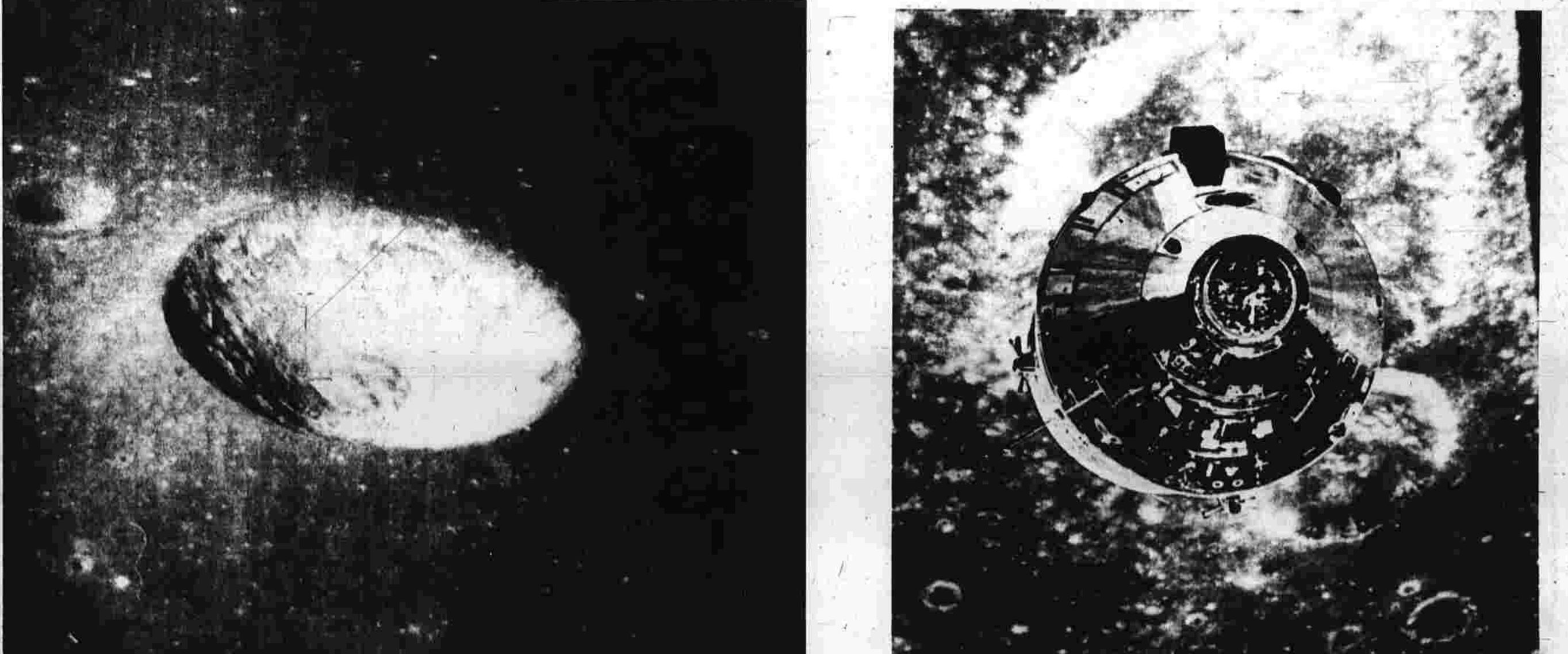
Album from Apollo 10

But as the student disorders intensified he changed his mind. "I didn't think I could stay away any longer," said Lowenstein in an interview. "I can't sustain the situation to those who stand by their feet, every day and build nothing."

"I can't believe that anything constructive or anything hopeful when soon squads of kids go around beating each other up or assaulting professors or pitching desks around."

At the moment there is neither principle nor pragmatism that's upheld by these tactics.

"This country's going to be here for a long time one way or the other. You burn it down, you've still got to live in it. You burn it into an armed camp, you've still got to live in it."

rise far from any original purpose of their alliance.

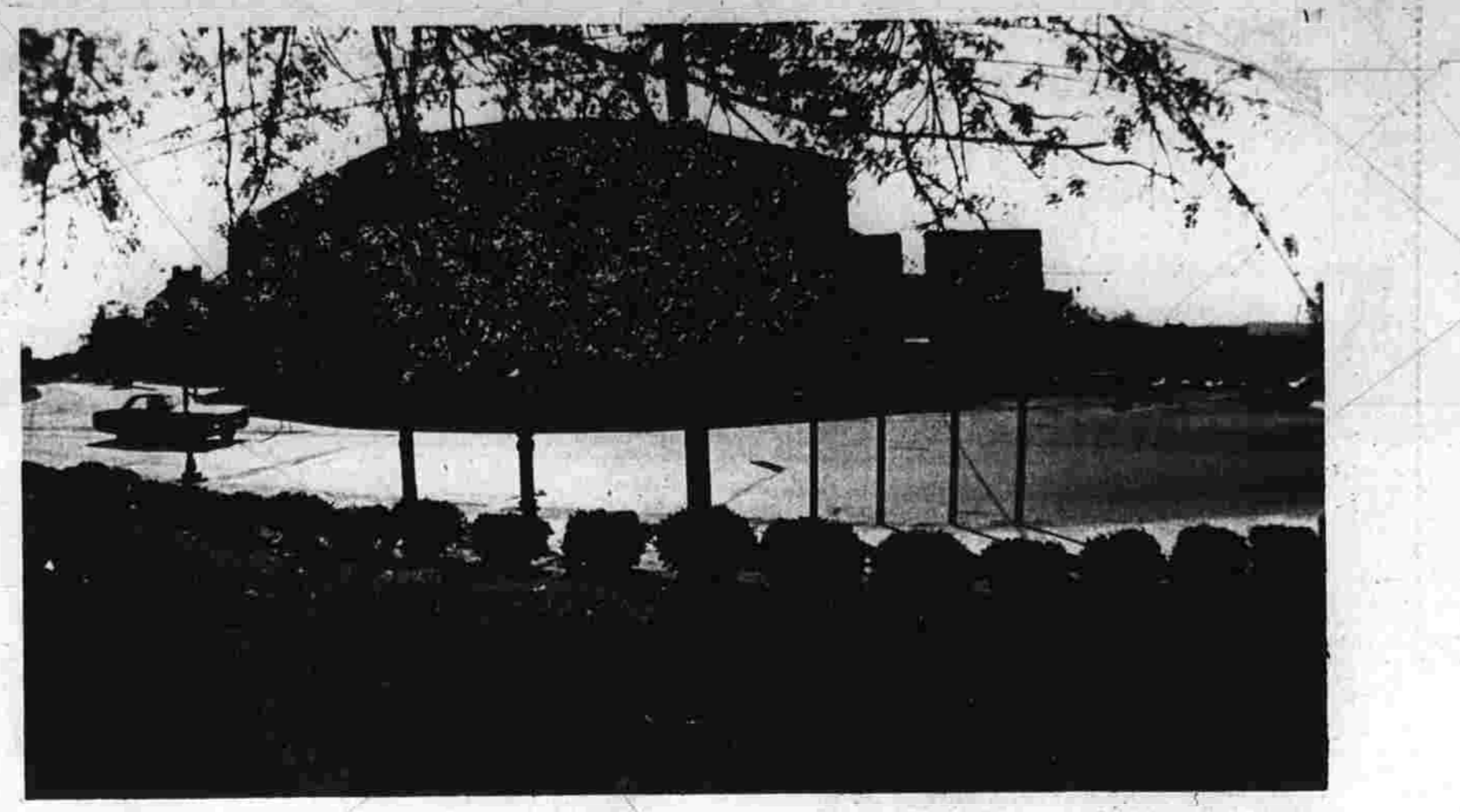
Do the spectacle goes on—that of the new administration at Washington sending out reassurances that it is not going to abandon American commitments of the past, and yet finding, even as it gives these reassurances, that the sense of direction of those old John Foster Dulles alliances has altered and their sense of urgency practically disappeared.

It seems a rather foolish exercise in the perpetuation of a diplomacy which was foolish in the first place.

The trouble is that here, as in many other places and situations in our world, nobody knows just how to go about giving something up—because if it is foolish and unproductive.

One can imagine the storm of criticism from empty minds at home and abroad if the Nixon administration should directly announce that it intended to negotiate an end to NATO, SEATO and CENTO on the basis that, whatever value and purposes they may once have had, both the world situation and the views of their members have changed to such a degree as to render them useless. Such a policy would be denounced as a faithless abandonment of friends and a shameful capitulation to Communism. It would be attacked as a return to isolationism.

Actually, if it could be done, it would be something that would rid the world of a lot of dead wood diplomacy. But, the dominance of the same kind of practicality organized these alliances in the first place being what it is, the situation is that the world will have to wait for them to wither, which is what they are doing, steadily, even while the new administration at Washington goes through the motions of sending out its assurances.

Yorty Had Help

Mayor Samuel Yorty came from behind and won himself a decisive victory as Mayor of Los Angeles, but he didn't do it all by himself.

Some of this help consisted of the appearance on the scene, uninvited by the voters of Los Angeles themselves, of a number of national Democratic figures who took time out to let these voters know that they preferred Congressman Thomas Bradley to Mayor Yorty. There is no valid question as to which of the two candidates is the better man, but the result of participation in the Los Angeles campaign by such outside writers as Senator Edward Kennedy, former Vice President Hubert Humphrey, Democratic National Chairman Fred Harris and Senator George McGovern was to create more votes for Yorty, whom they were against, than for Bradley, whom they favored.

Mayor Yorty also had help from all the headlines from all over the rest of the country, which told of violence and unrest related to, or getting some of its impetus from, racial issues.

And he even had help from his opponent, the hastily dignified and earnest Councilman who was seeking to become the city's first Negro mayor.

Councilman Bradley answered Mayor Yorty's obvious resort to the poison of racial prejudice with a calm and steady pace. Yet he himself yielded enough to the temptations of his situation to resort to the rather nasty made personal attacks on Mayor Yorty, thus by his own indulgence in something less than high level campaigning, taking some of the curse of Mayor Yorty's low level efforts.

In addition to all this help, Mayor Yorty also had the crucial assistance of these prejudices among Los Angeles voters to which he was directing his main appeal. There were indeed voters who allowed themselves to be frightened by his dire warnings of what would happen if Los Angeles got itself a black Mayor.

There is indeed in this country, everywhere, some percentage of the population which lives in instinctive, almost unmanageable fear of the progress of integration in any of the processes of our democracy.

With all this special help, Mayor Yorty got some 53 per cent and Councilman Bradley some 47 per cent of the vote in a city which had a population of about 18 per cent Negro.

The result indicates that Mayor Yorty can make his city with safety, and if he makes himself a better Mayor and a more principled individual than he has been in the past, the hope has to be that the way he campaigned and the way he won have not re-politened the city of Watts beyond aid.

The Cure Is Adult Unrest

I have plenty of opportunity to talk with you on such matters, but I am addressed to grown-ups, to persons of my own generation.

Students are rising in revolt all over the world. Keep that in mind as you worry about American students. They are protesting different complaints and make different demands. Each of them they say is hard for even reasonable and sympathetic grown-ups to hear. They make and are going to go on making all the mistakes in the calendar.

Whatever the mood of Brock and his fact-finding team when they left Washington, they came back angry, saddened, and gravely worried about the rapid alienation of American youth, and their raising political reaction against campus disorders, and the use of overkill in some police actions.

More than that, they discovered a fact that some colleges and universities are not. That (as one of them told us) "the moment a cop sets his foot on campus, that moment the great middle ground of moderate students may be lost."

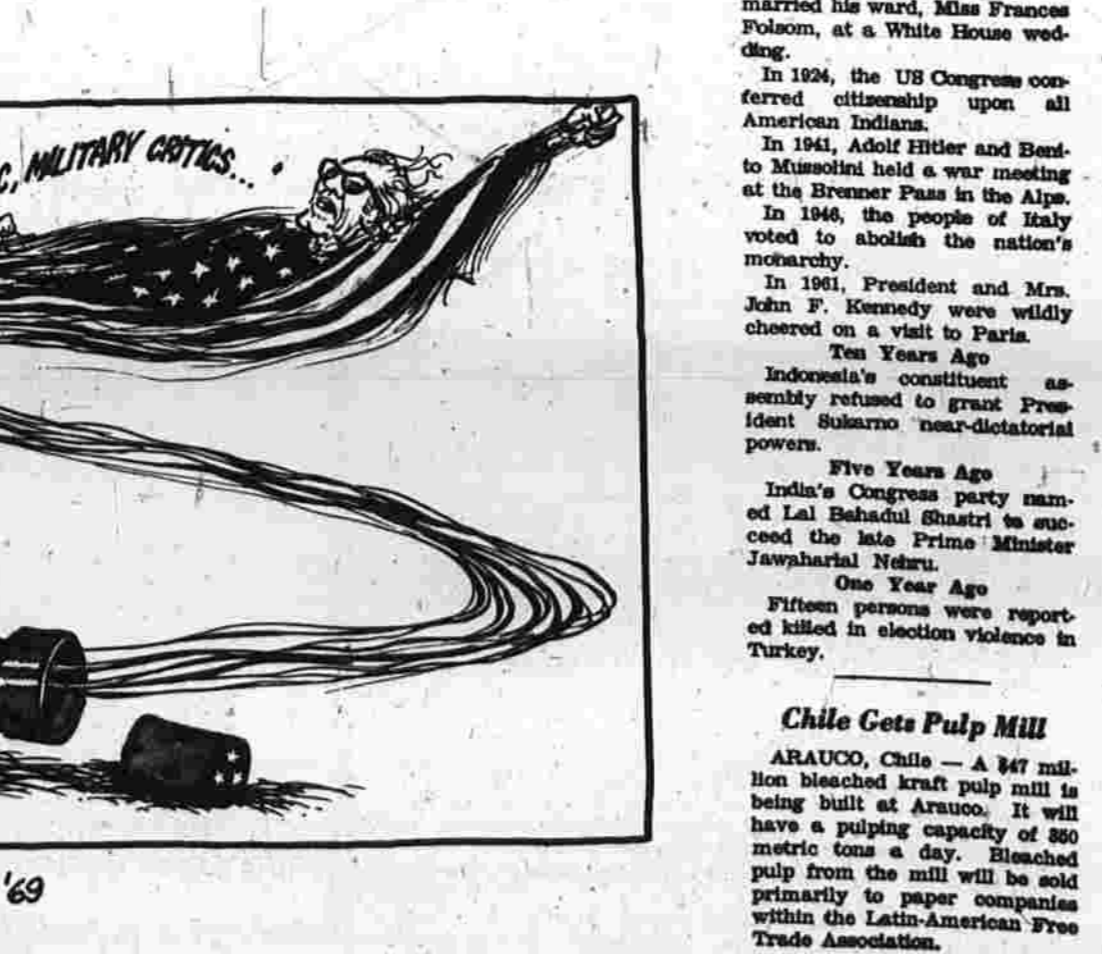

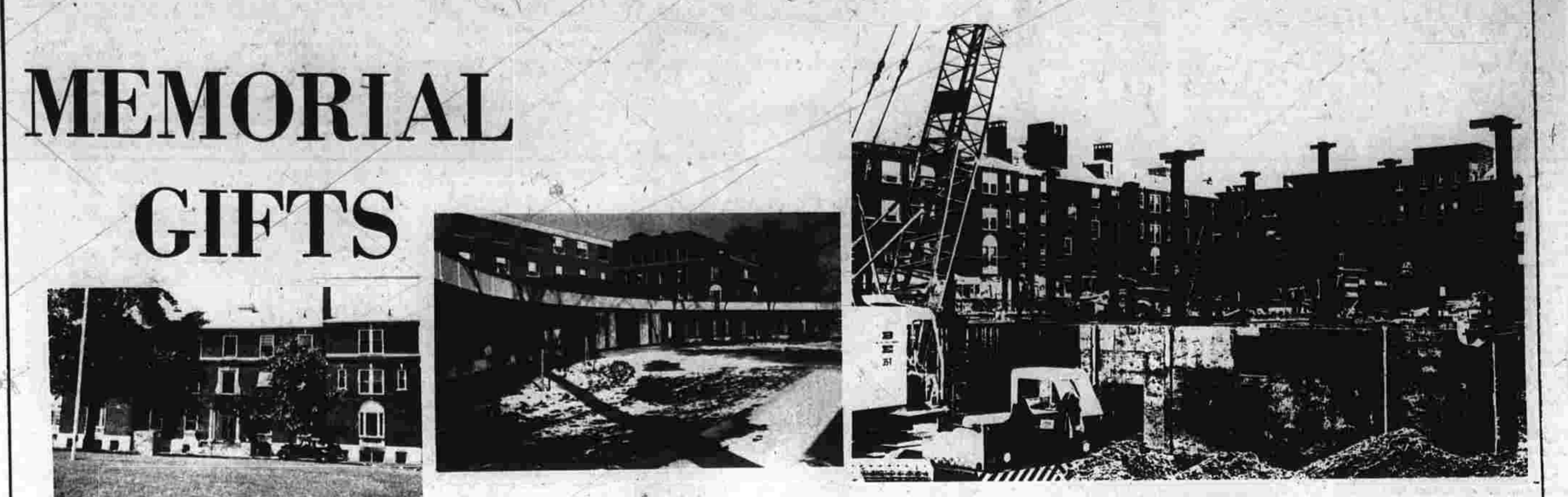

"The issue is more than an admission of justice; it is a conviction," Justice William O. Douglas said. He added: "Ignorance, in comprehension, coercion, terror, inducements, subtle or blatant threats, might be a perfect cover-up of unconscious guilt."

Douglas, speaking for the majority added: "What is at stake for an accused facing death or life imprisonment depends on the solicitude of which courts are seized in canvassing the matter to make sure he has a full understanding of what the plea connotes and of its consequences."

State Labor Board Orders MEG Vote
